# **Bayou Bartholomew Trail Open to Vistors!**

The long awaited Bayou Bartholomew Nature Trail on Hazel Street near I-530 in Pine Bluff is now complete for the public to enjoy. There are a few items to complete such as installing the interpretive signs which will educate hikers to the resources of the Bayou Bartholomew. We anticipate that the signs will be installed within the next month.

A ceremony was held on November 6, 2003 dedicating the trail and honoring those who graciously donated funds and time for its completion. For a list of volunteers, look at the Volume 13 edition of the BBA Newsletter. Financial contributors included the Arkansas Highway and Transportation Department, the Trinity Foundation, the Catherine Seabrook Beautification Fund, and Mr. Ferd Bellingrath. Without the help of those contributors, the trail would not have been possible.

Mr. Delos McCauley, a local member of the Three Rivers Audubon Society, has diligently been recording bird life in the natural area. He has compiled a list of birds seen to date so that all bird watchers may check off their sightings. He has developed a tri-fold pamphlet which is available to those who wish to record their bird sightings. Please contact the BBA Coordinator for a copy.

The Bayou Bartholomew Alliance President, Dr. Curtis Merrell, announced at the trail dedication that the trail was to be named the William (Bill) G. Layher Bayou Bartholomew Trail. Dr. Layher was humbled and honored at the announcement. Dr. Layher serves as the Coordinator for the Bayou Bartholomew Alliance.

The new nature trail offers a variety of habitats to wander through and enjoy. Obviously, collection of plants or animals is not allowed. Please use the trail but if you carry items in, please remove them when you leave. No motorized vehicles are allowed on the trail. We have already had a few four wheelers on the trail causing some damage. Should you see such activity, please call the BBA coordinator at 870-879-4808.

The Bayou Bartholomew Alliance will host a work day on March 13 at 9:00 a.m. until noon to spruce up the trail. Bring your rakes, shovels, saws, and leaf blowers if you would like to help. See you there!

#### LOUISIANIAN JOINS BOARD

Elton Kennedy, a prominent rice farmer, business man, and conservationist from Mer Rouge, Louisiana, has become the latest member of the Bayou Bartholomew Alliance (BBA) Board of Directors. Elton accepted the Board's invitation to join and was recently approved unanimously by the Board. He is a former Board Member of the Louisiana Nature Conservancy. He is a well known and highly respected rice farmer, and owner and President of Delta Land and Farm Management Co., LLC, which manages substantial acres of farm, ranch and timber land. He is also the owner and President of Kennedy Rice Dryers, LLC, a grain elevator and grain dealer with four locations in Northeast Louisiana.

Presently, he is the Chairman of the Board of Directors of American Horizon Bank, with locations in Bastrop, Monroe and Ruston. Elton is also the Director of Riviana Foods, Inc. of Houston, Texas and a member of various closely held corporations.

The Bayou Bartholomew Alliance recently expanded its efforts to include the Louisiana portion of the Bayou Bartholomew. Mr. Kennedy will certainly provide great representation for the Louisiana Bayou Bartholomew watershed. The BBA has been collaborating with the Louisiana Nature Conservancy (LNC) for several years and is currently engaged in a major project involving the LNC, Arkansas Nature Conservancy, Arkansas Department of Environmental Quality, and Winrock International.

Elton considers himself a conservationist and he said he is very interested in helping restore and preserve Bayou Bartholomew. Welcome aboard!!!!!



#### LOGJAM REMOVAL VOLUNTEERS NEEDED!

As noted earlier in this newsletter, SEAARK Marine, Inc. of Monticello, AR donated a work barge to the Bayou Bartholomew Alliance. This barge has two electric winches fore and aft. By using volunteers, the BBA can now start opening logjams in the bayou to facilitate the movement of small boats or canoes down the bayou. Two summers ago, volunteers removed a total of 36 logjams. We hope to far exceed that total this year.

Beginning about April 1, 2004, we will dedicate an average of two days per week to such efforts. If you would like to volunteer to help us in these activities, feel free to give the BBA coordinator a call or send an e-mail (see page 3 for contact information). We anticipate doing this work on Wednesdays and Thursdays as well as some Saturdays if we can find the help. It is hard work, but quite rewarding.

If you have certain days or times that you can volunteer or if you want to be put on a contact list, please let us know. We believe there are still nearly 200 such logjams to work on. We do not remove logs from the bayou. We sometimes use them for bank stabilization efforts or pull them to side channels where they are out of the immediate channel. Logjams provide fish habitat and are important to the bayou ecology, so we do not often move entire jams, just open a corridor to improve passage and prevent flows from eroding banks. Your help will be greatly appreciated!!!!!!!
