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PROCEEDINGS:

MS. POWELL: The Arkansas State Board of Cosmetology meeting will come to order. Madam Secretary, will you please take the roll?

MS. TRAYLOR: Everybody is present except Mr. Downey. And our new board member is present.

DRAWING FOR STUDENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE POSITIONS

MS. POWELL: Okay. At this time we need to move into the Student Advisory Committee drawing. Our security officer needs to leave pretty quickly. I'll turn this over to Director Wittum.

MS. WITTUM: We appreciate Officer Tankin for agreeing to draw the names for these positions. And just real quickly, I wanted to give you an update on the applications that were received. The deadline to apply was September 1, 2006. Eligibility was determined by either the student's current enrollment or the receipt of a license within the last six months, which equates to receipt of a license between March 1st and September 1st. The board received applications for 36 eligible persons. Of these, 20 represent currently enrolled students and 16 recent licensees. Applications were received from 11 ineligible persons, who either were not currently enrolled or who had not received a license within the

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required time period. As we have previously stated, our goal has been to have each congressional district and each course of study or license type represented on this committee by randomly selecting people who would fill those different positions. This all, of course, depended upon the availability of the interested applicants. We were partially successful in that each congressional district will be represented, however, there were no eligible applicants for the manicure course of study or license type. There are two instances where an applicant will win by default in order to ensure that a congressional district or course of study or license type was represented. And I'll explain that as we go through it. Officer Tankin, if you wouldn't mind coming up this way.

We'll start with the currently enrolled in Congressional District 1. Paige Porter from Blytheville Academy of Cosmetology is the only applicant from this district, so she will serve as one of the cosmetology positions.

In Congressional District 3, we'll select a cosmetology applicant.

(Officer Tankin draws.)

MS. WITTUM: And this is Joel Nutt from

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Bentonville. He is currently enrolled at Career Academy of Hair Design.

In Congressional Districts 2 and 4, there was a collection of cosmetology and instructor applicants who applied. Therefore, we have combined the instructor applicants — there was one from each district, and we'll draw an instructor applicant to see which of the districts will be represented by an instructor.

(Officer Tankin draws.)

MS. WITTUM: And that will be Betty Witt, who is currently enrolled at Searcy Beauty College. That was in District 2. In District 4 we're going to select a cosmetology applicant.

(Officer Tankin draws.)

MS. WITTUM: And this will be Marchell Jordan, who is enrolled at Margaret's Hair Academy in Monticello.

And then the remaining applicants from these two districts will be combined and we'll draw for the fifth position.

(Officer Tankin draws.)

MS. WITTUM: And that is Taylor Johnson, who is enrolled as a cosmetology student at the Fayetteville Beauty College.

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That gives us our currently enrolled applicants.

Now, our recent licensees -- of the recent licensees in Congressional District 3, Krissa Thompson from Mountainburg was the only aesthetics applicant to apply, so she will represent the aesthetics course in that district.

In Congressional District 2, we will select an applicant -- a cosmetology applicant.

(Officer Tankin draws.)

MS. WITTUM: And this is Tiphanie Gatewood from North Little Rock. She attended Lee's Cosmetology.

In Congressional Districts 1 and 4, a selection of cosmetology and instructor applicants was received. We combined the instructors and we'll pick from those two districts now.

(Officer Tankin draws.)

MS. WITTUM: Heather Whitlock from El Dorado in District 4 will be our instructor applicant -- our representative.

We'll select a cosmetology applicant from Congressional District 4.

(Officer Tankin draws.)

MS. WITTUM: That will be Marlana Brennan from Camden. She attended Professional Cosmetology Education Center.

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The remaining applicants -- there are four, that are current. The remaining applicants will be combined and we'll select for the fifth position.

(Officer Tankin draws.)

MS. WITTUM: And that will be Natalie Mobley from Jonesboro. She is an instructor, cosmetology instructor, and she attended the Arkansas Academy of Hair Design in Jonesboro and Arthur's in Conway.

And I believe we should have five of those now.

And this fills the Student Advisory Committee.

Officer Tankin, we appreciate your help. Thank you.

OFFICER TANKIN: Sure.

BOARD MEMBERS: Thank you.

(Applause.)

MS. POWELL: I think as Kathy as said, the positions to be filled, the applicants did not have to be present here today, but they will be notified.

MS. WITTUM: Just to -- if I may, for just a moment. Just to reiterate for those who maybe haven't been here and heard the -- we have formed a Student Advisory Committee in an effort to have student leaders and role models serve in these capacities. They will help the board to facilitate an open door policy between the board staff and cosmetology students. They will provide insight on

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the changing educational needs in cosmetology. will provide insight on the changing needs within the cosmetology industry as a whole. They will develop materials to develop students, the industry, and the public on issues relating to cosmetology. And they will, overall, help to improve the image of cosmetology in Arkansas. Each of these applicants who were chosen today to volunteer on that committee will be notified. And we'll probably set a meeting in October to bring them all together. And just so you-all know, there are two members of the board who will participate, as well. That will be Sherron West and Pat Turman. They were specifically chosen to help with this committee because they are nonexamining board members. They will not encounter the students, the currently enrolled students, when they come here to examine for licenses.

GENERAL BUSINESS

MS. POWELL: Our attorney, right now, is not here, so I guess we'll move on to the other business of the day.

I'll take up the treasurer's report, and at this time I'll go ahead and give it. At our last meeting on July 17th, we had a balance of \$164.35. There was an NIC gift purchased for the NIC conference at the

17	Advisory Committee meeting minutes. Do I have a

20	MS. POWELL: I have a motion.

22	MS. POWELL: And a second. Is there any
23	discussion?

25	MS. POWELL: All those in favor, raise your
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right hand.

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(Show of hands.)

MS. POWELL: Motion carries. Okay. Next, we have a Rater Training/School Overview update for 2006.

MS. WITTUM: Any board members who attended want to give anything on the conference that we just attended.

MR. KEENE: Rater Training or the conference?

MS. WITTUM: Oh.

MS. POWELL: We're talking about the Rater --

MS. WITTUM: Oh. We had a Rater training and school overview in August. It was very beneficial, I think, to all of the board members, especially to the ones who haven't had an opportunity to attend those as frequently.

We also need to start thinking about how we want to do the 2007 Rater training. Mary Manna from NIC, who told me at the conference, she said that they would like to go ahead and start getting that scheduled for next year. I'll need you-all to be thinking about what month next year you would like to have it. I certainly would suggest that we do it earlier than later.

MS. TRAYLOR: You mean like spring instead of

fall? 1 2. MS. WITTUM: Yes. 3 MS. POWELL: Well, I think our contract was 4 actually terminated in July, correct? 5 MS. WITTUM: Yes. 6 MS. POWELL: So we don't have to be in a rush 7 about it -- before July, certainly. So --8 COURT REPORTER: I need to interrupt just a 9 moment. My microphones are right up here. And you 10 guys are kind of talking to each other. If you 11 could, try to project your comments out here so that 12 I can hear you and it will pick up. I mean, I can 1.3 barely hear you. 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MS. TRAYLOR: It was good.

MS. WITTUM: There were a lot of good workshops, a lot of valuable information, that we brought back with us that will help us, especially now that we are moving into law revisions. We can consider, maybe, incorporating some of what we learned into these law revisions. There were several interesting occurrences that happened, but we won't point any fingers to anyone. We'll just let them, if they want to share them, to share.

MS. TRAYLOR: I thought that the food was wonderful.

22	Boozer, have a seat at the table there, and go ahead
23	and introduce yourself for the record, please.
24	(Respondent sits at table.)
25	HEARING OFFICER: Please state your name for the
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record.

MS. BOOZER: My name Boozer.

HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Thank you, Ms. Boozer.

Do you have counsel with you today?

MS. BOOZER: Yes.

HEARING OFFICER: What's their name?

MS. BOOZER: I don't know their name. I just seen them one time, so I don't know it.

HEARING OFFICER: Okay. And is the State present?

MR. JOCHUMS: Yes.

HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Who represents the State?

MR. JOCHUMS: My name is Arnold Jochums. I'll be presenting witnesses before the board this morning.

HEARING OFFICER: And Ms. Boozer, you received your order and notice of hearing today?

MS. BOOZER: Yes.

HEARING OFFICER: For the benefit of those of you who have not been through one of these proceedings before, this is an administrative hearing governed by the Administrative Procedures Act. It will be based — the board's decision will be based solely on the evidence presented here today. If you

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have any evidence that you want presented, please have it ready and present it to the board for consideration. To ensure the efficiency of this process, I'm going to grant some leniency towards the hearing proceedings to allow us to move forward efficiently. The board members know this case only as it appears in the notice or this hearing order, which you received in the mail. And all participants of the hearing should be aware that these are subject to the Freedom of Information Act. For those of you who may be called as witnesses in the current case, please raise your right hand. If everyone that is here to testify for Ms. Boozer would please raise your hand, the court reporter will swear you in.

(Witnesses sworn.)

HEARING OFFICER: Are there any exhibits that either side would like to present at this time?

MR. JOCHUMS: Madam Hearing Officer, I would like to offer what would be marked as Board's Exhibit No. 1, which consists of a cover letter from the director, the notice of hearing, and the inspection report.

HEARING OFFICER: That will be bound together admitted as Board's Exhibit No. 1.

16	that we used to have. They had carbons behind them,
17	and you would tear them off.
18	MR. JOCHUMS: I don't have any objection to them
19	being admitted.
20	HEARING OFFICER: They will be admitted.
21	(WHEREUPON, Respondent's Exhibit No. 1 to HO#07-
22	089 having been identified for the record was
23	admitted into evidence and marked to append.)
24	HEARING OFFICER: Do you have any opening
25	statements?
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MR. JOCHUMS: Just that this matter is a little different from some of the other hearing matters that we have before us today. If the board members will look at paragraphs two and three in the notice of hearing, they spell out what the -- what's being alleged.

Basically, there will be some testimony about health and safety issues, as well as, the size of the establishment and numerous other violations. I'll let -- we'll recount that with testimony, but that doesn't have to be with a licensure. She has a license. It's other issues.

HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Boozer, would you like to say anything in opening statements before we call witnesses?

MS. BOOZER: Well, all I know that's all I have to show is that. That there's everything. And the rest of it -- she's been gone for a long time, and didn't anybody else come by, inspect my shop at all. But one time. Just one time, not too long ago.

HEARING OFFICER: Okay. We'll proceed with calling witnesses. State may call their first witness.

MR. JOCHUMS: Okay. I'll call Inspector Bland.

MS. JACKSON: Good morning.

THEREUPON,

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TESTIMONY AND EVIDENCE

GIVEN ON BEHALF OF THE STATE BY

INSPECTOR PAT BLAND JACKSON,

having been called for and on behalf of the State, and having been first duly sworn to tell the truth, testified on her oath as follows, to-wit:

DIRECT EXAMINATION

BY MR. JOCHUMS:

- Q State your name.
- 11 A Pat Bland.
- 12 | Q And are you an inspector for the Cosmetology Board?
- 13 A Yes, I am.
- 14 Q Is this shop owned and operated by Vernell Boozer, located in Gurdon, Arkansas in your territory?
- 16 A Yes, sir. It is.
- Q Okay. And did you have occasion to visit the shop in June of this year?
 - A Yes, I did.
- 20 Q Okay. Had you previously visited this particular shop?
- 21 A I had been by there, and it had been closed. It took me -
- $22 \parallel I've$ had the southwest territory for five years, and Ms.
- 23 | Boozer had a P.O. Box. We couldn't locate her. I've tried to
- 24 | locate her for five years, and finally did. So that's why --
- 25 in my previous time, this salon was not inspected. And I left

a notice, but I did come by there one day and she was closed. The next time I visited, she was open.

- Q So you have -- this is first visit inside her shop?
- A Right.

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- Q Tell us about the things you saw on this visit and that are on the inspection report that the board has a copy of.
- Okay. Yes. Unfortunately, Ms. Boozer had not All right. had an inspector come by in a number of years. And while we were visiting, I asked her if her salon had always been like So I want to put that up front. And she said that it had -- in the 35 years, I think she told me, that she had been But there were several health and safety violations, and they consisted from no liquid sanitizer, no local containers for used instruments, floor space was limited. building was large enough, but it was sectioned off. And on one side she had, I believe it was, a couch and a chair. on the other side, the little space she was using to do a client's hair at that time, was very limited. I would say it was about a four by eight space. She had a little hydraulic chair in there that was the one I started using years ago, which you wind up. It didn't have the pump on it, if I'm not mistaken.

MS. BOOZER: I had two in there.

BY THE WITNESS:

A Anyway, the space was limited. And no shampoo bowl, no

cabinet for clean towels. She did have a cabinet there, but I didn't see towels stored in that.

BY MR. JOCHUMS:

- Q Did the establishment have running water?
- A Not to my knowledge. No running water.
 - Q Okay.

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- A And I asked -- there again, I asked Ms. Boozer about this, and she said the previous inspector knew all of this, all of these years, and I noted that on a report that I sent in, that it had always been like this. And I explained to her that my job, too, was just to report what I saw.
- Q Are licensees required to post health and safety --
- A Health and safety rules, yes.
- 14 | Q Did she have them posted?
- 15 A I did not see those.
- 16 MS. BOOZER: I have them.
- 17 BY MR. JOCHUMS:
 - Q Is there a regulation that specifies what kind of floor covering that you have?
 - A Non-absorbent floor covering.
 - Q And did that meet that requirement?
- 22 | A No.
- Q Were there sufficient number of closed receptacles for soiled towels?
 - A I did not see a closed receptacle, no.

- Q Did you see closed receptacles for sanitized instruments?
- A No, sir. I did not see one.
- Q And you've already talked about liquid sanitizer. Were there laundry facilities on the premises?
 - A I did not see any.
 - Q Did she have labeled containers for used instruments?
- 7 A I did not see them.

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- Q Were disinfected instruments stored in a clean covered place?
- 10 A I did not see an area for -- for that, sir.
- 11 Q Where is this? Is the shop in a house or in a --
- 12 A It's in a -- no. It is out in the country next to, I
 13 believe it's your home, Ms. Boozer?
- MS. BOOZER: Outside my home is where it's at.
- 15 BY THE WITNESS:
- A And it's a building. You know, just like a shop building, but it's not attached to the home.
- 18 BY MR. JOCHUMS:
 - Q Okay. It's free standing, then?
- 20 A Right.
- Q Okay. Is there anything else that you think the board should know about your observations?
- 23 | A No, sir.
- 24 | Q Okay.
- 25 MR. JOCHUMS: I have no other questions for this

1 witness. 2. HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Boozer, do you want to ask 3 the Inspector any questions? 4 MS. BOOZER: Well, -- I have taken care of a lot 5 of things on that paper -- I didn't know. 6 HEARING OFFICER: But do you have any questions 7 you would like to ask her about her inspection? 8 MS. BOOZER: Well, about how much I have to pay. 9 I don't think I should have to pay all that. Pay 10 anything. 11 HEARING OFFICER: But Ms. Boozer, right now --12 do you have any questions? That's all I want right 1.3 now. Do you have any questions? MS. BOOZER: Do I have to pay that amount, 14 15 what's on the --16 MR. JOCHUMS: Let's go ahead and call another 17 witness. 18 HEARING OFFICER: Yes. Okay. We'll let you 19 have your chance to say --2.0 MS. BOOZER: Yes, ma'am. 21 HEARING OFFICER: -- all of that. We're moving 22 2.3 MS. BOOZER: Do I have any questions --24 HEARING OFFICER: -- on to the next witness. 25 MS. BOOZER: Do I have any questions --

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MR. JOCHUMS: We'll call Kathy Wittum. 1 MS. BOOZER: I have taken care of some of that 2. 3 stuff already, that was down on the paper. taken care of that already. 4 5 HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Ms. Boozer, we'll give 6 you a chance in just a minute to explain what all 7 you've done, okay? 8 MS. BOOZER: Yeah. 9 HEARING OFFICER: We're going to move on to the State's next witness. 10 11 THEREUPON, 12 TESTIMONY AND EVIDENCE 1.3 GIVEN ON BEHALF OF THE STATE BY 14 KATHY WITTUM, 15 having been called for and on behalf of the 16 State, and having been first duly sworn to tell the 17 truth, testified on her oath as follows, to-wit: DIRECT EXAMINATION 18 BY MR. JOCHUMS: 19 2.0 Ms. Wittum, you are the executive director? 21 Α Yes. 22 And based on information the Inspector brought in, sent 2.3 in, to you -- you issue notices of violation of codes? 24 Yes, sir. Α 25 And in this case, you also issued the ultimate notice of

hearing?

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- A Yes.
- Q I notice that in paragraph four of the notice of hearing, you recommend a penalty of \$525.00 be assessed.
 - A Yes, sir.
 - Q Would you explain to the board the way you came upon that number?
 - A This is based upon each of the instances where Inspector Pat had noted that the salon was not in compliance. I took the fee schedules that the board typically goes by, and applied each of those instances of non-compliance to the appropriate fee and determined that it was \$525.00.
 - Q And in the notice of hearing, you set out a money amount for each, with the first one being \$25.00 for violation of Rule 4.2(C)(1)?
- 16 | A Yes.
- 17 | Q And each one subsequently?
- 18 A Yes.
- Q To your knowledge, has this individual or her salon ever been before the board?
 - A According to the file that we have on this establishment, Vernell's Beauty Shop, she has not been brought before the board. There were two copies of inspection reports in the file, where Ms. Jackson noted that she missed the respondent.

 One is dated July 21, '05. The other is dated December 9, '05.

When we looked at this record on our computer system, we found that's there been — it appears to be a total of five inspections. Two of the inspections, one occurring April 13, '99, and another August 18, '99, neither indicating who the inspector was that went to the salon to do those inspections. The other three do indicate that Ms. Jackson was the inspector. One was April 18, '02; one December 9, '05; and then this one of June 23, '06 that has brought us here today.

- Q Did you have a chance to look at the respondent's exhibit?
- 10 A Yes.

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- 11 Q I'm going to pass it around in a minute, but are each of 12 these ten documents an older form of the cosmetology license?
- 13 A Yes.
- Q And did many of them, on the left side, have a place for inspection report?
- 16 | A Yes.
- Q Does it appear that all of these date from between '97 and -- it looks like sometime in the 80s?
 - A Yes.
- 20 | Q '82, perhaps?
- 21 A Yes.
- 22 Q And that was before you were computerized?
- A I don't know if the office was computerized during that
 whole time, but I know that the information is not all in the
 computer even if they were.

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1	Q I see.
2	MR. JOCHUMS: I have no other questions of this
3	witness.
4	HEARING OFFICER: Do you have other witnesses?
5	MR. JOCHUMS: No, I have no other witnesses.
6	HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Boozer, do you have any
7	witnesses that you would like to call? Anybody that
8	could testify for you?
9	MS. BOOZER: What her.
10	MS. WILLIS: She has been there all those many
11	years and nobody, it's like they said, no one have
12	been to visit.
13	HEARING OFFICER: Can I get your name?
14	MS. WILLIS: Ms. Willis.
15	HEARING OFFICER: Willis?
16	MS. WILLIS: Uh-huh.
17	HEARING OFFICER: And what is your first name,
18	Ms. Willis?
19	MS. WILLIS: Leanna.
20	HEARING OFFICER: Ma'am?
21	MS. WILLIS: Leanna.
22	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. And Ms. Boozer, what
23	are your questions for Ms. Willis?
24	MS. BOOZER: Well, in December the one in
25	2005, I didn't see anybody to come to my shop in 2005

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-- in December. And in July '05, haven't seen nobody. No letter left, no nothing, no report left in my shop at all.

HEARING OFFICER: But Ms. Boozer, do you have any questions for your witness?

MS. BOOZER: That's -- no.

HEARING OFFICER: And we'll give you a chance in a just minute to make your statement, okay?

MS. BOOZER: Okay.

HEARING OFFICER: If you have no other witnesses, you can, at this time, go ahead and say what you would like to say to the board.

MS. BOOZER: It's my time now?

HEARING OFFICER: It is your time now.

MS. BOOZER: Okay. In 2005 in December, I didn't see anybody. No letter left at my shop at all. In April, wasn't nobody left no note there. I didn't see nobody -- in 2005. Nobody -- un 2005. And in '02, two inspection sheets. There wasn't nothing left there at my shop. So I still didn't know nothing about this. Now, how come two -- December 2005, why they didn't leave no slip to let me know they been by? I didn't see anything. Didn't know nothing. Except in July 2005, they said they left it at my shop. All I know is the one that was

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1	left there. I was gone. And the last time she came.
2	That's the only time I know. I don't know nothing
3	about them other two. That's all I have to say.
4	HEARING OFFICER: Would the board like to ask
5	any questions of Ms. Boozer?
6	MR. JOCHUMS: Let me ask a couple of questions.
7	Are you you've been there 35 years?
8	MS. BOOZER: Yes, sir. All my life.
9	MR. JOCHUMS: All your life.
10	MS. BOOZER: Yeah.
11	MR. JOCHUMS: Are you now do you have regular

15	MS. BOOZER: Yes.
16	MR. JOCHUMS: How many days a week?
17	MS. BOOZER: About every day, day and night.
18	MR. JOCHUMS: How big a town is Gurdon?
19	MS. BOOZER: It's a little small town.
20	MS. JACKSON: You're actually at Curtis, aren't
21	you?
22	MS. BOOZER: Curtis, uh-huh.
23	MR. JOCHUMS: I have nothing further.
24	HEARING OFFICER: We'll proceed to closing
25	arguments. State, do you have any closing arguments
	Teresa Iden, CCR

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at this time?

MR. JOCHUMS: I believe that we have presented testimony to show violations of numerous health and safety rules and regulations of the board. At this point, essentially, the decision is whether the fine should be as proposed or in some other amount. I'll leave that to the board's discretion. Thank you.

HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Boozer, --

MS. BOOZER: Yes?

HEARING OFFICER: -- would you like to make a closing statement to the board?

MS. BOOZER: Well, as far as I know -- how much I have to pay? That's all I want to know. Do I have to pay anything -- or nothing? I don't know.

HEARING OFFICER: Okay. At this time the record will be closed and the board will recess for deliberations, and we'll go back on the record for the board's decision.

(WHEREUPON, discussion and deliberations were had by the board, after which proceedings resumed as follows, to-wit:)

HEARING OFFICER: We'll go back on record at this time for a motion.

MS. POWELL: Do I hear a motion?

MS. PICKERING: Okay. I would like to make a

MS. PICKERING: Oh, it's not? Okay. But the others -- the running water, hot and cold water, and the shampoo bowl -- that she be closed or we give her 30 days, let me rephrase that.

HEARING OFFICER: We need to have one or the other.

MS. PICKERING: The first one.

HEARING OFFICER: A definite motion.

MS. PICKERING: The first one.

HEARING OFFICER: So your motion is -- so everybody is clear and we'll make a clear record here. That she will close shop until she meets the standards of running water and a shampoo bowl?

MS. PICKERING: Yes. Running water and a shampoo bowl.

HEARING OFFICER: Okay.

MS. PICKERING: Hot and cold water.

MS. POWELL: What do you want to do with the

other health and safety issues that are here in the 1 2. report? 3 Include those. MS. PICKERING: MS. POWELL: To include those? 4 5 HEARING OFFICER: So the motion would be close 6 her down until she gets hot and cold running water, a 7 shampoo bowl, and addresses the other health and 8 safety issues stated in the inspection report. 9 MS. WEST: I second. I have a motion and a second to 10 MS. POWELL: 11 close Ms. Boozer's salon until all reported health 12 and safety issues are addressed, and she has hot and 1.3 cold running water, and a shampoo bowl in her 14 facilities. Is there any discussion? 15 Madam President, would this include MS. TURMAN: 16 the \$525.00 fine? We are going -- is this included 17 in your motion, Anne? 18 MS. POWELL: It was not included in your motion. 19 MS. PICKERING: No. 2.0 MS. TURMAN: Thank you. 21 MS. POWELL: Is there any further discussion? 22 MS. GORDON: What about the fine? Is it going 2.3 to sit as is, or will it be --24 MR. JOCHUMS: Not in --25 MS. POWELL: It was not addressed.

MS. GORDON: That was my question. 1 2. MS. POWELL: Yes. It wasn't addressed. Okay. All those in favor, raise your right hand. 3 (Show of hands.) 4 5 MS. POWELL: All those opposed? 6 (Show of hands.) 7 MS. POWELL: The motion is denied. 8 MS. TURMAN: Madam President, I would like to 9 make a motion that we fine the respondent \$525.00. 10 We close the shop until she meets all the rules and 11 regulations, all the health and safety regulations 12 addressed. 1.3 MS. TRAYLOR: I second. MS. POWELL: I have a motion and a second that 14 15 Ms. Boozer's salon be shut down, that her civil 16 penalty be \$525.00, and that she would further cease 17 and desist until the shampoo bowl, and hot and cold running water, and all other health and safety issues 18 19 are addressed that are in this report. 20 Is there any discussion? 21 (No response.) 22 MS. POWELL: All those in favor, raise your 2.3 right hand. Please let me do the count. 24 (Show of hands.) 25 MS. POWELL: All those opposed?

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(Show of hands.)

MS. POWELL: Motion carries.

(Pause.)

MS. BOOZER: Look here.

HEARING OFFICER: Go ahead.

MS. BOOZER: If I be shut down, I can't put no water in my shop. I ain't have no money to do it with. Let me go ahead and work, so I can fix my shop up so I can have running water and cold water. If I don't work, I can't put nothing in there. If y'all don't mind.

(Pause.)

MS. BOOZER: If y'all don't mind. I need to work. I can't put that water and cold water in my shop — hot water and cold water. Everything else is fixed up, except the water. All the rest, everything on the list except for water. I can fix that if I can work. Let me work so I can put that hot water and cold water in the shop, if y'all don't mind.

(Pause.)

HEARING OFFICER: I believe --

MS. BOOZER: I need to work.

HEARING OFFICER: -- the motion, at this point, has passed. It was not a unanimous decision, but it was a majority decision. It will be reduced to

writing and service will be made on all the parties. 1 2. If the respondent cares to appeal, this decision can 3 be appealed under the Arkansas Administrative 4 Procedures Act 25-15-201. 5 If there are no other questions or comments, 6 this hearing is concluded and the record of this 7 hearing is closed. 8 MS. WITTUM: Ms. Boozer? 9 MS. BOOZER: Yes. 10 MS. WITTUM: We're making copies of the 11 inspection reports that you sent up here. 12 MS. BOOZER: Uh-huh. 1.3 MS. WITTUM: So if you'll just wait -- wait 14 outside the room, we'll bring the originals back down 15 to you. 16 (Pause.) 17 HEARING ORDER NO. 07-021: JUDY IVIE 18 HEARING OFFICER: Judy Ivie. This is 07-021. 19 (Respondent comes forward.) 20 HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Ivie, please state your 21 name for the record. 22 MS. IVIE: Judy Ivie. 2.3 HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Ivie, do you have counsel 24 here today? 25 MS. IVIE: No, ma'am.

HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Mr. Jochums, is counsel 1 2. for the State ready? 3 MR. JOCHUMS: Yes, ma'am. HEARING OFFICER: Are there any exhibits that 4 you would like to introduce at this time? 5 6 MR. JOCHUMS: Yes. I would like to make Board 7 Exhibit 1, a bulk exhibit including a conveyance 8 letter from the director, the notice of hearing, and 9 the document entitled, "Inspection Report." 10 (WHEREUPON, Board's Exhibit No. 1 to HO#07-021 11 having been identified for the record, was received 12 into evidence and marked to append.) 1.3 HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Any further exhibits? MR. JOCHUMS: I also want to incorporate by 14 15 reference the board regulations, rules, and statutes. 16 (WHEREUPON, Board's Exhibit No. 2 to HO#07-021 17 having been identified for the record as the statues 18 and rules of the board governing the hearing, were 19 incorporated into the record and made a part hereof 2.0 by reference.) 21 HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Ms. Ivie, do you have 22 any exhibits you'd like to present? 2.3 MS. IVIE: No, ma'am. 24 HEARING OFFICER: And just to make sure we've 25 got it at one time, everybody who is going to be a

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witness today just go ahead and raise your hand.

We'll get everybody sworn in right now, and we don't
have to do it later. So if you're going to be a

witness at any point today, raise your right hand so
we can have the reporter swear you all in and get

MR. JOCHUMS: Okay. Inspector Caudle.

 - A EPA-registered disinfectant wasn't completely covering the implements. They must be totally immersed before use on a client for at least ten minutes. They needed to change some of their solutions when they were foggy and dirty. There were some that were cloudy and dirty. They need to place their used
- 25 implements in labeled containers and place disinfected

implements in a clean covered place. The drawer is fine, as 1 2 long as it's clean and labeled. Their drawers were dirty. And 3 they need to clean and disinfect their clippers. 4 Have you previously inspected this establishment? 5 No, sir. I just took over this county. Α 6 0 So, it's new to you? 7 Α Yes. 8 Those were the only items that you noted? 9 Α Yes, sir. 10 That you cited? 11 Yes, sir. Α 12 Q Thank you. 1.3 MR. JOCHUMS: I have no other questions. 14 HEARING OFFICER: Do you have any questions for 15 the inspector? 16 The only thing that I was curious of MS. IVIE: 17

-- and I realize that I did not have everything stored the way I should. The clippers -- on the clippers, do you have to put those away after every haircut? Or are you allowed to clean them and leave them laying out?

They're supposed to be cleaned, MS. CAUDLE: disinfected, and then stored in a clean, covered place.

MS. IVIE: Between each --

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MS. CAUDLE: Yes, ma'am. 1 2. MS. IVIE: -- each person? 3 MS. CAUDLE: Between each person, yes, ma'am. 4 All right. MS. IVIE: Okay. 5 HEARING OFFICER: Does the board have any 6 questions of this witness? 7 (No response.) HEARING OFFICER: Call your next witness. 8 9 MR. JOCHUMS: I call Kathy Wittum. THEREUPON, 10 11 TESTIMONY AND EVIDENCE 12 GIVEN ON BEHALF OF THE STATE BY 1.3 KATHY WITTUM, 14 having been called for and on behalf of the 15 State, and having been first duly sworn to tell the 16 truth, testified on her oath as follows, to-wit: 17 DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. JOCHUMS: 18 19 Ms. Wittum, you're the executive director? 2.0 Α Yes. 21 And you prepared the notice of hearing? 22 Α Yes. 2.3 Have you suggested a civil penalty in this matter, and how 24 did you derive it? The suggested penalty is \$325.00. That's based on 25

the infractions that were noted by Inspector Caudle, and it's in line with the fee schedule that the board has typically used in the past.

Q The -- I notice that most of those are \$25.00. I also see a \$50 -- and a \$150 penalty. Explain what that goes with.

A The \$150.00 penalty is for Rule 4.2(C)(22)(b)(2). And that is referring to non-electrical instruments that have not been disinfected or not properly immersed for ten minutes in an EPA-registered disinfectant.

MR. JOCHUMS: I have no other questions.

HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Ivie, would you like to ask this witness any questions?

MS. IVIE: No, because I feel like I'm just here asking for leniency because I feel like that I was not up to the standard that I should have been.

HEARING OFFICER: Does the board have any questions?

(Pause.)

MR. JOCHUMS: Well, let me ask you, ma'am. You said, when you first came up to the table, I was guilty of several of these things. Which things?

MS. IVIE: I was guilty of the clippers, not properly doing those. I did -- we thought we were right on having a place on our back bar to put the dirty brushes and the water -- I mean, cleaner, and

3 though I had the Barbicide in, it was cloudy. Are you a cosmetologist? 4 MR. JOCHUMS: 5 MS. IVIE: Yes, sir. 6 MR. JOCHUMS: And you have several other people 7 working for you in your shop? 8 MS. IVIE: Well, this is something that I -- we 9 just didn't think about. We -- I've been in business 10 for 18 years with another -- with Diane Hennessy, but 11 the shop license were written in my name instead of -12 - so I -- there's -- we have three co-owners, but the 1.3 license are in my name. I'm going to rectify that. 14 We're going to straighten all that up, too, now that 15 I know that we need to. 16 MR. JOCHUMS: I have no other questions. 17 HEARING OFFICER: Do you have any witnesses you 18 would like to call on your behalf? 19 MS. IVIE: Other than my other two partners 2.0 here, that's about it. 21 HEARING OFFICER: Would you like for them to say 22 anything? 2.3 MS. IVIE: Oh, and my husband. 24 MR. IVIE: I would like to say thing, ma'am. 25 All of these violations have been corrected since she Teresa Iden, CCR (501) 261-1106

then we had a place to store them in the back until

they dried. But my solution for my combs, even

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got the violations.

HEARING OFFICER: Would you please state your name for the record, sir?

MR. IVIE: My name is Ron Ivie.

HEARING OFFICER: Please state your name before you speak so we can get it on the record.

MS. NAPIER: I'm Delores Napier. And I was just curious as to why that we didn't have a chance to rectify this before we had the penalty put on us. And I know that particular day, I was extremely busy when she came in. And it makes it sound like the shop is a dirty shop, and it's -- it's not. But Judy said, we were guilty of the some of the instances, like my clippers were out. And I had been using them, and they weren't cleaned up. I have to admit that was so. And also, at the time, I had four people in there. I was giving a permanent, and I had three in there that I was trying to get out. I was And I'm also guilty of having my brushes and behind. They were on the back of my station, used combs. instead of having them in a drawer as I should've. But I had to stand, you know, guilty with my part of

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it also.

HEARING OFFICER: Thank you.

MS. NAPIER: It's good to come down here and meet you ladies, and see what goes on, because I've never come in before.

HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Ivie, would you like to say anything else?

MS. IVIE: Other than what my husband said, we do have marked containers now with all of our brushes and combs and things adequately marked. I did have my brushes in the drawer, but I did have the drawer open so hair did get in there. I had my clippers laying over, so -- we have gotten -- I've got a drawer that I store my clippers in now. And I closed the drawers on my station. So I feel like that we've weighed up to the standard that you -- and again, I should've had it.

HEARING OFFICER: Does the board have any questions for Ms. Ivie?

MS. TURMAN: Ms. Ivie, once again, I'm going to recommend -- we -- I read this rules and regulations, and our law every time before I come to the board meeting. I'm going to suggest that as you are -- and I know that you've been in cosmetology for a long time, but --

HEARING OFFICER: And would counsel for the 1 2. State introduce yourself? 3 MR. JOCHUMS: I'm Arnold Jochums. I'll be presenting this to the board for the State. 4 5 HEARING OFFICER: Preliminary matters, Mr. 6 Jochums? 7 MR. JOCHUMS: Yes. If we could make Board 8 Exhibit 1, the letter of conveyance, notice of 9 hearing, and the inspection report. There's also an 10 establishment relocation packet that's included in 11 this bulk exhibit. 12 Any further exhibits? HEARING OFFICER: 1.3 MR. JOCHUMS: And I would ask you to incorporate 14 the statutes, rules and regulations, as well. 15 HEARING OFFICER: Those exhibits will be 16 admitted. 17 (WHEREUPON, Board's Exhibit No. 1 to HO#07-380 18 having been identified, was admitted into evidence 19 and marked to append, while Board's Exhibit No. 2 was 2.0 incorporated by reference into the record and made a 21 part hereof.) 22 HEARING OFFICER: Mr. Elliott, do you have any 2.3 exhibits that you would like to be admitted? 24 MR. ELLIOTT: No. Only -- all I have are some

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wrong addresses that the office sent notifications

to.

HEARING OFFICER: Opening statements?

MR. JOCHUMS: I just want to say that this particular case is not a health and safety case. It's a matter of operating with an expired license, so it's a different scenario. And I just want to make the board aware of that.

HEARING OFFICER: All right. Mr. Elliott, would you like to make an opening statement to the board?

MR. ELLIOTT: Well, I thought I had my license. I went down January 9th to change my shop location address and to pay my license fees for my personal and shop. And -- I thought I had it. I mean, every year -- I've done this for 29 years before and I've always just written one check. I've never had to write two checks. So I thought I had it, and I didn't realize I had it until the inspector found it at the new shop. And then she's the one that caught it instantly. So within 30 minutes, I went down there and paid my fees.

HEARING OFFICER: Mr. Jochums, call your first witness.

MR. JOCHUMS: Yes.

THEREUPON,

TESTIMONY AND EVIDENCE

ELLIOTT: Well, I think I shouldn't be fined 7 anything because in all good fairness, I went down to 8 the office to pay my fees like I've done every year 9 for 29 years. And I thought I had them. I thought I 10 paid for them in that payment. The payment was 11 larger than normal, so I just assumed that the prices 12 had gone up. Here's my total, and whenever you ask a 1.3 total on an amount, I would assume the total was 14 adding license fees to license fees. 22	that we have Shaunta explain the the process that
23	she would've taken in taking his payment.
24	MS. BELMONT: Well, when Mr. Elliott came in
25	MR. JOCHUMS: Please state your name.
	Teresa Iden, CCR

MS. BELMONT: Oh, Shaunta Belmont. I work at the front desk. When Mr. Elliott came in, he just needed a relocation on his shop, which is \$50. The prices had changed.

MR. ELLIOTT: No.

MS. BELMONT: It's \$50.00 -- \$30.00 for the authorization and \$20.00 for the new license fee. That's why he wasn't charged an additional \$20.00 for his license, because that is part of the relocation fee.

I don't ask people, usually, when they come in, did you renew your personal license? It's not my responsibility, so it wasn't done.

MS. PICKERING: But you personally --

MR. ELLIOTT: I assumed it was.

MS. PICKERING: -- told him that there was a \$30.00 transfer fee --

MR. ELLIOTT: No, she didn't tell me that.

MS. BELMONT: I told him it was a \$50.00 fee for relocation. That's it. When you come in to do a process, like say you're there for a student enrollment. I don't ask you anything but to do the student enrollment. If you come in for a relocation, I do the relocation. I don't add on and ask you what else you need to do or anything like that.

MS. PICKERING: All right. That clears that up 1 2. for me in my mind. Thank you. 3 HEARING OFFICER: Any other questions from the 4 board? 5 MS. PICKERING: One more. How long did you say 6 you had had a shop? 7 MR. ELLIOTT: This will be my 30th year. MS. PICKERING: 30th year, and you've never 8 9 failed to --10 MR. ELLIOTT: I've never had a violation of any 11 kind. 12 HEARING OFFICER: Are there any further 1.3 questions for Mr. Elliott, --14 MS. GORDON: I have a question. Normally, don't 15 you post the license, --16 MR. ELLIOTT: Yes. 17 MS. GORDON: -- along with the shop? 18 MR. ELLIOTT: You know, the shop was still under 19 construction. I just pinned it up on the bulletin 20 board. I didn't look at it. I just quit looking 21 after -- at them after 25, 30 years. I just pinned 22 it up. The inspector's the one that figured it out. 2.3 HEARING OFFICER: Yes, Ms. Ward? 24 MS. WARD: Since you didn't receive it, why 25 didn't you call the board and ask them about it?

It's usually pretty cut and dried. MS. PICKERING: But you said you pinned it up. What did you pin up? What did you think you were MR. ELLIOTT: My shop license and personal

MS. PICKERING: -- transfer of location, that's 1 what you thought was both of them? 2. 3 MR. ELLIOTT: Uh-huh. MS. PICKERING: You just opened that and pinned 4 5 them up on the bulletin board? Okay. 6 HEARING OFFICER: Are there any further 7 questions? 8 (NO RESPONSE.) 9 HEARING OFFICER: If there are no further 10 questions, we'll move to closing statements. 11 MR. JOCHUMS: I'll waive closing. 12 HEARING OFFICER: Mr. Elliott, would you like to 1.3 say anything in closing? 14 MR. ELLIOTT: Nothing else. 15 HEARING OFFICER: That will close this portion 16 of the hearing. We'll go off the record for the 17 board to deliberate and come back on record with a 18 motion. MR. ELLIOTT: I have one more comment. There are so many clerical errors. You guys can't even get your addresses straight in your stuff. I think you need to work on that. You say your staff has a problem? I say they have a problem, they don't understand. They can't even get the address change right on here.

(Pause.)

HEARING OFFICER: Are there any other comments? (No response.)

HEARING OFFICER: Hearing none, the record is now closed. Thank you, Mr. Elliott.

(Respondent exits room.)

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE UPDATE: REGIONAL MEETINGS

MS. POWELL: At this time, I'm going to ask Kent Walker to come up and give an update on our legislative regional committee meetings.

MR. WALKER: Good morning, every one.

BOARD MEMBERS: (In unison) Good morning.

MR. WALKER: I'm here this morning to give you

an update of what transpired at the four meetings we had statewide, in dealing with both the revision of the code and for -- possibly, for rules and regs.

All that being stated, I wanted to give a quick synopsis of the subject areas we went through. And then maybe, take any questions up to that point.

There's been nothing concrete developed in terms of what we will put forth before the board, to try to say, let's look at these areas in particular, and let's make these suggestions, and I think that in January we should pass this. I don't think we're at that stage yet. I think every one on the board has received a synopsis of both the meetings and a summary of the topics in particular about what was brought up — or the topics that we brought forth to the various sites across the state.

We started here, in Little Rock, went to West
Memphis, Fayetteville, and Texarkana — is how we
ended those meetings. And I think in the course of
those meetings, we were able to solicit a varied, of
course geographical viewpoints, of people across the
state. I think in particular from both school owners
and practitioners, as well. And from what I have
seen and what I have witnessed, I believe we've
gotten a very good idea of the areas in which both

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practitioners and also, again, the schools are looking to have revisions, and looking to the board to make those changes.

And I'll have to think back, but I believe every one of the board attended at least one meeting, which I thought was very positive. And every one has some first-hand experience of what was going on at these various meetings statewide.

So at this point, I'll just open it up to any questions that the board may have on the way it works, and how we're going to proceed at this point.

MS. POWELL: Ms. Turman.

MS. TURMAN: Madam President, I would like to say thank you. I think it's been very important to have gotten the feedback that we have for the board members, and Kent, and Jane and the people that served on this committee, I think they've been outstanding. And I just wanted to say thank you for all the hard work that everybody's done on this. I think it's been wonderful.

MR. WALKER: Thank you.

MS. POWELL: Mr. Keene?

MR. KEENE: When might we expect a more formal kind of synopsis of what occurred in the meetings?

And what I'm asking for is the ideas that were

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brought up at the meetings -- maybe, I know that some of the same issues were talked about at all the meetings and some were different.

MR. WALKER: Correct.

MR. KEENE: I'm curious to know, since I only attended one meeting here in Little Rock, what all came up in the other meetings around the state, and more of a grouping?

MR. WALKER: Right. I believe Ms. Wittum and I are working on a synopsis of that. I think due to unforeseen circumstances in her family this week, it would have been presented to you today. I can tell you I know we're going to work on it this week, so it should be with you this week. And the reason we don't have a more formal, I think, presentation, now, too, is because is I think the board members should have had the opportunity to digest the synopsis that you so envision. I think when everyone is on the same page, in terms of discussion that was had, ideas that were brought forth, then I think everyone can make more of a valid decision about what the practitioners and school owners are thinking. that make sense? I hope I answered your question, but it should be very soon.

MR. KEENE: Okay. Thank you.

MS. PICKERING: I want to comment. May I comment?

MR. WALKER: Yes.

MS. PICKERING: I'm one of the members of that particular board. I attended all four meetings, and we did have a lot of the same input in every meeting. I thought all four meetings went well. I think we were received very well. The questions were wonderful. I mean, we had a form that we handed out and we stuck pretty close to that. Then after we got through with what was on our agenda, Kent opened it up to the floor. So I think all four meetings went very, very well.

MR. WALKER: I think if anyone has had any issue, whether it's on the agenda or otherwise, there was opportunity for them to bring it forward. I wanted to get some kind of open feedback. I think it worked. I appreciate that. Did you want to comment on the synopsis? I didn't mean to put words in your mouth.

MS. WITTUM: No. You didn't. You took care of it.

MR. WALKER: Okay.

MS. WITTUM: One thing that probably will happen next is the legislative committee will meet to kind

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of put together what they want to put to the board for recommendations. So the legislative committee will probably be meeting in the very near future to do that.

MR. WALKER: Are there any other questions? (No response.)

MS. WITTUM: That was easy.

MR. WALKER: I wish I had some cases that were like this.

(Chorus of laughter.)

MR. WALKER: I will look forward to see you-all again soon. And again, feel free to contact me if you have any questions about how we're proceeding. I mean, obviously this — the whole point of doing this was to create open dialogue with the board and the state and maintain that as we go along. And hopefully, as we bring forth these revisions, everyone, I hope, will participate actively.

Thank you-all.

MS. POWELL: Thank you, Mr. Walker. At this time, I think we're going to take about a 15 minute break.

HEARING OFFICER: Ceceila Vaughn will the next hearing up when we return from break.

(WHEREUPON, short break was taken, after which

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the proceedings resumed as follows, to-wit:) 1 HEARING ORDER NO. 07-073: CECELIA VAUGHN 2. 3 AND HEARING ORDER NO. 07-075: RHONDA BRASSART 4 5 MS. POWELL: I'll call the meeting back to 6 order. 7 HEARING OFFICER: The matter now before us is 8 07-073, Cecelia Vaughn and a related matter 07-075, 9 Rhonda Brassart. Are the respondents present? 10 Please identify yourself for the record. 11 MS. VAUGHN: Cecelia Vaughn. 12 MS. BRASSART: And Rhonda Brassart. 1.3 HEARING OFFICER: And the counsel for the board? MR. JOCHUMS: My name is Arnold Jochums. 14 15 be presenting this matter to the board. 16 HEARING OFFICER: Everybody has been sworn in. 17 Are there any preliminary matters, Mr. Jochums? MR. JOCHUMS: Yes. In 07-073, Cecelia Vaughn, I 18 19 want to make a bulk exhibit, Board's Exhibit 1, the 2.0 conveyance letter, the notice of hearing, and the 21 inspection report by Ms. Caudle. 22 HEARING OFFICER: That will be admitted. 2.3 (WHEREUPON, Board's Exhibit No. 1 to HO#07-073 having been identified, was admitted into evidence 24 25 and marked to append.)

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MR. JOCHUMS: I also want to incorporate by reference the board's regulations.

HEARING OFFICER: Those will also be admitted.

(WHEREUPON, Board's Exhibit No. 2 to HO#07-073 having been identified for the record as the statues and rules of the board governing the hearing, were incorporated into the record and made a part hereof by reference.)

MR. JOCHUMS: I need to make a motion with regard to 07-073, Ceceila Vaughn, and that is to amend by interlineation on paragraph five. It now reads "\$300 for Rule 4.25(A)." I believe that's a typo. It should read, "4.2(A)."

HEARING OFFICER: If there are no objections to that motion --

(No response.)

HEARING OFFICER: -- it will be granted.

MR. JOCHUMS: And in regard to Rhonda Brassart,
Matter 07-075, I'd also like to amend by
interlineation paragraph one, which now reads,
"Respondent is licensed by the Arkansas State Board
of Cosmetology as a cosmetologist in Benton, AR."
That should read, "as a manicurist in Benton, AR."

So I'd make that amendment. And we'd also make the same change in the violation section in paragraph

five, replacing "4.25(A)." with "4.2(A)."

HEARING OFFICER: If there are no objections, those will be granted and that would amend 07-073, paragraph five. It will now read "\$300 for Rule 4.2(A)." And in 07-075, paragraph one, instead of a "licensed cosmetologist", that should be "manicurist". And in paragraph five of the same complaint, "\$300 for Rule 4.2(A)." Done by interlinearly motion.

MR. JOCHUMS: Madam Hearing Officer, I don't believe I asked to make Board Exhibit 1 in 075, the conveyance letter, notice of hearing, and inspection report. In fact, this is actually the same inspection report in 073.

HEARING OFFICER: Those will be admitted as exhibits.

(WHEREUPON, Board's Exhibit No. 1 to HO#07-075 having been identified, was admitted into evidence and marked to append.)

MR. JOCHUMS: And in 07-075, I'd incorporate by reference the regulations of the board.

HEARING OFFICER: And that, too, will be admitted.

(WHEREUPON, Board's Exhibit No. 2 to HO#07-075 having been identified for the record as the statues

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and rules of the board governing the hearing, were incorporated into the record and made a part hereof by reference.)

HEARING OFFICER: Anything further?
MR. JOCHUMS: No.

HEARING OFFICER: Anything you'd like to introduce as exhibits, either of you, Ms. Vaughn or Ms. Brassart?

MS. BRASSART: I do. I have my State Board of Massage Therapy License and my daughter's birth certificate.

HEARING OFFICER: Those will be admitted if there are no objections from the board?

MR. JOCHUMS: No.

(WHEREUPON, Respondent's Exhibit No. 1 to HO#07-075 having been identified for the record was admitted into evidence and marked to append.)

HEARING OFFICER: Opening statements?

MR. JOCHUMS: May it please the board, in this case we would present testimony from the inspector that she visited Pure Bliss Day Spa and Salon in late May of this year. There she observed Rhonda Brassart, who is a manicurist, performing cosmetological services. And that's how the two cases are related. Cecelia Vaughn, shop owner, and

the person who was doing -- according to the 1 2. allegations, work outside the scope of her license. 3 And Cecelia is charged with allowing her to do that 4 work outside the scope of her license. These are 5 health and safety violation allegations. Thank you. 6 HEARING OFFICER: Would either of you like to 7 make a statement -- or both of you, if you wish. 8 MS. VAUGHN: Well, this is my daughter. And she 9 was pulling hair through a cap on her daughter's 10 hair. She was not being paid. I don't see the 11 problem there. 12 HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Brassart, would you like 1.3 to make an opening statement? MS. BRASSART: Uhm -- well. It's the same 14 15 thing. I mean, she was my daughter, and I do lots of 16 things to her. The other allegations about me doing 17 facials, I have my massage license. And I am 18 regulated through the Massage Board. 19 HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Mr. Jochums, you may 2.0 call your first witness. 21 MR. JOCHUMS: I call Inspector Caudle. 22 MS. CAUDLE: Yes, sir. 2.3 THEREUPON, 24 TESTIMONY AND EVIDENCE 25 GIVEN ON BEHALF OF THE STATE BY

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INSPECTOR SHEILA CAUDLE,

having been called for and on behalf of the State, and having been first duly sworn to tell the truth, testified on her oath as follows, to-wit:

DIRECT EXAMINATION

BY MR. JOCHUMS:

- Q You are testifying before this before this board that you are a board inspector?
- A That's correct.
- Q Tell us about your visit to Pure Bliss Day Spa and Salon.
- On May 31st, I done an inspection at Pure Bliss Day Spa on South Street in Benton. And when I walked in, Rhonda was pulling hair through a cap and she did tell me that it was her daughter. I told her that she was only a licensed manicurist and she could not perform cosmetological services in a salon, whether it was her daughter or not, unless she was licensed in that field if she was doing it in a licensed facility. I told them that they would just have to talk to the board about it, because I don't set those laws. They would just have to come and be heard before the board and let the board make a ruling on that. Also, there was a microderm abrasion type machine set up in the back room. It was called a Universal 8-in-1 I asked Cecelia who was using the machine. Dermisystem. said no one was using it, but the room was completely set up: towels; products -- Provonia Botanica, I think, was the name of

the product that was set up, there was a complete line; implements. And then on the appointment book, Rhonda had facials listed: Tuesday, March 4, at 9:15; and on Wednesday, May 31, at 5:00; and then one on the 4th that says "massage and facial"; and one on the 31st, which was the day I was there. It said facial-manicure. Several appointments did not list what the services were that were being provided, and also there was a health and safety thing to post the health and safety poster in the reception area, and place used implements in labeled containers.

- Q Have you visited this facility before?
- 12 A I have.

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- 13 | Q Okay. And how many stations are there?
- 14 | A Stations?
- 15 Q Maybe that's the wrong term?
- A I don't know how many is set up. I'll have to sit here
 and try to visualize the salon in my mind, but --
- 18 | O More than five?
- 19 A One, two -- counting the manicure station, I think there
 20 is five.
 - Q And did you look for a health and safety poster?
- 22 A Yes, I did.
- 23 Q And you didn't see one?
- 24 | A I didn't see one.
 - Q Okay. Now, what -- what was in the prepared --

Used implements, brushes, combs -- that had not yet been 1 Α 2 disinfected. They were laying on the station. And some 3 manicuring implements, as well. 4 And had you visited this salon before? 5 Α Yes, sir. About when, do you remember? 6 7 It was too long ago. 8 Q Okay. 9 MR. JOCHUMS: I have no other questions. BY MR. JOCHUMS: 10 11 Well, let me ask. Were either of the respondents there 12 that day? 1.3 Both of them. Both of them were? 14 15 Yes, sir. HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Vaughn or Ms. Brassart, do 16 17 you have any questions for the inspector? Well, I don't have a question. 18 MS. BY MR. JOCHUMS:

- Q With regard to each -- let's take them one at a time. As to Cecelia Vaughn, what is the recommended penalty?
- A The recommended penalty is \$325, \$300 applied to practicing outside the scope and \$25 for the health and safety issue of failing to place instruments in labeled containers.
- Q And then the recommended penalty with regard to Rhonda Brassart?
- A The recommended penalty for Rhonda is \$300 for practicing outside the scope.
- Q Okay.

MR. JOCHUMS: I have no other questions of the board, and no other witnesses.

HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Vaughn or Ms. Brassart, would you like to ask Ms. Wittum any questions at this time?

MS. VAUGHN: Uhm --

MR. JOCHUMS: Well, let me go ahead and ask another question.

MS. VAUGHN: Uh.

MR. JOCHUMS: Ms. Wittum, you're the executive director?

MS. WITTUM: Yes.

MR. JOCHUMS: And have been for some time. One of the issues here has to do with the allegations that the manicurist was doing hair work when the inspector walked in. And she said it was her daughter, does that matter if it was her daughter? Can you address that?

MS. WITTUM: It's my --

MR. JOCHUMS: As you understand how the board has dealt with that previously?

MS. WITTUM: It's my understanding that it does not matter if it's done inside a licensed establishment. Only a licensed cosmetologist can do hair in an establishment.

MS. VAUGHN: What about right here? Rule No. 2, Practitioner, "No person shall practice any phase of cosmetology and its related occupations with the intent of receiving compensation"?

MS. WITTUM: It's my understanding from the board, that they have not allowed anyone to work inside a licensed establishment, regardless of whether they're paid.

MS. VAUGHN: I don't understand that.

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1	MR. JOCHUMS: I have no further questions.
2	HEARING OFFICER: Do you have any further
3	questions from Ms. Wittum?
4	MS. BRASSART: Well, if someone was to dry their
5	own hair, is that against the law? I mean, if
6	MS. WITTUM: You're

8	salon or anything?
9	MS. WITTUM: That would probably be better
10	addressed to the board, since it's their
11	interpretation that we are operating under.
12	MS. BRASSART: Okay.
13	HEARING OFFICER: Any further questions for this

16	HEARING OFFICER: Does the board have any
17	questions of this witness?
18	(No response.)

MS. ELLIOTT: My name is Sheila Elliott, and I work in the salon. And I use that room with the facial machine. Microderm abrasion has never been done in that salon. That is not a microderm abrasion machine. We do not have products in there to do microderm abrasion with. We do facials using Provonia products. And we were -- Cecelia was asked, I work right beside her, who used the microderm abrasion machine. And she said, none of us. We don't have that. So that's what the deal was on the microderm abrasion machine. There's current on that machine. There's a steamer on that machine. There's a brush attachment on that machine, but we don't do microderm abrasion. I mean, we have a license to do it, but we don't do it in that shop.

HEARING OFFICER: Do you have any questions that you would like to ask her, either of you?

MS. ELLIOTT: No, I don't have a question. I

just --1 2. HEARING OFFICER: I mean, do Ms. Vaughn or Ms. 3 Brassart have a question. That's what I meant. MS. ELLIOTT: Oh. 4 5 HEARING OFFICER: Mr. Jochums, would you like to 6 ask her any questions? 7 MR. JOCHUMS: No. HEARING OFFICER: Would the board like to? 8 9 (No response.) 10 HEARING OFFICER: Okay. 11 MS. PICKERING: I have a --12 HEARING OFFICER: Oh, wait. 13 MS. ELLIOTT: But we don't do microderm 2.3 abrasion, so it really is not -- it has, you know, 24 that's not what the machine is. Undoubtedly, there 25 was a misunderstanding about the machine.

MS. PICKERING: Can you tell the attributes of your machine as opposed to a micro -- what's the difference?

MS. ELLIOTT: I don't use a microderm abrasion machine, so I don't know anything about one.

MS. PICKERING: But yours is used in facials?

MS. ELLIOTT: Yes. It's a facial machine. It
has a steamer. It has a Wood's Lamp, where you can
look at the skin and assess it. It has a current
that you can use to help the product penetrate deeper
into the skin. And that's basically what the machine
has. It doesn't have anything else. And the
products that are back there are for different, you
know, skin types, or masks for cleansing the skin,
but -- but we don't have a microderm abrasion
machine. So when she answered our inspector, she was
answering her honestly because she asked us who used
the microderm abrasion machine, and we don't have
one. Nobody uses it, because it's not there.

MS. PICKERING: Okay. Did you-all buy -- did you-all purchase the machine, so that you could bring like the instruction sheet for it, or whatever?

MS. ELLIOTT: It's been there since the shop's been there.

MS. PICKERING: Okay. So it's not a new thing?

for this witness? 4 5 MS. POWELL: I'd like to ask something. Who all 6 uses that machine. 7 MR. JOCHUMS: Let me -- we're a little out of 8 order here, but let me have Kathy to explain this 9 first or maybe clarify this for us. It may make this 10 easier. 11 MS. WITTUM: Two things. One, a cosmetologist 12 can do microderm abrasion, as well as, a licensed 1.3 aesthetician. 14 MS. CAUDLE: Right. I see. 15 Number two, the machine in the MS. WITTUM: 16 salon is not an issue. It's not an issue. They have 17 licensed cosmetologists in the salon who can use that machine, whether it's labeled as a microderm abrasion 18 19 machine or not. 2.0 MS. CAUDLE: Right. 21 MS. WITTUM: So the machine is not an issue. 22 MS. ELLIOTT: Well, then why was it an issue on 2.3 the sheet? 24 MS. WITTUM: The machine -- the outside of the 25 scope deals with Rhonda. MS. NELSON: It says here, no person shall practice cosmetology and its related occupations with the intent of receiving compensation. I mean, if you can't have a little perk of doing your own child's hair in a beauty shop, which you're obviously not going to get paid for -- yeah. I think it's a little stiff to fine somebody \$300 for doing -- doing something to your own child.

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HEARING OFFICER: Let's kind of keep this in check, here. Are you testifying that -- I'm not sure what your question was from either of the respondents to get to where we are to talking about this rule and what you think the application should be. Do you see what I'm saying?

MS. NELSON: Well, you're charging her for doing

MS. NELSON: Well, you're charging her for doing hair, when here it says, with the intent of compensation. She had no intention of getting paid or being compensated, other than her daughter's love, for doing her hair. You know, it — I just think it's a little ridiculous that you impose these fines, but you're not giving anybody a chance to rectify anything. Any court of law gives most people a break, you know. You've got a three-strike rule. You're not — you're not even doing that. This is a one-strike rule, and y'all are done. That's — that's just all I've got to say about it.

HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Do you have any further questions for this witness? Would the board, or Mr. Jochums, either one, like to ask this witness any questions.

MR. JOCHUMS: No.

POWELL: I thought it was for massage. didn't know that it was for facials. 10 11 MS. BRASSART: Right. We can use creams, 12 cleansers, masks, scrubs, uhm -- what else? I mean, 1.3 you know. 14 MS. POWELL: Okay. Thank you. 15 Anything but make-up. MS. CAUDLE: 16 MS. BRASSART: Yeah, right. Anything but make-17 up. 18 HEARING OFFICER: Any other questions for either 19 of the respondents? 20 (No response.) 21 HEARING OFFICER: If there are none, we'll go off the record at this time for the board to 22 2.3 deliberate. JOCHUMS: My name is Arnold Jochums and I'll be presenting the board's case. 4 5 HEARING OFFICER: Are there any preliminary 6 matters to take up? 7 MR. JOCHUMS: I want to make Board's Exhibit No. 8 1, the letter of conveyance to Kitty Gray, along with 9 the order and notice of hearing, and the inspection report as a bulk exhibit for the board. 10 11 HEARING OFFICER: Those will be admitted as 12 Exhibit No. 1. 1.3 (WHEREUPON, Board's Exhibit No. 1 to HO#07-087 14 having been identified for the record, was admitted 15 into evidence and marked to append.) 16 HEARING OFFICER: Anything further? 17 MR. JOCHUMS: And I want to incorporate by 18 reference the board's regulations. HEARING OFFICER: Those will be admitted. 19 2.0 (WHEREUPON, Board's Exhibit No. 2 to HO#07-087 21 having been identified for the record as the statues 22 and rules of the board governing the hearing, were 2.3 incorporated into the record and made a part hereof 24 by reference.) 25 HEARING OFFICER: Is there anything that you'd

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like to introduce, Ms. Gray? 1 2. MS. GRAY: I have some photographs that I've 3 taken. HEARING OFFICER: Those can be admitted. 4 5 you'll bring them up so the board members can take a 6 look at them. 7 (WHEREUPON, Respondent's Exhibit No. 1 to HO#07-8 087 having been identified for the record, was 9 admitted into evidence and marked to append.) 10 HEARING OFFICER: When were these photos taken? 11 MS. GRAY: They were taken the next weekend 12 after the inspector was there. 1.3 HEARING OFFICER: Are there any opening 14 statements for the board? 15 MR. JOCHUMS: Yes. May it please the board, 16 notice of hearing was issued after the inspection 17 report containing an alleged number of health and 18 safety violations. We'll hear testimony about these 19 during the course of this presentation. 2.0 HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Gray, do you have any 21 opening statements that you wish to make at this 22 time? 2.3 MS. GRAY: Yes, I do. I'd like to explain the 24 photographs, if I may. 25 HEARING OFFICER: Well, do you have -- we can

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get to that later. Do you have any opening statements that you wish to make at this time, just kind of an overview of what you think your case is about?

MS. GRAY: Yes, I do. The violations that were made on the salon — there were two or three. This issue of files and buffers to be disposed of that can't be disinfected — and all of our manicure items that are disposable get disposed of. If they aren't disposable they get disinfected. They were in a glass container at the time of the inspection. The manicurist that was working that day had a towel draped over the container she used to disinfect with. And the inspector didn't ask about that.

The only thing that was talked about was the weather and a license that was on the mirror of a coworker that had passed away. And we left it there in memory of her. I was asked to take it down, which I did -- with emotion.

And then there were brushes that were stored ——
I just said stored, but not stored, but stacked on
the back bar, which I have pictures of. They were
actually clean brushes that were drying. That's not
where we store our clean brushes, but it's where we
put them to dry before we put them in the drawers,

the closed storage.

I guess the only thing that I can clearly see that I'm guilty of is, that I didn't have my drawers labeled, or my Barbicide labeled. So after I read the report, I immediately went out and bought a labeler and labeled the drawers. So you can see that on the drawers in the pictures, and see that I've clearly rectified that issue.

I just felt that it was a bit harsh. I feel I should have been given an opportunity to rectify a violation before I was given an order to come before the board on a violation. If they would -- maybe give a warning instead of a violation. But it's just a violation. That's all I have to say for now.

HEARING OFFICER: Mr. Jochums, you may call your first witness now.

MR. JOCHUMS: I call Inspector Caudle.

- Q Ms. Caudle, you're a board inspector?
- A I am.

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- Q Did you visit That Certain Look Beauty Salon in May of this year?
- A Yes, sir. On May 24th.
- Q Would you tell the board about your observations and what you wrote up in your report?

Α Yes, sir. Files and buffers that can't be disinfected must be -- there were some of the red felt buffers right there, that cannot be disinfected that this is referring to that must be discarded after each use. Then there's implements that must be disinfected before they're used on a client. They're supposed to be washed with soap and water, and then disinfected by total immersion for 10 minutes in and EPA-registered They have to be totally immersed in EPAdisinfectant. registered disinfectant for it to be disinfected before use on a client. Place implements in labeled containers -- this lets a client know that they've not been used. Next they must be disinfected and placed in a labeled container so that any inspector that walks in their salon will know whether it's used or disinfected. And place disinfected implements in clean covered place and this also includes brushes stacked on the There was more than just brushes on that back bar. back bar. And the drawers where the clean implements were being stored --

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it was dirty inside the drawers. They're to be stored in a 1 2. clean, covered place. 3 Have you visited this location previously? It's been several years since I've been in that area, in 4 5 Van Buren County, but this was my first time to visit this 6 salon. 7 How large a salon is it? 8 It's a nice-sized salon. I can't tell you how many 9 stations it has, because I've only been there once. very nice place situated in a mall. 10 11 MR. JOCHUMS: I have no other questions for this 12 witness. 1.3 HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Gray, do you have any 14 questions you'd like to ask Inspector Caudle? 15 MS. GRAY: I'd like to know why you didn't ask 16 someone about the brushes we had stacked on the back 17 bar. 18 MS. CAUDLE: I just didn't, but I didn't think 19 they should be stacked there and the drawer. And you 2.0 had a client. I'm not going to interrupt you. 21 were very busy. 22 MS. GRAY: I did not have time to give you a 2.3 tour, but -- well, I really felt that it was a lack 24 of communication between the inspector and myself on 25 what the inspector wrote us up for and what we

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1	could've explained if we'd been asked about it.

KATHY WITTUM, 1 having been called for and on behalf of the 2. 3 State, and having been first duly sworn to tell the 4 truth, testified on her oath as follows, to-wit: 5 DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. JOCHUMS: 6 7 Kathy, you are the executive director? 8 Α Yes. 9 And you prepared the notice of hearing that we're here on 10 this morning? 11 Yes. Α 12 Can you explain the penalty that's been recommended? 1.3 The recommended penalty is \$220, that total is taken from 14 each of the infractions using the fee schedule that the board 1.5 typically uses. 16 MR. JOCHUMS: I have no other questions. 17 HEARING OFFICER: Would you like to ask Ms. 18 Wittum any questions, Ms. Gray? 19 MS. GRAY: No, ma'am. 2.0 MR. JOCHUMS: I have no other witnesses. 21 HEARING OFFICER: Or do you have witnesses you'd like to call? 22 2.3 MS. GRAY: I'd like to call Heath Nicholson. 24 HEARING OFFICER: Please state your name for the

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record.

MR. NICHOLSON: I'm Heath Nicholson. I work with Ms. Gray.

HEARING OFFICER: Were you sworn in earlier in the day?

MR. NICHOLSON: I'm sorry. Yes, ma'am.

HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Gray, you may proceed to question your witness.

MS. GRAY: The issue that they found those drawers were dirty?

MR. NICHOLSON: No, they're not. If I may make a comment, the inspector stated earlier that the drawers were dirty. My working area is separated from where Kitty and the other cosmetologists stations are. She looked at my license and verified who I was, but she didn't look in any of my drawers at all. She didn't open any drawers or anything. She didn't even come far enough into my room to look into the drawers, so I don't see how she could say the drawers are dirty. And that also comes into my mind, it shows a little inconsistency of how inspections are carried out.

MS. GRAY: Also, could you explain to the board why our brushes are stacked on the back bar on the drying rack?

MR. NICHOLSON: In the rules and regulations

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book there's plenty in there on how to sanitize and clean implements. There's nothing stated in here that makes it clear on how the board would like for us to dry the implements. When placing these implements, wet, into a container and closing the lid, you're cutting off the air supply which promotes growth of many types of bacteria. One of the fastest to grow, pseudomonas aeruginosa, which is an opportunistic bacteria that will attack an immune system that is compromised. The area where we live and work has a very aged population, who often have compromised immune systems, so we air dry the brushes before we put them in a closed container. So I think it would be interesting for everybody here to find out how the board would like for us to dry the implements before we put them in a closed container.

MS. GRAY: What type of surface are the brushes on when drying?

MR. NICHOLSON: It's sort of a shelf on the back bar. It's sort of a ventilated type of shelf to allow aeration so the brushes can dry out.

(Pause.)

HEARING OFFICER: Do you any other questions for your witness?

(Pause.)

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1	MS. GRAY: About the labeled drawers, I was
2	unaware I had to label my comb and brush drawers
3	HEARING OFFICER: But do you have a question
4	for your witness?
5	MS. GRAY: I'm getting to that. Did I or did I
6	not label the drawers after she left?
7	MR. NICHOLSON: You immediately complied with
8	that.
9	MS. GRAY: That's all.
10	HEARING OFFICER: Mr. Jochums, do you have any
11	questions?
12	MR. JOCHUMS: No.
13	MS. WARD: You said she didn't inspect those
14	drawers any of the drawers?
15	MS. CAUDLE: I opened them.
16	MS. WARD: But did he infer that she didn't
17	inspect any of the drawers?
18	MS. GRAY: She didn't inspect his.
19	MS. POWELL: You said there were several who do
20	manicuring. The files that were dirty, or the
21	buffers, did you dispose of those or would
22	MS. GRAY: I throw them out.
23	HEARING OFFICER: If there are no other
24	questions, Ms. Gray, would you like to make a
25	statement?

MS. GRAY: Yes, I would. She did not open any drawers in that side of the salon either. And the manicurist was in the process of a manicure, so I can't say which files she had used and put in that container before disposing of them. I just think it's a little unclear about which files she was referring to, because of all the ones that she used during the manicure. I just feel unjust that this violation was given instead of discussing it with me, as far as talking -- it would have been during her visit, and I think if, clearly if you go back and look at the prior reports and inspection sheets that have been written, it should speak for itself. MS. I'd like to ask Ms. Gray a question.

HEARING OFFICER: Go ahead.

MS. WITTUM: The pictures that the board now has, are those what you were saying that you labeled?

MS. GRAY: I labeled them after she left.

Unknowingly. In the beginning, they didn't have to be labeled. She didn't ask where our Barbicide submersion tank was at. She didn't mention anything to me. If at the time, it was — when she came in, it was the time we'd just cleaned those brushes and so the brushes were going through the drying process before they were put into santized drawers. That's

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what those pictures are of.

HEARING OFFICER: Does the board have any questions that they would like to -- Mr. Jochums, do you have any more questions?

MR. JOCHUMS: I have no other questions.

HEARING OFFICER: Does the board have any questions they would like to ask Ms. Gray at this time -- any further questions from the board?

(No response.)

HEARING OFFICER: The board has no further questions, so we'll move to closing arguments. Mr. Jochums?

MR. JOCHUMS: I'll waive closing arguments.

HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Anything from Ms. Gray in the way of closing arguments?

MS. GRAY: I think I said it all.

HEARING OFFICER: Okay. We'll go off the record now for the board to deliberate and make their decision, at which time, we'll go back on the record for a motion.

(WHEREUPON, discussion and deliberations were had by the board, after which the proceedings were resumed as follows, to-wit:)

HEARING OFFICER: We're back on the record for the board's decision.

MS. POWELL: Do I have a motion? 1 I'd like to make a motion. Finding 2. MS. TURMAN: 3 the allegations being true, I move to order the respondent to pay a fine of \$220 payable within 30 4 5 days of receipt of the board's order. Failure to pay 6 the fine will result in a suspension of the 7 respondent's cosmetology license beginning 30 days from receipt of the board's order and extending for a 8 9 period of 90 days from the date the respondent 10 relinquishes their license. 11 MS. TRAYLOR: I second that motion. 12 MS. POWELL: I have a motion and a second for 1.3 the respondent to pay a \$220 fine. Is there any 14 discussion? 15 (No response.) 16 MS. POWELL: All those in favor, raise your 17 right hand. MR. JOCHUMS: Before you vote --18 19 MS. POWELL: I'm sorry. 2.0 MR. JOCHUMS: Madam Hearing Officer, did you 21 tell the lady you'd let her say something? 22 HEARING OFFICER: Oh. Would you like to make 2.3 I forgot what you said. comment? 24 MS. GRAY: I was just concerned about the 25 inconsistencies of the inspections. And I just

didn't feel like they were consistent from the past 1 2. visits. I just wish that she would have communicated 3 with me during her visit about what she was worried about or upset about. I think that could have 4 5 cleared up a lot of things while she was there. 6 That's all. 7 HEARING OFFICER: That will be noted on the 8 record. 9 MS. POWELL: Okay. All those in favor, raise 10 your right hand. 11 (Show of hands.) 12 MS. POWELL: All those opposed? 13 (Show of hands.) MS. POWELL: 14 Any abstentions? 15 MS. GORDON: I didn't vote. I'm sorry. 16 MS. POWELL: Okay. All those in favor, please 17 raise your right hand again. (Show of hands.) 18 19 MS. POWELL: All those opposed? 2.0 (Show of hands.) 21 MS. POWELL: Motion carries. 22 HEARING OFFICER: In the matter of Kitty Gray, 2.3 07-087, a motion passed by majority vote of the 24 That motion will be reduced to writing and 25 served on the respondent. If the respondent cares to

appeal the decision, they may do so under the Administrative Procedures Act 25-15-201.

Are there any other questions or comments at this time?

(No response.)

HEARING OFFICER: There are none. This hearing is concluded and the record is closed.

MS. WITTUM: Ms. Gray, do you want these pictures back? If so, we can make copies and we'll give you these originals back.

(WHEREUPON, Board's Exhibit No. 1 to HO#07-046 11 12 having been identified, was admitted into evidence 1.3 and marked to append; and also having been identified 14 as the regulations of the board, which were 15 incorporated herein by reference.) 16 HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Goines, do you have any 17 evidence to submit? 18 MS. GOINES: No, ma'am. 19 HEARING OFFICER: Any opening statements from 2.0 counsel for the State? 21 MR. JOCHUMS: Not at this time. 22 HEARING OFFICER: Do you want to make any 2.3 opening statement to the board, Ms. Goines? 24 MS. GOINES: I'd just like to inform the board 25 that I have a medical condition and therefore I've

not been doing nails over the summer. 1 2. HEARING OFFICER: Okay. The board may call its 3 first witness. THEREUPON, 4 5 TESTIMONY AND EVIDENCE GIVEN ON BEHALF OF THE STATE BY 6 7 INSPECTOR SHEILA CAUDLE, 8 having been called for and on behalf of the 9 State, and having been first duly sworn to tell the 10 truth, testified on her oath as follows, to-wit: 11 DIRECT EXAMINATION 12 BY MR. JOCHUMS: 13 Please state your name for the record. 14 Sheila Caudle. 15 And in your role as an inspector, did you go to the Sun 16 Shack? 17 I did. Α And what kind of facility is it? 18 19 It's a tanning salon, and Ms. Goines has a manicure room 2.0 set up there. 21 And she's licensed as a manicurist? 22 Α Yes. 2.3 And on this particular -- obviously, they run a tanning 24 salon? 25 Yes, they run a tanning salon.

- Q Was she there on the day that you were there?
- A No, she was not.

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Q Tell us what you observed with regard to her part of the business?

When I went in there to do the inspection I observed the violations I've listed here. First, the manicure table needs to be cleaned before and after each use. The manicure table was obviously dirty. Treatment tables are to be sanitized before and after each use. All towels need to be discarded after each use. There were dirty towels on the table. files and orange wood sticks that can't be disinfected need to be discarded, not laying on top of the manicure table. use on a client, all implements must be disinfected -- this means files. Also all used implements must be placed in labeled containers to disinfect them. And the clean, disinfected ones are to be stored in a clean, covered place. In fact, the manicure table had not been cleaned. used towels on the table. There were used files on the table. And there were used emery boards that had not been discarded. Some of them were disinfectable and some were not. And I didn't see any -- it looked like they were being used, and I didn't see any labeled containers.

Q Is this a locked room, or -- how did you get in?

A The last three times that I have been there, the last three inspections, the owner has let me in.

11		says here on the June 14th, you noted discrepancies
12		here she said she doesn't work there or
13		MS. CAUDLE: She said she didn't work there this
14		summer.
15		MS. POWELL: You said she wasn't there the last
16		three inspections?
17		MS. CAUDLE: She wasn't there the last three
18		times that I went and there's no appointment book in
19		there or anything, so you can't tell is she's been
20		working.
21		MS. POWELL: But with all these violations,
22		somebody has obviously been doing something in there.
23		And the three inspections you're talking about, those
24		would be prior to June of '06?
25		MC CAUDIE: Voc malam

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1	MS. POWELL: And you haven't been there since
2	June?
3	MS. CAUDLE: No, ma'am.
4	HEARING OFFICER: Does anyone else have
5	questions for this witness?
6	MS. PICKERING: Now, is that the from the first
7	time?
8	MS. CAUDLE: Yes, ma'am.
9	MS. PICKERING: But you didn't find her there.
10	How long from the first time you were there?
11	MS. CAUDLE: I don't know how many months
12	because I worked for several months last year in the
13	Cosmetology office and my schedule is off.
14	HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Goines, do you have any
15	questions for this witness?
16	MS. GOINES: Yes. So before when you were
17	there, apparently it was clean and not unsanitary
18	like it is now?
19	MS. CAUDLE: Yes, ma'am. I don't remember there
20	ever being any problems.
21	MS. GOINES: So there weren't problems before
22	this?
23	MS. CAUDLE: I can't say for sure since I don't
24	have that before me, but I don't remember there being
25	any problems.
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1 HEARING OFFICER: If that is all the questions 2. for this witness, State you may call your next 3 witness. 4 THEREUPON, 5 TESTIMONY AND EVIDENCE GIVEN ON BEHALF OF THE STATE BY 6 7 KATHY WITTUM, having been called for and on behalf of the 8 9 State, and having been first duly sworn to tell the 10 truth, testified on her oath as follows, to-wit: 11 DIRECT EXAMINATION 12 BY MR. JOCHUMS: 13 Please state your name. 14 Kathy Wittum. 15 And you are the director and you sent out the letter of 16 notice and hearing? 17 Yes. 18 I notice in paragraph three that you recommend a penalty 19 of \$275. 2.0 Α Yes. 21 Basically, that's one of \$150 and several others at \$25 22 each, is that correct? 2.3 Yes. Α 24 How did you come to those numbers? 0 25 That's based on the fee schedule the board has typically

1 used in the past.

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Q I don't have any other questions, -- well, have their been violations with regard to this salon previously?

MS. WITTUM: According to the file that we have on the establishment, on the inspection prior to this that occurred on June 22nd of '05, there was -- one, two, three -- three violations noted. The violations being that the floor mat needed to be cleaned and repaired, the treatment tables needed to be sanitized, and the towels needed to be discarded after each use. There is no indication that there was ever any action taken against the salon on those inspection findings. The inspection prior to that was January 5, of '05 and there were no violations noted. And the one prior to that was August 11, of '04 and there were no violations noted in that one.

MR. JOCHUMS: Thank you. I have no further questions.

HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Goines, do you have any questions for this witness?

MS. GOINES: No.

HEARING OFFICER: Do any of the board members have questions they'd like to ask?

MS. GORDON: You said that before on June 22nd of '05 there were three violations found?

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MS. WITTUM: There were three found. The floor mats needed to be cleaned and repaired. The treatment tables needed to be sanitized. And the towels needed to be discarded after each use.

MS. WEST: Ms. Wittum, is she responsible for the salon?

MS. WITTUM: She is the establishment owner. As the establishment owner she is responsible for the salon.

MR. JOCHUMS: I have no other witnesses.

HEARING OFFICER: Do you have any witnesses to call or would you like to make a statement on your own behalf?

MS. GOINES: Yes. The other infractions -- the floor did not need to be repaired. There were just nails on the floor that needed to be swept up and discarded. We have seven other people that work there at the front desk and they have the tendency, on occasion, to pick up a towel and lay it on that table. They have to use clean towels to clean the tanning beds and they'll come in there and get one out of the cabinet and then get busy and leave it laying on that table. They also have, on occasion, come in there and gotten a file to file their own nails with, and not put it in the container for dirty

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files. I do have those there. I took the whole summer off because I've been diagnosed with rheumatoid arthritis. I have limited motion in my wrists, which obviously you need to do nails with. That's all I have to say.

HEARING OFFICER: Mr. Jochums, would you like to ask any questions?

MR. JOCHUMS: No.

HEARING OFFICER: If there are no questions from the State, would the board members like to ask any questions?

MS. WARD: Have you made them aware that they aren't supposed to lay the towels on the treatment tables?

MS. GOINES: Yes, ma'am. I've told them. But usually, it's an accident. I mean, they're going to get a towel and the phone rings, and they lay it down to go answer it. Despite me telling them, it happens. I mean, it's crazy. We have 18 tanning beds and when one person is working it just gets like that.

MS. WARD: Thank you.

(Pause.)

HEARING OFFICER: If there are no other questions, we'll move to closing arguments. State,

do you have any closing? 1 2. MR. JOCHUMS: No. 3 HEARING OFFICER: Would you like to state 4 anything in closing? 5 MS. GOINES: Do what you feel is necessary, I 6 quess. 7 HEARING OFFICER: Then this hearing is complete, except for the board's decision. POWELL: HEARING ORDER NO. 07-064: FRANCES PRIMEAUX 24 25 HEARING OFFICER: The matter currently before

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the Arkansas Cosmetology Board is Frances Primeaux, 07-064. Today is September 18, 2006 and we're in the Main Street Mall Conference Room. Would the respondent please identify themselves for the record?

MS. PRIMEAUX: My name is Elaine Primeaux.

by Elaine -- Frances Elaine, I go by Elaine.

Jennifer Tyree is a stylist in the salon. And

Valerie Sunberg.

HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Thank you. And counsel for the board today?

MR. JOCHUMS: My name is Arnold Jochums, and I will be presenting this case before the board today.

HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Did you hear when I explained everything earlier, and you-all were sworn in at that time?

MS. PRIMEAUX: Yes.

HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Are there any preliminary matters we should take up?

MR. JOCHUMS: Yes. I'd like to have made Board Exhibit 1, the letter that went to the owner, along with the order and notice of hearing, and the inspection report. I'd like those all entered as Exhibit 1.

(WHEREUPON, Board's Exhibit No. 1 to HO#07-064, having been identified for the record, was admitted into evidence and marked to append.)

MR. JOCHUMS: And I would also ask that we make the board regulations, in particular, those pertaining to health and safety rules be incorporated by reference.

(WHEREUPON, Board's Exhibit No. 2 to HO#07-064 having been identified for the record as the statues and rules of the board governing the hearing, were incorporated into the record and made a part hereof by reference.)

HEARING OFFICER: And that will be noted, as well. Ms. Primeaux, do you have any exhibits you'd like to enter at this time?

MS. PRIMEAUX: Well, I did bring photos of the salon and of all our health and safety -- clean and dirty containers, Barbicide -- whatever. Also I brought letters of reference in accordance to our honesty, our character -- kind of some character letters. Since no one here, except Pat, I mean, knows our salon or anything about us, so.

HEARING OFFICER: If there are no objections from the board, those will be admitted.

MR. JOCHUMS: I have no objection to the photos.

And these are two or three character reference 1 2. letters? 3 MS. PRIMEAUX: Yes. And a -- from the girl that cleans our salon every week. 4 MR. JOCHUMS: Oh. The person who does the 5 6 ordinary cleaning in your salon? 7 MS. PRIMEAUX: Yes. We do have someone that 8 cleans the salon every week. 9 MR. JOCHUMS: No objection to any of these. Can 10 we let the board members look at them as we go? 11 (WHEREUPON, Respondent's Exhibit No. 1 to HO#07-12 064 having been identified, was admitted into 1.3 evidence and marked to append.) HEARING OFFICER: Yes. That would be fine. 14 15 Let's move to opening statements. 16 MR. JOCHUMS: This matter -- we're going to hear 17 some testimony from the inspector that it involves a 18 number of health and safety violations that she noted 19 on this visit on June 2 of this year. 2.0 HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Primeaux, would you like 21 to make a statement? 22 Well, I'm not sure what's MS. PRIMEAUX: Okay. 2.3 considered a statement and what gets into the gist of 24 the -- what's going on. First of all, all four of 25 the stylists in the salon are 100 percent booth

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rental, all the way down to retail. They are their own little entity in the salon. We like Pat. have no problem with her. This is not anything against her honesty or her dishonesty or anything like that. We just need some things clarified. All the girls do booth rental. Some of the girls were not present that day, as well as myself. I'm pretty much semi-retired, one day a week or one day every now and then. So I was not there, but I have a concern about the stylist -- no Sanex strip. girls use towels to do their draping with. And we pin them in the front. Both girls said they had draped their clients with towels. It was also the end of the work week on a Friday, towards the end of the day. One of the stylists did have clippings in We are a very, very busy salon. her drawer. -- I'm assuming every one here has been a hairdresser at some point in time. Hair is our business and it's impossible to keep your salon free of hair, short of not cutting any hair in your salon. I mean, hair It flies. That's just the way it is, and at floats. the end of the day it's just kind of everywhere. There's no way to completely rid your salon of hair. And depending on the day and how busy you are, you get to sweeping and dusting -- and that actually

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makes it worse. All of the stylists in our salon have clean and dirty containers and they are all labeled. And, too, on one of the fines, Rule 4.2(22)(a) and (c) -- we were not clear, or the girls were not clear, about what that was for. They did not remember Pat addressing that, as far as, unsanitized implements. So we weren't even aware of that. And I wasn't there. I can't say, but the girls did not remember her addressing dirty implements.

HEARING OFFICER: Thank you. The board may call their first witness.

MR. JOCHUMS: Inspector.

THEREUPON,

TESTIMONY AND EVIDENCE GIVEN ON BEHALF OF THE STATE BY

INSPECTOR PAT JACKSON,

having been called for and on behalf of the State, and having been first duly sworn to tell the truth, testified on her oath as follows, to-wit:

DIRECT EXAMINATION

BY MR. JOCHUMS:

- Q Please state your name.
- A Pat Bland Jackson.
 - Q I called you Bland.

	
1	A That's okay. Pat Bland Jackson Jackson Bland, same
2	thing.
3	Q Ms. Jackson, did you visit A Cut Above in Hope, Arkansas?
4	A I did.
5	Q And was this in June of this year?
6	A Yes, it was.
7	Q I know that you filled out the inspection report from that
8	time, and it's in the board's file that we admitted into
9	evidence. I see you wrote down a number of names on the back
10	of the inspection report. Are those the names that were on the
11	wall?
12	A Oh. Since I do not have my inspection report I'll
13	borrow Elaine's.
14	MS. PRIMEAUX: I have mine.
15	BY THE WITNESS:
16	A Thank you, sweetheart.
17	HEARING OFFICER: First, does the board have
18	copies of the inspection report?
19	MS. POWELL: Whoever has that telephone, would
20	you please turn that off?
21	MS. TURMAN: It's in somebody's bag.
22	MS. POWELL: Whoever has phones, make sure
23	they're turned off.
24	HEARING OFFICER: Could we get copies of the
25	inspection report for the board members to have for
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the duration of this hearing? Thank you.
BY MR. JOCHUMS:

- Q Well, let me back up a bit. When you go, what's your standard protocol? Tell us what you do when you make an inspection.
- A For an inspection?
- Q Yes.

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- A The first thing I do is I go in and I look for a salon license. I look for a current salon license, whatever year that might be. Then I go to the stations, and I look for the stylists' current practitioner licenses, and I list those. We list the -- the -- the license on the front of the inspection form with the ID number, and the date, and the address. And then on the back of the inspection form we list all of the stylists there and their ID no., along with the year that that license has on it, which should be the current year. And then after --
- Q And do you write down, even, the names of people that aren't there?
- A Absolutely. If they have a current, valid Arkansas -- or whatever. It doesn't even have to be current. If they have a license posted, that name goes on our inspection report, right. And then after that, I do my inspection.
- Q All right. Tell us about this salon. What kind of building is it in?

A Ms. Primeaux's building is a pretty nice building. Her and her husband have a business together. He's a chiropractor and he's in one part of the front of it. And she's in the back. It's a very nice salon.

- Q And -- I mean, when you were there, -- tell us some of the things you noticed.
- A When I go into any salon, I look to see that the stylists are not reusing brushes and combs, that they properly put these implements used implements, in a labeled container. I look to see that they have their EPA-registered disinfectant mixed up and covered up at all times. I look to see if they have containers for used implements. All these things are supposed to be labeled. I look to see if they have a closed towel hamper. I look to see if they have a trash can with a lid on it. I look to see if their you know, they have hot and cold water, the things that are standard on our form.
- 17 | O And in --

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- A Health and safety rules posted.
 - Q Okay. Thank you. And on this particular visit, what did you note --

(PHONE RINGING.)

BY THE WITNESS:

A I'm sorry. That is mine. I thought it was off. I apologize. At this particular visit -- and let me state this, past directives have been that if we go into a salon and they

are not using towels or neck strips, that we were allowed to say, be sure to use towels and neck strips. Is that not correct?

MS. PRIMEAUX: Uh-huh.

BY THE WITNESS:

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A If they had not put their implements in a dirty labeled container, we were allowed to say, girls, guys, whatever, please be sure and put your instruments in a labeled container. Or label this container, if this is dirty implements. New directives state that we do not do this, that we write the incident up. So that's exactly what happened at this particular visit to Ms. Primeaux's. I wrote the incident up. No neck strips and implements —

Q With regard to the neck strips, was there someone, a customer being serviced?

A I did not write that down, Mr. Jochums. I don't normally write that violation down if a client is not there. I wouldn't have any, you know, any reason to write that. Now, I also — you know, if they're using a towel and it's under a cape, I don't go around and lift up everybody's cape to see if there is a towel under it. If I don't see it, their neck is not being protected. You know, that is supposed to be around their neck to protect the client from the cape that may have been used on a client previous to the one they have now. So if it's not visible to me, I really don't see a need to go and look under

it to see if there's one there because it's over their shoulders. It's not protecting their client, so sometimes that is the case. I have had -- I've had stylists that had a towel around their client's neck but it would not be visible so I couldn't -- you know, I would put that down as no towel or neck

Q Okay. Continue with what you observed.

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strip being used.

A And the other thing was the container marked "clean". The container that did have "clean" labeled on it, appeared to have dirty — dirty brushes in it, brushes that had hair in them.

So — there again, I've had someone say, you know, I've got these little — we used to use those little capsule things, you know, that would disinfect the brushes. But if the hair is in them, they're not clean. And if they're in a cleaned container, a container marked "clean", and they have hair in them, they're not clean.

Q Okay. Moving on, you told us about the drawer situation.

A That was in June, and I'm just going to go from my reading. Evidently, I had opened a drawer and there was — there were hair clippings in it. If that drawer is supposed to be a clean area, which that — there again, that's the only time I would write a violation. If that drawer said "dirty" and there was hair in it, I wouldn't have a need to write that violation down. But if that's a clean area and I open it and there's hair in that area, then that's a contaminated area.

That's no longer a clean area.

Q Okay.

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A A clean area states that it must be kept closed at all times.

- Q Were there some items that were unmarked?
- A No, I don't --
- Q I guess what I'm asking about is number 25(c), what is that?
 - A All used instruments are placed in labeled containers. I think that this referred to, Mr. Jochums, the used instruments were in a clean container. So I believe that's what I was referring to on that, because all used instruments are placed in labeled containers. They were in a clean labeled container, so I believe that's what my reference to that was.
 - Q I believe that 25(a) is the one that usually has a big fine, isn't it?
- A I don't know.
 - Q What --
- A The board determines that.
- 20 | 0 What does that have to do with?
 - A Before use on a client all non-electrical instruments -- brushes and combs, have to be washed with soap and water and immersed for ten minutes in a EPA-registered disinfectant. So there again, that was referring to the dirty brushes being in a clean area. It would appear, that being the case, that those

instruments might be being reused. 1 2. I see. Instead of being washed with soap and water first, and 3 4 then immersed for ten minutes, before reuse. So that's what 5 that references to. 6 Is there anything else that you'd like to tell the board 7 about your inspections? 8 Elaine's salon is absolutely a top-of-the-line salon. 9 They were very busy that day, and it was the end of the day. Okay. 10 Q 11 MR. JOCHUMS: I have no further questions for Ms. Jackson. 12 13 HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Primeaux, would you like 14 to ask this witness any questions? 15 MS. PRIMEAUX: Yes. 16 HEARING OFFICER: Go right ahead. 17 MS. PRIMEAUX: Okay. I was not there, and I 18 don't have a crystal ball. So the girls say they had 19 a towel clipped around their tops on top of their 2.0 cape, as well, and it clipped. So do you not 21 remember seeing the towel that was draped on top of 22 them --2.3 MS. JACKSON: I do not, Elaine. 24 MS. PRIMEAUX: -- and clipped. MS. JACKSON: And I would not -- if that was the 25

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case, knowing my experience, I don't write things like that up, because that would be protection. If it was on top of the cape, I would absolutely see that. And one may have had that and another may not have, I don't -- like I said, I actually don't recall who was in the salon that day.

MS. PRIMEAUX: Right.

MS. JACKSON: But I know, my experience of writing this down, is that evidently someone had a cape on that did not have a visible towel or neck strip under it. Now, if the towel was draped over the client, I would consider that a protection, also. But I didn't -- evidently, didn't see that.

MS. PRIMEAUX: Well, -- and so if I wasn't there, I can only go by what they say and then what's written on this piece of paper. And I, you know, when we first opened the salon, you were very helpful. You expressed to us that we needed to have the clients protected at all times -- yada, yada, yada. And we had salon meetings about every month or two months to go over certain things. And so the girls had said -- because one of them was doing a chemical, she recalled that she had a towel under and over. And the other girl said she had hers under, but you know, we mostly use towels.

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MS. JACKSON: Uh-huh.

MS. PRIMEAUX: They can be laundered. We use a thicker towel. The Sanex strips are thin. If they get wet, they tear. And that's what we use. And she said she had one on. You know, I -- I don't know.

And also, what implements? Was it just the brushes, or was there an implement, because it says used implements or instruments.

MS. JACKSON: Right. Are in a container marked "clean", that was -- and I specifically remember that. Opening a drawer of the container that had "clean" on it, but the brushes in it had hair in them. So that would not be a clean area any longer. That would be a contaminated area. And it also means -- and I know y'all do have labeled containers.

MS. PRIMEAUX: We do. We do.

MS. JACKSON: But if --

MS. PRIMEAUX: And we try to use them.

MS. JACKSON: But if they're not put in there, then -- you know, if you have -- now, this is the experience of 40 years. If I had my brushes in the drawer and they have hair in them, and my client doesn't know or whatever, and I reach in there and get one. My client does not know whether it was clean or dirty. And I'm not trying to indicate that

your stylists do that. I'm saying the appearance 1 could be --2. 3 MS. PRIMEAUX: Right. 4 MS. JACKSON: The appearance could be that those 5 brushes are being used more than one time. And 6 anymore we can't even go by multiple hair color, 7 because everyone has multiple hair color now. MS. PRIMEAUX: That's true. 8 9 MS. JACKSON: So, you know, I couldn't say that 10 they were, but that is just an indication to me. 11 MS. PRIMEAUX: Okay. So -- now, my girls 12 understood that when you have a drawer that you use, 1.3 and I don't know about any salon other than my own, 14 but we have drawers that we put our brushes 15 HEARING OFFICER: Let's try to keep this on 16 track by asking a question, --17 MS. PRIMEAUX: Okav. 18 HEARING OFFICER: -- please. We'll give you a 19 chance to give your information to us, as well. 2.0 MS. PRIMEAUX: That -- all right. This is. I'm 21 sorry. And I'm going around Laura's house, but I'm 22 trying to get there. 2.3 HEARING OFFICER: Okay. 24 MS. PRIMEAUX: Okay. They use their drawers and 25 they have their "clean" and "dirty". But they have a Teresa Iden, CCR (501) 261-1106

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drawer, and they understood it was okay to have their clean brushes in drawers -- clean brushes and combs in that drawer, and then they open it. They get them out, and -- yada, yada, yada.

MS. JACKSON: Okay.

MS. PRIMEAUX: Well, when you're opening those drawers, is it not possible that hair can just fall in? I mean, you know what I'm saying? Hair is a hairy business. It's just everywhere. It's end of a Friday. It was a busy day. And -- do you understand what I'm saying?

MS. JACKSON: I do.

MS. PRIMEAUX: It's just possible that the hair just kind of like flew up and --

MS. JACKSON: I do. And believe me, there again, my experience -- I would not write a violation up for a few slivers of hair. Evidently there was visible, multiple clippings in there for me to even write that down. And like I said, I know I -- you know, you've got a top-of-the-line salon. I've been in there in the past and said, girls, be sure and do this. And girls, be sure and do that. So I know that y'all do normally follow the rules, but I would not have written it down had it not been multiple.

MS. PRIMEAUX: Okay. Well, we're fined for hair

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clippings as one fine. And then we're fined for implements. And on page 12, it talks about sterilization of non-electrical instruments with sharp point or edge that may on occasion pierce the skin and draw blood.

Now, that -- that is not a brush or a comb. So, in what area were we at fault when it came to instruments? I mean, you know what I'm saying? Forget the hair was in the brush and you don't remember the towel, but how about that -- those sharp instruments? Where were we at fault there?

MS. JACKSON: Which one are you reading?

(Ms. Primeaux shows document to Ms. Jackson.)

MS. JACKSON: Sterilization of -- okay. That doesn't necessarily mean that all instruments are sharp. It just means, as it reads, that it does include sharp instruments. If you will go on and read down here, it also says -- as well as all non-electrical instruments without sharp points. If you'll go ahead and read the whole thing, without sharp points or edges: combs, blushes, blowers, and all instruments and accessories used in all branches of cosmetology including manicuring shall be disinfected. That also includes brushes and combs in there, too, if you go ahead and read that.

MS. PRIMEAUX: But we're fined \$150 for that 1 one, and then we're fined \$25 for the brushes. 2. 3 MS. JACKSON: That's up to the board, not me. MS. PRIMEAUX: I don't -- I mean, I don't quite 4 5 understand that. How can you be fined twice for the 6 same thing? Because it sounds like the same thing, 7 do you understand what I'm saying? 8 And I guess it comes down to, you know, are we 9 just sitting here all day and -- you know, I'm not 10 saying you're telling a lie. Please don't think 11 that. And I'm not accusing my girls I've worked with 12 for five years of telling a lie. But, you know, they 1.3 say they had towel wrapped -- draped around the 14 client. Well, it all boils down to --15 HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Primeaux, if we could keep 16 it just to questions right now. 17 MS. PRIMEAUX: Okav. 18 HEARING OFFICER: I'll let you have your say, 19 but to keep things flowing let's get back to the 2.0 questions, okay? 21 MS. PRIMEAUX: Okay. 22 HEARING OFFICER: Does the board -- do you have 2.3 any further questions for this witness? 24 MS. PRIMEAUX: No, I do not. 25 HEARING OFFICER: Does the board have any Teresa Iden, CCR

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questions for this witness? 1 2. (No response.) 3 HEARING OFFICER: The board has no questions. Mr. Jochums, you may call your next witness. 4 5 MR. JOCHUMS: Yes. I'm going to call Kathy 6 Wittum. 7 THEREUPON, TESTIMONY AND EVIDENCE 8 GIVEN ON BEHALF OF THE STATE BY 9 10 KATHY WITTUM, having been called for and on behalf of the 11 12 State, and having been first duly sworn to tell the 1.3 truth, testified on her oath as follows, to-wit: DIRECT EXAMINATION 14 1.5 BY MR. JOCHUMS: 16 Kathy, you're the executive and you issued the notice of 17 hearing in this case? 18 Yes. 19 I see in paragraph three that you recommended a civil 2.0 penalty of \$200? 21 Yes. 22 And would you elaborate on how you came to recommend that? The \$200 is broken up between the three infractions that 2.3 24 were found by Inspector Jackson with \$25 for the neck strips or 25 towels not being properly used, \$150 for the non-electrical

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1	instruments not being properly disinfected, and \$25 for the
2	failure to place used instruments in a labeled container.
3	These individual penalties are what the board has typically
4	used in the past on their fee schedule.
5	MR. JOCHUMS: I have no other questions of this
6	witness.
7	HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Primeaux, would you like
8	to ask this witness any questions?
9	MS. PRIMEAUX: As far as Pat?
10	HEARING OFFICER: No, this witness, Ms. Wittum.
11	MS. PRIMEAUX: Oh. No.
12	HEARING OFFICER: Okay.
13	MR. JOCHUMS: I have no additional witnesses at
14	this time.
15	HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Primeaux, you may call
16	your first witness.
17	MS. PRIMEAUX: Okay. Jennifer, I believe was
18	one of the stylists that was
19	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Please state your name
20	for the record.
21	MS. TYREE: Jennifer Tyree.
22	HEARING OFFICER: Proceed
23	MS. PRIMEAUX: Oh. And ask
24	HEARING OFFICER: with your questions.
25	MS. PRIMEAUX: Oh, okay. All right. Jennifer,
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did you use -- was their a towel draped around your
client's neck and clipped in the front?

MS. TYREE: To my knowledge -- I'm really busy all day long. I mean, I don't even take a break to eat lunch. And clients are coming in and out, and I can't pinpoint exactly what client I was working on at the time. When Ms. Pat came in, at the time, you know, I mean, I could be putting a client in the chair and hadn't put a towel on her yet, you know, but I do eventually get a towel around my client's neck. But it could be in between taking a cape off, putting it on, loosening it up or something, and taking off -- you know, putting a towel on -- you know, taking one everything off one client and putting it all on a new client. So, yes, I do use a towel.

MS. PRIMEAUX: And do you use your "clean" and "dirty" boxes in your drawer correctly?

MS. TYREE: Yes. I have one drawer. That's all I have to work out of. I have a "clean" box and a "dirty" box, and so I do use them correctly. And then, I mean, that's my one drawer. So that's what I have "clean" -- labeled, you know, "clean" labeled, "dirty" labeled. So, like we were talking about the hair flying. I mean, I'm opening my drawer I don't

know how many times a day. I can't keep up with that. And so I don't know, you know, hair could fly in, you know, when I open it. So that's about as black and white as I can get.

MS. PRIMEAUX: Okay. And do we have a sanitation system in the back, --

MS. TYREE: Yes.

 $\mbox{MS. PRIMEAUX: $--$ as far as, cleaning your} \\ \mbox{brushes, washing them, and then our container?}$

MS. TYREE: Yes. We do.

MS. PRIMEAUX: And it is -- is it clearly labeled?

MS. TYREE: Uh-huh.

MS. PRIMEAUX: And we do that at the end of --

MS. TYREE: The day.

MS. PRIMEAUX: Okay.

MS. TYREE: Or it's, even in the day, when our "dirty" box gets full. You know, take them and go wash them, you know. I mean, that's how I do it. I'm an individual, so that's how I do it. And that's how most of the girls do it at our salon. As soon as that "dirty" box gets full, you go and clean it. So.

MS. PRIMEAUX: And then, Valerie was the only other stylist in the salon --

HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Are you going to ask

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1	her more questions?
2	MS. PRIMEAUX: No more questions.
3	HEARING OFFICER: Okay.
4	MS. PRIMEAUX: All right.
5	HEARING OFFICER: Mr. Jochums, questions for
6	this witness?
7	MR. JOCHUMS: Who who actually was there when
8	the inspector came?
9	MS. TYREE: I was.
10	MR. JOCHUMS: It was just the two of you?
11	MS. TYREE: I think so. I don't know if Kayla -
12	_
13	MS. SUNBERG: Kayla was there.
14	MS. TYREE: was there.
15	MS. SUNBERG: but she wasn't working.
16	MS. PRIMEAUX: They had to go pick up children.
17	We live two hours away.
18	MR. JOCHUMS: Okay. That's I understood that
19	you have some other ladies here that were at the
20	salon during the inspection.
21	MS. PRIMEAUX: Right.
22	MR. JOCHUMS: And how long have you been
23	practicing cosmetology?
24	MS. TYREE: Five years.
25	MR. JOCHUMS: No more questions.
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HEARING OFFICER: Does the board have any 1 questions they would like to ask this witness? 2. 3 (No response.) 4 HEARING OFFICER: The board has no questions. 5 You may call your next witness. 6 MS. PRIMEAUX: Valerie Sunberg, she was also 7 working that day. 8 HEARING OFFICER: Please state your name for the 9 record, please. 10 MS. SUNBERG: Valerie Sunberg. 11 HEARING OFFICER: You may ask your questions. 12 MS. PRIMEAUX: Oh. Okay. Valerie, do you 1.3 remember that day, having your client draped with a towel? 14 15 MS. SUNBERG: Yes, I do. Only because it was a 16 mutual friend that Pat's, so I do happen to remember 17 who I had in my chair at the time, just because of 18 that. And yes, I did. MS. PRIMEAUX: And do you have a "clean" and 19 2.0 "dirty" containers, clearly labeled at your station? 21 MS. SUNBERG: Yes, I do. I have one drawer, as 22 well. And I actually use my drawer as my "clean" 2.3 space, and my "dirty" box is on top of my counter, 24 closed. So that's how I keep mine separated. 25 MS. PRIMEAUX: Okay.

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HEARING OFFICER: Mr. Jochums, do you have any questions for this witness?

MR. JOCHUMS: No.

HEARING OFFICER: Would the board like to ask this witness any questions?

(No response.)

HEARING OFFICER: If there are no questions, you may call your next witness.

MS. PRIMEAUX: That's it.

HEARING OFFICER: Would you like to make a statement on your own behalf. Is there anything you want to tell the board?

MS. PRIMEAUX: Yes, I do. Oh, okay. We all are -- we're all hairdressers, and we're in the hair industry. I respect your positions. Your positions is to protect us, and ultimately, our clients who come in. I mean, I realize that they're your top priority. When you're busy, things do happen. try to the best of our ability to go by all the rules and we want to protect our clients. We want to stay in business. And above all, we want to be considered professionals, because we know that that is a possibility for us at any time, to not be professionals. Without the board, we probably would not be considered professionals. So, you know, we do

have monthly meetings. I stress to the girls -- we have someone that comes in and cleans. And to the best of our ability, we do try to follow the rules and regulations. The end of a Friday, and things were hectic, and people are tired, is it possible? Well, sure it's possible. We're busy, and it happens. Well, it was a mistake, but it happened. But it did not happen because we were not trying to the best of our ability to follow the rules and regulations.

HEARING OFFICER: Mr. Jochums, do you have -MS. PRIMEAUX: Oh --

HEARING OFFICER: Wait. I'm sorry. Please finish.

MS. PRIMEAUX: Oh, okay. And also, since I do booth rental, each girl does — has her own station. They're supposed to be taking care of their own. They're their own little entity. On — when they're written up, if I don't know who, because they are usually told by Ms. Pat, everything looks good. Great. We'll see you next time. But unless I know specifically who is at fault and in what area, then there's no way for me to go and say, okay. It's — let's up—it—up. Let's up the sanitation. Let's do whatever. So it's a little difficult to know which

1	girl to point the finger at and say, hey, you were
2	out of line. Let's do a better job. Now, I'm
3	through.
4	MR. JOCHUMS: Let me ask you this. Are you also
5	a licensed hairdresser?
6	MS. PRIMEAUX: Yes. I'm a licensed hairdresser
7	and instructor.
8	MR. JOCHUMS: All right. But you're not
9	currently working in the salon
10	MS. PRIMEAUX: One day a week.
11	MS. JACKSON: And also, there's an asterisk on
12	the inspection report that shows which stylists were
13	in violation.
14	MS. POWELL: I'm sorry. I didn't hear that.
15	There's an asterisk on their
16	MS. JACKSON: Uh-huh. One by Kayla and
17	Jennifer. Is there not a little star on you-all's
18	MS. WITTUM: Yes.
19	MS. JACKSON: report? Okay. That normally
20	is I do that for the salon owner, especially when
21	they are not there, so that they will know where the
22	violation occurred.
23	MS. PRIMEAUX: Kayla was not working. She said
24	she didn't even have a client that day, so in what
25	area
	Torona Idon, CCP

MS. JACKSON: I couldn't tell you, I just -- I put that there for that purpose. It could have been her drawer that had the dirty instruments. I don't recall that. I'm just saying that was the stations I was at that had the violations were those two.

MR. JOCHUMS: I don't have any questions.

HEARING OFFICER: Does the board have any questions they would like to ask this witness?

(No response.)

HEARING OFFICER: If there are no questions, we'll move to closing arguments.

MR. JOCHUMS: I -- we have a question here for the board to determine that the facts from the evidence that's been given. That's your call.

HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Primeaux, closing arguments? Is there anything else you'd like to tell the board before they make their decision?

MS. PRIMEAUX: Well, -- no, not concerning what's here. I think we've pretty well said it all. And really, you know, when we come to these meetings, what do we have as our defense? I mean, you've got character letters saying you're honest and that that you try to run your business according to law. You bring pictures of your salon on the dirtiest day. I mean, other than that, it's just your word. That's

all you have.

HEARING OFFICER: If there's nothing further at this time, the record will be closed and complete for the evidentiary portion. The board will now deliberate and we will go back on the record to make a motion.

(WHEREUPON, discussion and deliberations were had by the board, after which proceedings resumed as follows, to-wit:)

HEARING OFFICER: We are back on the record and the board will now make a motion.

State your motion, Ms. West.

MS. WEST: I make a motion concerning this case. Finding the allegations being true, I move to order the respondent to pay a fine in the amount of \$100 payable within 30 days of receipt of the board's order. Further the respondent is ordered to cease and desist from practicing cosmetology and/or operating a cosmetology establishment until such time as the respondent is properly licensed by the board.

That's not the right one.

MS. TRAYLOR: No.

MS. WEST: Finding the allegations being true --

MS. POWELL: That was the one you just read, right?

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1	MS. WEST: Right.
2	MS. POWELL: I have a motion, do I have a
3	second.
4	MS. PICKERING: Second.
5	MS. POWELL: I have a second. Is there any
6	discussion?
7	(No response.)
8	MS. POWELL: All those in favor of the
9	respondent to pay a fine in the amount of \$100, raise
10	your right hand.
11	(Show of hands.)
12	MS. POWELL: All those opposed?
13	(Show of hands.)
14	MS. POWELL: Motion carries. Respondent is to
15	pay a fine of \$100.
16	HEARING OFFICER: A motion has passed in the
17	matter of 07-064. The board's decision will be
18	reduced to writing and it will be served upon the
19	respondent. If you wish to take appeal, that is
20	available under the Administrative Procedures Act 25-
21	15-201.
22	If there are no other questions and comments at
23	this time?
24	(No response.)
25	HEARING OFFICER: okay. The hearing is
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1	concluded, and the record is closed. Thank you.
2	HEARING ORDER NO. 07-063: PHUONG TRAN
3	HEARING OFFICER: Phuong Tran, 07-063.
4	(Respondent comes forward.)
5	HEARING OFFICER: The matter currently before
6	the Arkansas State Cosmetology Board on September 18,
7	2006 is a Mr. Phuong Tran. And it is No. 07-063.
8	Would the respondent please state your full name for
9	the record, sir?
10	MR. TRAN: Phuong Tran.
11	HEARING OFFICER: And would the court reporter
12	like that spelled?
13	COURT REPORTER: No.
14	HEARING OFFICER: And for the State, counsel?
15	MR. JOCHUMS: My name is Arnold Jochums. I'll
16	be presenting this case to the board.
17	HEARING OFFICER: Sir, were you here earlier to
18	be sworn in as a witness?
19	MR. TRAN: No.
20	HEARING OFFICER: If you will, raise your right
21	hand. The court reporter will swear you in.
22	(WITNESS SWORN.)
23	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you. Are there any
24	preliminary matters at this time?
25	MR. JOCHUMS: Yes, Madam Hearing Officer, I ask
	Teresa Iden, CCR

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to make Board's Exhibit 1, the conveyance letter, the notice of hearing, and also the inspection report made on Magic Nail.

HEARING OFFICER: That packet of information will be introduced and admitted as Exhibit 1.

(WHEREUPON, Board's Exhibit No. 1 to HO#07-063, having been identified for the record, was admitted into evidence and marked to append.)

MR. JOCHUMS: I also ask that we incorporate the board regulations, statutes, and rules into the record by reference.

HEARING OFFICER: That will be done.

(WHEREUPON, Board's Exhibit No. 2 to HO#07-063 having been identified for the record as the statues and rules of the board governing the hearing, were incorporated into the record and made a part hereof by reference.)

HEARING OFFICER: Mr. Tran, do you have any documents you would like to introduce as exhibits for the board to look at today?

MR. TRAN: Yes, ma'am. I just -- I don't have nothing, but I just wanted to -- I had couple of violen [phonetic], but I don't think that's right.

HEARING OFFICER: Okay, Mr. Tran. We'll get to that in just a minute. You'll get to make your

JOCHUMS: I have no other questions for this 15 witness. 16 HEARING OFFICER: Does the board have any 17 questions? 18 (No response.) 19 HEARING OFFICER: Mr. Tran, do you have any 2.0 questions related to what Ms. Wittum just said? 21 MR. TRAN: I have no question. 22 MR. JOCHUMS: I have no further testimony to 2.3 present at this time. 24 HEARING OFFICER: Mr. Tran, go ahead and tell us 25 what you were -- or tell the board what you want them

to hear.

MR. TRAN: I just want to come here and talk about I was violen [phonetic] for files and buffer. That's the only thing I was violen [phonetic]. And the screen, the front door, I don't think that's really good idea to give me fine for it. Because when you own the salon and you want have the fresh air every time you open the business, morning. So you just want to leave it open for a few minutes, let the freshness in. That's the first thing, everybody walk in to let open first. And then you stop cold, because summer is supposed to be real hot. You don't want to open the front doors all day long. So I just — we always do it that way. And I know that's the rule, so I stopped doing that.

And about the pedicure, I was bleach every day to sanitize. So I didn't realize not you got to scoot the things off and just clean them up until she told me. So now I start doing it every day. So follow the rules.

That's the only thing I need to talk to you guys, about what I need to do, what I need to learn.

Actually, you got to learn every day. So -- if anyone you got to give a chance. So you cannot fine, you know, that warning. Oh, you got to do this,

okay? We got no what we need to do. Every day you got a new law, new rules, so --

(Pause.)

MR. TRAN: That's all I wanted to say.

HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Mr. Jochums, do you have any questions for Mr. Tran?

MR. JOCHUMS: Well, -- back up to the rules.

Are you talking about some kind of buffer wheel --

MR. TRAN: No, no, no. That's the -- not the buffer wheel. Just the buffer, when you using to smooth them, the fingernail. It just the buffer.

MR. JOCHUMS: Maybe the other witness can tell us what that is.

MS. CAUDLE: It's the pedicure/spa chair. It's a chair with half the tub on it. There's a screen on there, --

MR. TRAN: Yeah.

MS. CAUDLE: -- that you have to take that off.

It's like a screen that catches any debris to keep it from going down. That has to be taken off at least -- at least, at the minimal, once a week and cleaned because all the lotions and oils that you use during a pedicure collect on that. When you put the warm water into that tub spa, that's where your bacteria and things breed, because of the gunk on that screen

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1	and the warm water mixed with it, breeds bacteria.
2	MR. TRAN: Right. That's what I bleached every
3	day, but I didn't know to get it open.
4	MR. JOCHUMS: But let me just see if I
5	understood you. Did you did you say that you
6	agreed that these other violations happened, other

I've been doing hair for 20 years and I've tried to -- but even -- I thought that I could not send this off until I was ready to open and I only had two weeks to do so. And it says to file this, you have two weeks before your opening date. And as long as I've been doing hair -- well, I went in and set up my things. So actually, I had my

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things there. We're still remodeling the building. There's another business inside the building that she was a nutritionist -- a nutrition center that was And she was -- I was not there. And another girl, we had our stuff set up and everything. And I had thought, I am not ready to open this. had her little part ready, but I wasn't ready. didn't send this in, because I didn't think I was supposed to. For -- I thought I had only two weeks, and I thought, there's no way I can get this building completed. And so therefore, I didn't -- until she brought it to my attention, said I needed to do this. Actually, I wasn't officially open for business for all. And the reason she showed up was, I believe, just a personal vendetta from where I worked prior. But for about three days, I finished the people that were on my book and I did some family members. wasn't there the day that she -- that day I wasn't there. I wasn't officially open for business. finished up my appointment book from the last one. Ι was there less than a week, I'd say three days max, doing hair with no license. So that is true, but it was from the misunderstanding of this (indicating).

BY MR. JOCHUMS:

- Ma'am, can you state your name, please?
- 11 LaVonne Lester. Α
- 12 Ms. Lester, are you a board inspector?
- 13 Yes, I am. Α
- And did you have occasion to go to Harrison Street Salon & 14 15 Spa in Harrison, Arkansas on June 2?
- 16 In Batesville. Α
- 17 In Batesville? 0
- 18 Uh-huh, yes. Yes. June 2nd, I was there.
- 19 Q And --
- 2.0 I would like to say that the reason that I went to this
- 21 location was because of a -- someone asking me had I been to
- 22 that salon, that new salon that's down the street. And I said,
- 2.3 well, no. I didn't know there was one there. And so they told
- 24 me where it was, and I went there, so.
 - And what -- what did you observe when you went to

the salon?

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I guess my first observation would have been that there was no sign or anything on the -- it was like an old house. And there was no signs out or anything like that. I did go -go to the door, and went in. As you enter the salon, there's a large room with a reception desk. And there was a receptionist there, and I spoke with her and introduced myself. I told her that I was there to inspect the salon. And I could see that there was a salon set up. And so she just let me go ahead and look around, and it appeared to me that someone had been working there. And there were two stations set up in the first And then I found that there was another room behind there that had another station set up back there. And they had shampoo bowls, supply cabinets, plenty of supplies. dirty towels in the towel hamper. There was trash in the trash can. And it appeared to me that someone had been working there.

- Q Okay. I notice on your inspection report, you have two names written down on the second page?
- A Yes. This is Donna Rollins. That's one of them. She worked in the back area. That was her area.
- O Was she the one that was called down?
- A No, but she did speak with me.
- MS. ROLLINS: On the phone, yeah.

25 BY THE WITNESS:

A Yes.

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BY MR. JOCHUMS:

- Q And the other name is Kirby?
- A Kirby Ann Chisam. The receptionist called her. She -- no one was -- no operators were there when I entered, but the receptionist called her and she came down. And during the time I was there doing my inspection, she was -- she started -- proceeded to do a haircut.
- Q A client came in?
- A And -- yes. And when I asked her for her license, the only thing she could find was her little purse license and that's what she showed me.

MS. ROLLINS: She is a licensed cosmetologist.

And her license, in trying to move and set up, it was in the box right beside her.

HEARING OFFICER: Wait. We want to try to keep this focused on questions for the witness.

BY MR. JOCHUMS:

- Q I'll go on. Did -- were either of these two people's licenses posted?
- A Yes. Donna's was posted.
- O Donna's license was posted.
- 23 A Uh-huh. Uh-huh.
- 24 || Q But the other one wasn't -- but Kirby's wasn't?
- 25 A Kirby's was not.

- Q You've already told us that there was no sign on the outside --
 - A No sign.

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- 4 Q -- that you saw?
- 5 A Huh-uh.
 - Q Did you say whether there was a shop license posted?
- 7 A No. There was no salon license.
- Q Okay. Right. And in fact the shop license had not been 9 issued?
- 10 | A No, huh-uh.
- 11 Q All right. And you described at least two stations, was
- 12 | that all there was?
- 13 A There were two stations in the first room.
- 14 | Q Okay.
- A And then there was another room that had another station in it.
- 17 0 Oh. So a total of three stations.
- 18 A Uh-huh.
- 19 Q And did it appear that any of the three stations were
- 20 being used or could be used to provide cosmetology services?
- 21 A Yes, definitely.
- 22 Q One of them, two of them, three of them?

Now did you note also some health and safety violations? 2 Uhm -- I don't happen to see that. (Leafing through 3 documents.) No. Huh-uh. Yeah, but the other thing I do note here is that the appointment book that I checked, had 4 5 appointments all the way back to January. And so that 6 confirmed to me that, you know, someone had indeed been working 7 I didn't, at that time, know for how long. 8 MR. JOCHUMS: I don't think I have any other 9 questions for this witness at this time. 10 HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Rollins, would you like to 11 ask the inspector any questions? 12 When you got there, were there any MS. Any further questions for this witness? (Pause.) HEARING OFFICER: If there are no further questions MS. PICKERING: I need to I need LaVonne to explain. There were three stations in this building, but there was no license for her to operate MS. LESTER: Huh-uh. MS. PICKERING: at either station? MS. LESTER: Right. Her personal license were posted at her sation. MS. PICKERING: Okay. Just her personal license, but no MS. LESTER: No salon license. MS. PICKERING: But yet, you said MS. LESTER: Donna. It's wrong. MS. PICKERING: Okay. MS. LESTER: It's wrong. MS. PICKERING: Okay. You said that there was		
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	23	MS. PICKERING: Okay.
MS. PICKERING: Okay. You said that there was	24	MS. LESTER: It's wrong.
	25	MS. PICKERING: Okay. You said that there was
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one salon owner, a lady that did haircuts, so why was 1 2. she doing a haircut if you do not have your shop 3 license? 4 MS. ROLLINS: Because. --5 HEARING OFFICER: Wait, wait. If that question 6 is for Ms. Rollins, let's wait. I'll limit it 7 because she's not the witness -- yet. Okay? Just 8 trying to keep it all clear. 9 So, are there any questions for Ms. Lester to 10 the board. 11 (No response.) 12 HEARING OFFICER: If there are none, Mr. 1.3 Jochums, you may call your next witness. 14 Kathy Wittum. 15 THEREUPON, 16 TESTIMONY AND EVIDENCE 17 GIVEN ON BEHALF OF THE STATE BY KATHY WITTUM, 18 having been called for and on behalf of the 19 2.0 State, and having been first duly sworn to tell the 21 truth, testified on her oath as follows, to-wit: 22 DIRECT EXAMINATION 2.3 BY MR. JOCHUMS: 24 Ms. Wittum, you are the executive director, and did you 25 prepare the notice of hearing in this case?

	1
1	A yes.
2	Q And I see in paragraph four, that you have well, I
3	actually see in paragraph three that the respondent has become
4	licensed since the inspector's visit?
5	A Yes.
6	Q And in paragraph four, you make a recommendation for civi
7	penalty in the amount of \$210. Could you share with the board
8	share with us, the rationale for that type of fine?
9	A Those are based upon the infractions noted in Ms. Lester'
10	inspection report. Each one of those are pertaining to the fe
11	schedule that the board has typically used in the past.
12	MR. JOCHUMS: Thank you. I have no other
13	questions of this witness.
14	HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Rollins, do you have any
15	questions that you would like to ask this witness?
16	MS. ROLLINS: No. I've got some things to
17	verify some things that she
18	MR. JOCHUMS: I'm going to I have no
19	additional witnesses for the State.
20	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Does the board have an
21	questions of Ms. Wittum?
22	(No response.)
23	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Ms. Rollins, call your
24	first witness.
25	(Pause.)
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HEARING OFFICER: Are you going to have a witness?

MS. ROLLINS: I can ask her questions, can't I? HEARING OFFICER: Yes.

MS. ROLLINS: Okay. The reason she's here is that, on one of the violations, that I was said to be violating. There — the book was backed up until January. And she called me in October to be my assistant. And she did not put her office, I believe, July. And she called me in May to make sure that it was —

HEARING OFFICER: Where's the question?

MS. ROLLINS: The question is to make sure that

I -- she could still be my assistant.

HEARING OFFICER: But what question are you going to ask?

MS. ROLLINS: I was not at this establishment since January. I'm trying to prove that I was not there, so -- Danielle, you called me in October of '05, wanting to be my assistant at the place I was previously working at, which was G's Salon. And when did you call me to -- again, to make sure that you still would be my assistant?

MS. BURMAN: It started in May when I was getting ready to graduate, and she was still at G's.

	
1	And I was calling to see if I was still going to be
2	her assistant and still working there at G's. She
3	still had a spot there.
4	MS. ROLLINS: And where was what was where
5	is G's?
6	MS. BURMAN: G's is own Harrison Street.
7	MS. ROLLINS: Is that the old salon or the new
8	one?
9	MS. BURMAN: Yeah, the old salon.
10	MS. ROLLINS: So I was still at the old salon at
11	G's, when you called me to verify your job?
12	MS. BURMAN: Yes.
13	MS. ROLLINS: Okay. And I've just got to
14	show I was not there, so January. And I do have
15	pictures. And I also have some billing statements
16	that go to that address, with the dates on them.
17	HEARING OFFICER: Do you have any more questions
18	for this witness?
19	MS. ROLLINS: No.
20	HEARING OFFICER: Mr. Jochums, would you like to
21	ask this witness some questions?
22	MR. JOCHUMS: Where where did you intend to
23	be working when you called?
24	MS. BURMAN: Where do I attend?
25	MR. JOCHUMS: Where did you plan on working when
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2	MS. ROLLINS: When you first
3	MS. BURMAN: Oh, at G's, the old salon, up from
4	the new salon.
5	MR. JOCHUMS: And you say in June, you talked to
6	her at the old salon?
7	MS. BURMAN: Yes. In May I talked to her.
8	MR. JOCHUMS: In May, I'm sorry. And did
9	what did she say about being in the new salon then?
10	MS. BURMAN: She didn't say anything about he
11	new salon. She said yeah, I still have a spot and
12	just to come on down when I get my license.
13	MR. JOCHUMS: Okay. I have no other questions.
14	HEARING OFFICER: Would the board like to ask
15	this witness any questions?
16	(No response.)
17	HEARING OFFICER: There being none, Ms. Rollins,
18	go ahead and you can present and say whatever you
19	want to the board at this time.
20	MS. ROLLINS: Okay. I just have evidence
21	showing that I was not there since January,
22	HEARING OFFICER: And would you bring that up so
23	we can let the board members see it?

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MS. ROLLINS: Sure. And also with a book --

this is our open house, which has Kirby and I in it.

And then these are pictures of us working on the building that I am at now. And on the back it says, Oh, so long.

Oh. Here's a picture, also, at the old salon -- those are pictures of us working on the neutron.

That's -- this is about the sign situation. We haven't got there yet.

HEARING OFFICER: If you've got other things -- MS. ROLLINS: Okay. The other thing --

HEARING OFFICER: -- you need to go ahead and present what you want presented either way.

MS. ROLLINS: Okay. Well, one of the pictures shows that I was at the former salon, which I believe was in April -- it's got the date -- is printed on the photo when it was taken. And then the other pictures has the date on it, in May, where we are working on the building. Just to show that I have not been there since January. And then we were having an open house at the old salon that I worked at, and my picture's in there. And then I've got statements where I ordered products at the old salon, and the address on there.

And I also, when you look you might take into note, some salons have one huge appointment book.

And some all have their individual. They make their

own appointments. When she looked at the appointment book, I couldn't worked ten different places in January. If you have established clients and customers, they can follow you anywhere. So it was — you know, every year we'd all get a book in January, but it doesn't really say where you work at. So, you know, it could've been numerous places. So on that, you know, that's — I just want to say that I am not guilty of that at all. I've not been there since January.

And the other is that I think that, personally, that should be reworded. Just my total misunderstanding --

HEARING OFFICER: Just clarify what you mean by that, just so the board knows what you're talking about.

MS. ROLLINS: The new establishment registration. It's fine what it says, but I do think it should be added, because my understand — it says right at the beginning, that this form and a \$50 registration fee is to be filed approximately two weeks before your opening date. And the opening date is what got me, is what made me stall and not fill it out. Because I'm like, I'm not going to be ready to open in two weeks. There is no way I can get this

building ready to go, so that is the only reason.

When it said two weeks before your opening date, I thought, okay, I'm going to try to figure out about when I think I can open this up for the public. And then I've got — then I'll send it off. I will — should be added, also in there, I do think. And like I said, I've been doing hair for 20 years, and that even that go me, that this should be sent off immediately if you're going to open a salon. And you've got to make sure that you definitely have this license within two weeks. You know, give us two weeks. But when it said before your — two weeks before your opening date, that's the way I took it. I had two weeks before my opening date. And that's why I did not have a salon license.

And -- I can't think of her name. I want to say Keneshia, --

MS. LESTER: Shaunta?

MS. ROLLINS: Shaunta sent me a thing, and she said, you know, you're good to go with this. And —but, I totally thought, you know, I've got to be ready in two weeks of when I get this. So I think there should be added a little bit more to that, on the registration form because I am definitely guilty of not having my salon license for those few days,

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but I wasn't ready to open. So I didn't send it in, because I though I couldn't -- I had to be ready within two weeks was my total understanding on that. So that is definitely a deal.

And the other is I am also written up for not having my sign posted. And I do have photos where it was this invoice, and you guys may keep this. It will be fine. It was painted and brought to be installed, and they could not install it because of Frito-Lay guy hit our pole. That's just kind of my luck.

HEARING OFFICER: Does the board have any questions?

MS. ROLLINS: And our signs were on the side, so I'm not guilty of that either, along with the January thing.

You know, this -- you'll see poles behind this photo. That is not on my property. This (indicating) is on the property. And then they brought it and we were dragging it in and out, because my husband said, someone is going to steal your sign. So every day -- this is a piece of -- this is a four by six, and it's heavy. And we were dragging it in and out, and people go, no one can read your sign in front of -- you know, in front of

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those shrubberies. And well, you know, we can't put it up right now. So I'm like -- so what I did do is drag it in and out. But the day you came, I don't know if you looked at the -- it's like not even there. But the -- that's when I was not there. those, where they're up against. You can see they're up against the building, but of course you didn't see them. But that day, I drag it and that big -- there is another big, blue -- I call it the green room. And I drag it out there and put it in front of the parking area, leaned up against the shrubberies. But that day, I wasn't there. And the girls just left them -- faced to the side of the house, the receptionist and the lady who owns the nutrition They didn't know any differently. receptionist has no knowledge of hair, at all what soever.

MS. ROLLINS: I'd like to say that I think that
LaVonne did an excellent job on her inspection, and
she's very thorough by the looks of the papers, and I
did meet her the second time. And she explained a
lot of things to me that I did not understand. And I
just -- I just think that maybe clarifying on that
new salon thing, new shop license, might help, --

because I just didn't know.

But the old shop is called G's Salon. And it will be on the statement. And the new one is called Harrison Street Salon & Spa. And I have, actually, eight stations. And I bought this equipment and set them all up. And I had built myself customized stations. And then I had somebody make a model of all of these for some one day I get it all filled up. And they're all color-coded. So they were there and set up. And the dryers I bought, but it wasn't -- no one even works in that one room. So it looks like we're all, you know, it's set up for all these employees to be there, but not operational, yet -- at this moment.

HEARING OFFICER: Mr. Jochums, do you have any questions for Ms. Rollins?

MR. JOCHUMS: Yes. I have a couple of them.

One of the pictures of the same salon on the back is of a gentleman and young woman?

MS. ROLLINS: Yes?

MR. JOCHUMS: What is that supposed to show?

MS. ROLLINS: That is the shop, the old shop.

MR. JOCHUMS: Then that's not you, then, in the picture?

MS. ROLLINS: No.

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1	MR. JOCHUMS: Okay. You just
2	MS. ROLLINS: That's not my
3	MR. JOCHUMS: this is a picture of people you
4	just what's the significance of this picture?
5	MS. ROLLINS: The significance of that picture
6	is to show that I was at the old salon in April, and
7	then I was not I've not been at this new
8	establishment since January. That's the only purpose
9	of that picture.
10	MR. JOCHUMS: Now, how far apart are the two
11	establishments?
12	MS. ROLLINS: Harrison Street is the main street
13	in Batesville. Let's see.
14	MR. JOCHUMS: One of the is at 2265 and the
15	other one is
16	MS. ROLLINS: Uh-huh. That's the same street.
17	MS. CAUDLE: They're not that far apart.
18	MS. ROLLINS: Wal-Mart. You've got to go
19	through the I don't know.
20	MR. JOCHUMS: What's the new address?
21	MS. ROLLINS: It's 616 Harrison Street. Here's
22	a major shop right in Batesville, the main one, was
23	the big three story bank. You probably know what I'm
24	talking about.
25	MR. JOCHUMS: I'm just

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1	MS. ROLLINS: Okay. You've got to go on
2	through.
3	MR. JOCHUMS: None of us live in Batesville.
4	MS. ROLLINS: Okay. Well, Harrison Street is
5	well, I don't know.
6	MR. JOCHUMS: A mile away?
7	MS. BURMAN: A half a mile.
8	MS. ROLLINS: Yeah, maybe more.
9	MS. CAUDLE: It's not a mile.
10	MS. ROLLINS: No, I don't think it is.
11	MS. CAUDLE: You can go all the way across
12	Batesville in a mile.
13	MS. ROLLINS: About four stop lights away. I
14	don't know.
15	MR. JOCHUMS: Okay. And
16	MS. ROLLINS: That's hard for me to say. I
17	don't know.
18	MR. JOCHUMS: Okay. At any rate,
19	MS. ROLLINS: It's the
20	MR. JOCHUMS: But is that you are still doing
21	you were a cosmetologist still doing hair at G's in
22	June?
23	MS. ROLLINS: In May and the first
24	MR. JOCHUMS: When was the inspector there?
25	MS. CAUDLE: June 6th.
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	19.
1	MS. ROLLINS: No. Until the month of May, June
2	until the end of June.
3	MR. JOCHUMS: Well, would there have been
4	anything to prevent you from working in both places?
5	MS. ROLLINS: Yes.
6	MR. JOCHUMS: What?
7	MS. ROLLINS: I'm just I'm not a floating
8	cosmetologist, and I wanted to open a salon that had
9	more that had everything.
10	MR. JOCHUMS: All right. And let me ask, also -
11	- I didn't quite understand about the appointment
12	book. The appointment book the inspector saw
13	included the work you did in June?
14	MS. ROLLINS: Yes. It was the whole
15	MR. JOCHUMS: Just for you, for a year? It
16	didn't have anybody else in it?
17	MS. ROLLINS: No. We all had our separate
18	appointment books.
19	MR. JOCHUMS: Okay.
20	MS. ROLLINS: And I just carried that with me.
21	That really doesn't say, you know, where I'm at.
22	MR. JOCHUMS: Right. Okay. I understand that.
23	The other thing I want to ask is when did you open
24	the new facility?
25	MS. ROLLINS: I don't know the exact date.
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1	MR. JOCHUMS: You were still at an open house at
2	the other one on May 5, weren't you?
3	MS. ROLLINS: Yes. I was still at the old
4	salon.
5	MR. JOCHUMS: So would some time in June or July
6	when it opened, had your grand opening?
7	MS. ROLLINS: I haven't even had a grand
8	opening.
9	MR. JOCHUMS: You haven't had one of those at
10	the new salon. Okay. Well, have you started taking
11	customers?
12	MS. ROLLINS: Oh, yes. What did you say her
13	name was again?
14	MS. BURMAN: Oh, Shaunta?
15	MS. ROLLINS: Shaunta faxed me a thing, and she
16	said you put that up and you're good until your
17	license
18	MS. LESTER:
19	MS. ROLLINS: That's when I started taking
20	clients.
21	MR. JOCHUMS: So about a week after the
22	inspector came to your salon?
23	MS. LESTER: Uh-huh.
24	MS. ROLLINS: Uh
25	MR. JOCHUMS: According to the notice of hearing
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MS. ROLLINS: Yes, but I want to say --

MR. JOCHUMS: -- you submitted your new shop application June 8th.

MS. ROLLINS: I don't know exactly the date, but when I found out, yes.

MR. JOCHUMS: Well, when did you, and I don't really care whether you technically hire or they can rent the space, when did you line up the people who were going to work in the new salon?

MS. ROLLINS: I didn't. There was just one girl from the other one that came with me. And it was just her and me.

MR. JOCHUMS: Okay.

MS. ROLLINS: And she was hired as my assistant at the old place, and then I moved to this place and opened in myself. And she was hired as my assistant, but now she's just on her own as a cosmetologist and still assists me.

MR. JOCHUMS: What -- one thing I'm wondering about is if you were still remodeling and getting the place ready to go, why did you have a receptionist there?

MS. ROLLINS: I was trying to -- she had a regular job and she has three little children. And I

was trying to show her what I would need her to do. How to do it, she didn't know anything about how long a hair cut, a perm, a style or anything was. So she was basically setting her little things up to get ready, and putting her personal stuff up. And like I said, there was not any operators or stylists in there at all. The receptionist was there, but also she come in to help the lady with the nutrition center answer her phone. Basically just taking calls if someone called, but no operators -- was even there at all. I officially was not open.

MR. JOCHUMS: Let me ask another one. You described the sign.

MS. ROLLINS: On the side.

MR. JOCHUMS: Did you take this picture after the inspector was there?

MS. ROLLINS: After she left, yeah.

MR. JOCHUMS: That would've been June?

MS. ROLLINS: Because I wasn't there when she got there. But we -- it's up now. I didn't think to take a picture, but it's up and it's -- it's up on our highway. But the fellow -- there's a dumpster, and they cut through and there's a little mall. And the guy, I think, was just looking at dumpster and looking at poles and -- smack. And no pole.

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1	MR. JOCHUMS: I have no other questions.
2	HEARING OFFICER: Are there questions from the
3	board?
4	MS. POWELL: I'd like to ask Ms. Rollins one.
5	You said you're unclear of when you had a license to
6	this building to operate out of?
7	MS. ROLLINS: When Shaunta yeah. I
8	MS. POWELL: Yes.
9	MS. ROLLINS: the official one or the
10	authorization to go go for it?
11	MS. POWELL: Your authorization that says you're
12	eligible to operate that facility.
13	MS. ROLLINS: I don't know the exact date.
14	MS. POWELL: So then, I assume it was probably
15	after June 2nd?
16	MS. POWELL: And then June the 8th You
17	said that at this new facility, you had a reception
18	hired that was getting her stuff set up, right? And
19	that you were currently working in another salon
20	in G's; correct?
21	MS. ROLLINS: For like a day or two.
22	MS. POWELL: Before before your salon was
23	open, you were working at another salon called G's;
24	is that right?
25	MS. ROLLINS: Yes. Yes.
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And you had a reception that was MS. POWELL: 1 2. over here in your new salon, getting set up, right? 3 (No audible response given.) MS. POWELL: You said that you had to carry this 4 5 sign in, in and out all the time, because the pole 6 had been knocked down, right? 7 (No audible response given.) 8 MS. POWELL: Why would you be carrying a sign in 9 and out if you're not there? 10 MS. ROLLINS: Because the other lady that has 11 the business. I knew I was going to be opening, but 12 I didn't have it open right yet. And so the people 1.3 that was working on my sign got it done a lot quicker 14 than I thought they would. But the pole was gone. 15 This lady needed her sign up, also. So I had my 16 signs drug in. And they would drag it, just in and 17 out. MS. POWELL: Even though you weren't open, you 18 19 weren't even there? 2.0 MS. ROLLINS: Even though it wasn't officially 21 open. 22 MS. POWELL: Well, our problem with the sign, is 2.3 it a pink sign that I just saw? 24 MS. ROLLINS: It's pink. And then there's one, 25 you see the corner of the other sign, but it's a Teresa Iden, CCR

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high-energy -- I don't know if --1 2. MS. POWELL: It's your -- is it your sign that 3 you're carrying in and out, or is it a sign for more than one business? 4 5 MS. ROLLINS: More than one business. 6 MS. POWELL: Well, maybe I need to see that sign 7 again, because I didn't see that. 8 MS. ROLLINS: You see a little bit of it. 9 MR. JOCHUMS: Move to the pink sign. 10 MS. POWELL: Is there a pink sign on there? 11 MS. ROLLINS: There's a sign in the corner. 12 MS. POWELL: It's looks like a little guy -- a 1.3 little man, a little old fat man standing there. MR. ROLLINS: It's just as big as mine, but it's 14 15 wider. And it's metal and it's heavier. MS. POWELL: But what are you carrying in and 16 17 out, your pink sign or someone else's sign? MS. ROLLINS: Both of them. 18 19 MS. POWELL: They're attached? 20 MS. ROLLINS: No. But they would drag them in 21 and out, whether I was even -- even when I was there 22 or not, the people that were in there, none of the 2.3 people -- the nutrition lady -- the nutrition was, 24 the receptionist, and people that was just helping me 25 remodel and painting and getting ready, they -- none

of them, have any idea about hair, nothing. And they dragged the signs. They just drug it in, drug it out. And a lot of times I didn't even know -- or like I said, I didn't know it was on the side of the building until I see that on the side. And this a 1926 home. It's a two-story.

MS. POWELL: But it appears that someone knows how to advertise your facility for business by this sign.

MS. ROLLINS: Yes.

(Pause.)

HEARING OFFICER: Are there any more questions from the board for this witness?

MS. ROLLINS: The sign, though, was not officially put up until way before opening date. I do want to state that. And the sign -- I'd probably had the sign up outside, maybe, a couple of weeks.

HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Ms. Turman?

MS. TURMAN: Did you admit earlier that you actually were practicing without your shop -- your license in there?

MS. ROLLINS: No, no, no. I've always had my license.

MS. TURMAN: Okay. Excuse me, but I mean, I thought you said that you clearly did -- were in

there practicing as a cosmetologist before your license arrived?

MS. ROLLINS: My shop license.

MS. TURMAN: You already had your personal license, but your shop license had not arrived?

 $\operatorname{MS.}$ ROLLINS: Because I misunderstood the letter.

MS. TURMAN: But did you know that you shouldn't be practicing --

MS. ROLLINS: No.

MS. TURMAN: -- without a license for your shop?

MS. ROLLINS: I thought I had -- I had my personal license. I thought that would be fine until I got my building completed. And I was -- did hair for probably about three days. Then I basically was doing some paneling and finished up a few customers, because on -- that's what I was saying that I think some things should be reworded on the registration. Because I was -- by the looks of those pictures on the remodeling, I was scared to turn that in because I thought I had only two weeks before opening. So I would not turn it in to get my shop license because I was not going to be ready to open in two weeks. There was no way I could have it ready, and I thought -- I'm not going to take any appointments. I'm not

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1	going to take anything. I'm just kind of training
2	the receptionist on what she would be doing. And
3	that's why none of the none of us operators, the
4	two of us, which was myself and the other girl was
5	not there.
6	MS. TURMAN: Did you also state that you thought
7	it was a vendetta against you that she had written
8	you up, or did I hear you correctly?
9	MS. ROLLINS: Oh, as a personal vendetta that
10	she showed up, but it's not from her.
11	MS. TURMAN: That's quite a
12	MS. TRAYLOR: I don't understand.
13	MS. TURMAN: I don't understand that. I mean,
14	that's an accusation that I think maybe we should
15	clarify?
16	MS. ROLLINS: I can.
17	MS. LESTER: What she is saying is
18	MR. JOCHUMS: Let me ask you something.
19	MS. LESTER: Oh.
20	MR. JOCHUMS: When was your last day at G's?
21	MS. ROLLINS: I can't remember.
22	HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Lester, you had something
23	to say?
24	MS. LESTER: Yes. She doesn't mean a personal
25	vendetta toward me.
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1	MS. WEST: Okay.
2	MS. ROLLINS: No.
3	MS. TRAYLOR: Oh, I thought that's what she was
4	saying.
5	MS. ROLLINS: No.
6	MS. LESTER: No.
7	MS. TURMAN: And if you did, I wanted it
8	clarified.
9	MS. LESTER: No.
10	MS. ROLLINS: Huh-uh.
11	MS. TURMAN: Okay. I understand. I'm sorry. I
12	misunderstood, too. Thank you.
13	HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Gordon?
14	MS. GORDON: I think I have two questions. Now,
15	the people that was working on the salon, that you
16	were getting ready to open, they were the ones that
17	was dragging the sign in and out?
18	MS. ROLLINS: Different ones would drag it in
19	and out, just thinking that's what they were supposed
20	to do because the other lady she was already, the
21	high-energy lady when they drug her sign out,
22	they'd drag mine out, too. There are two different
23	businesses.
24	MS. GORDON: Okay. I understand that. I'm
25	saying the people that was remodeling would do that?
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2	to make it into a salon.
3	MS. GORDON: I mean moving the sign out so they
4	could have room to work; is that what you stated?
5	MS. ROLLINS: Well, they had moved it out
6	because they thought they were supposed to. But I
7	wasn't open for business yet. So the sign had the
8	sign, they had it delivered sooner than I thought.
9	But I wasn't ready to hang that sign up, because I
10	wasn't ready to open.
11	MS. GORDON: Did I hear you say that three days
12	before you actually had got your license to open, or
13	your permit to open, that you were in the salon doing
14	hair?
15	MS. ROLLINS: Yes, I was.
16	MS. GORDON: And someone else had also been in
17	there cutting hair before?
18	MS. ROLLINS: Just both of us about the same
19	amount of time.
20	MS. GORDON: Okay. You'd sent in for your

When you saw the appointment book, do you remember how recent the 14 15 latest appointments were? Were they just before you 16 were there or was there a gap in between there where 17 you didn't have any appointments? Did you --18 MS. LESTER: No, there was no gap. 19 MS. WARD: So there was appointments --2.0 MS. LESTER: Appointments just continued on all 21 the way through, so I'm going to say "yes". 22 MS. WARD: She had been working all the way 2.3 through, but --24 MS. ROLLINS: But there were no appointments. 25 Since January.

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MS. WARD: No, I'm not talking about is -- I mean, let's say like in May, to June. Was there a gap in between there? That's what I'm looking for, because since you were working in that appointment book, because otherwise if you wasn't taking appointments -- there should be a couple of weeks anyway, when you wouldn't have any appointments. And there was no spaces in there.

MS. ROLLINS: I couldn't work too much, because I don't reschedule my people.

HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Are there any other questions?

MS. ROLLINS: I've got one. On that situation,

HEARING OFFICER: Wait. You really can't ask the board questions right now.

MS. ROLLINS: Oh. I'm sorry. I'll just make a comment.

HEARING OFFICER: You can go ahead and make any closing statements, if you want to do that. Then this is your time, go right ahead.

MS. ROLLINS: I did not know I was going to be leaving my previous job, so therefore whatever appointments I had was that was on my book, was on my book would make the reason why it would look like it

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did, even though most of those customers were called and cancelled.

My closing statement is that I'm guilty of working without a shop license -- unaware, you know, didn't quire understand that, but I'm very guilty of it. I'm not guilty of working there since January and the sign situation, but you can clearly see why the sign was not visible.

HEARING OFFICER: At this time we will go off the record for the board to deliberate and go back on record with a motion.

(WHEREUPON, discussion and deliberations were had by the board, after which proceedings resumed as follows, to-wit:)

HEARING OFFICER: We're back on the record to take a motion to the board.

MS. POWELL: Do I have a motion?

MS. TURMAN: Finding the allegations being true, I move to suspend -- wait, wait. I'm sorry.

Finding the allegations being true, I move to order the respondent to pay a fine in the amount of \$210 payable within 30 days of receipt of the board's order. Failure to pay the fine as ordered will result in a suspension of the respondent's salon license beginning 30 days from receipt of the order

and extending for a period of 90 days from the date 1 2. the respondent relinquishes their license. 3 MS. TRAYLOR: I second that motion. MS. POWELL: I have a motion and a second for 4 5 the respondent to pay a fine in the amount of \$210. 6 Is there any further discussion? 7 (No response.) 8 MS. POWELL: All those in favor, raise your 9 right hand. (Show of hands.) 10 11 MS. POWELL: It's unanimous. Motion carries. 12 HEARING OFFICER: Let the record reflect that 1.3 the decision of the board was unanimous. 14 decision of the board will be reduced to writing and 15 service made on this respondent. If you care to take 16 an appeal, one can be taken under the Administrative 17 Procedures Act 25-15-210. 18 Are there any other questions or comments at this time? 19 2.0 (No Response.) 21 HEARING OFFICER: And there being none, this 22 hearing is concluded and the record is closed. 2.3 Thank you. 24 MS. WITTUM: Ms. Rollins, do you want any of 25 these back? If so, we can make copies.

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MS. ROLLINS: I can look through them. And I actually brought those for them to go into my file to show that -- my innocence on the sign and the January thing on the book.

MS. WITTUM: Okay.

MS. ROLLINS: Because the other --

MS. WITTUM: These are our copies?

MS. ROLLINS: Yeah. Let me -- let me show you.

MS. POWELL: We're going to take a short recess. We'll be back at 3:00.

(WHEREUPON, a short break was taken, after which proceedings resumed as follows, to-wit:)

MS. POWELL: The meeting will come back to order.

HEARING ORDER NO. 07-007: RUBEN MEDINA

HEARING OFFICER: There's one more matter before us. It's Ruben Medina, 07-007. Mr. Medina is not here, but he has sent a letter that we'll receive into evidence as Board's Exhibit No. 1, along with the cover letter and notice of hearing.

(WHEREUPON, Board's Exhibit No. 1 to HO#07-007 having been identified for the record, was received into evidence and marked to append.)

HEARING OFFICER: And I propose that Ms. Wittum read that letter to you now.

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MS. WITTUM: The letter is addressed to me at the State Board. And he says, "Thank you for your recent correspondence regarding the compliance issue related to the proper licensing of Studio M. Unfortunately, I will be unable to attend the hearing on September 18th. I will be out of state at that time pursuing continuing education and I am unable to reschedule. So, in my absence, I would like the board to review the case while paying close attention to my actions and those of your staff members.

Please give careful consideration to my situation. I do not wish to inconvenience the board in any way by requesting this review. I simply feel strongly that my situation merits a closer look. I have always made every attempt to comply with the rules set forth for the cosmetology industry in Arkansas. Unfortunately, there seems to have been a lack of clear communication between myself, your staff and the board leadership in regard to this matter. This continued communication problem seems to have resulted in the delayed licensing of the salon.

Previously, I faxed information containing a time line that contained prior conversations with

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staff members. Please examine this time line carefully, as it will verify each attempt to properly license the salon and the challenges I faced each time I tried to do so. If, after review, I am still considered as being in violation, I will quickly pay any fees and/or fines that may be due. Thank you for your time." And it's signed, "Sincerely, Ruben Medina."

Mr. Medina did submit a time line that I've gone through, and I've also spoken with Shaunta, who handled this particular application when it came in to relocate his salon. Typically, Cheryl is the one who handled these. This application came in after she left and Shaunta picked it up. I did let Mr. Medina know that we acknowledge that Shaunta made mistakes when she was taking care of the establishment, however, what I told him is that in reviewing the information those mistakes did not, in any way, affect the fact that he did not submit the new establishment for relocation information two weeks prior to the opening of Studio M, which is his new establishment. He submitted the original establishment license for the IceHouse Salon, which he had at 1512 South Arkansas in Russellville, and then what he was hoping to do was change it to Studio

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M and move the salon to 1715 South Arkansas in Russellville. And he was planning to open that salon on March 28, 2006.

According to Mr. Medina, he had a telephone conversation with Shaunta concerning the process to submit the relocation and change of name prior to the submission of the form and the fees. He states, "The conversation occurred on March 24th," which was four days prior. Shaunta does not dispute this, but she did not remember the exact day of that telephone conversation. During that conversation with Shaunta, the respondent states that he informed Shaunta of their intent to open the new location on March 24th. And according to the establishment form, the board requires the application to be submitted within two weeks prior to the opening date. And there is no provision in the law or the rules stipulating a due date for the relocation. However, the board's procedures have always been that it be submitted within the two weeks. There is also a -- I've made a note that Rule 5.4(A) requires notification of the name change to be submitted within 30 days of the And the respondent was in compliance with that particular request.

According to Mr. Medina, Shaunta gave him a

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verbal -- or gave him verbal permission for the salon to be operational as long as she received the check and the relocation form, ASAP. Shaunta disputes authorizing Mr. Medina to open prior to the authorization letter being processed by the office, and in addition, she would not have the authority to do that anyway. And Mr. Medina was informed of that.

According to Mr. Medina, the establishment form and a check for \$50 was sent on March 24th by certified mail. And then he opened Studio M on March 28th at the new location. According to Mr. Medina, the \$50 check that he submitted was returned to him during the first week in May with a letter stating that they needed to pay only \$7. Shaunta disputes that the check and letter were returned in May, although the letter is not dated, Shaunta maintains that it was sent to him at the end of March. According to Shaunta, she misunderstood the establishment form and called to inquire about what they were intending to do. She said that the salon was answered as Studio M, which is the new establishment, so she asked about changing the name and was told that that was what they were doing. This is why she told them that they only needed to

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pay \$7, because that's the fee for changing the name. According to our records, a check dated May 8th for \$7 was processed on May 18th. This process consisted of dual entries, \$5 for the change of the name and \$2 for a duplicate license to be issued.

On May 17th the salon was inspected and cited for failure to have a current license or authorization letter, as well as, for failure to post the health and safety rules. According to Mr. Medina, he had a telephone conversation with Shaunta the following day, after the inspection. It appeared from the information given by Mr. Medina and Shaunta that the intent to both relocate and change the name of the salon was made clear during that conversation. Therefore, Shaunta informed Mr. Medina that the \$50 relocation fee would be required. According to our records, we received that \$50 payment and a transaction was made on June 1st to relocate the salon and he received the letter of authorization on June 1st, according to Mr. Medina. To date the required fee for the relocation and change of name have been received and processed.

In reviewing this information and in speaking with Shaunta, there clearly had been some miscommunication between Mr. Medina and the office

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concerning his applications. The miscommunication resulted in a simple process taking approximately three to four months to complete, as well as resulting in an inspection where the violation was cited. However, the miscommunication and the staff's mistakes do not negate the fact that he failed to properly submit the notification to relocate and change the name of the salon. The board's procedures requires the fee and the form to be submitted two weeks prior to the opening date and this information is, in my opinion, clearly stated on the establishment forms. Instead of following this requirement, the respondent contacted the office by telephone, four days prior to his intended opening date, and then mailed the form and the fees. Medina asked me to consider dismissing this penalty, and after speaking with Mr. Jochums, without the dates that whether or not they should play a part in dismissing it, it was my opinion that they needed to come here to the board for your review.

HEARING OFFICER: Okay. After that explanation by Ms. Wittum, Mr. Jochums, is there anything you would like to add to that?

MR. JOCHUMS: No.

HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Does the board have any

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1	questions they would like to ask Ms. Wittum for
2	further explanation or clarification at this time?
3	Ms. Turman.
4	MS. TURMAN: Kathy, did you state that he didn't
5	have any safety rules posted either?
6	MS. WITTUM: Right.
7	MS. TURMAN: So what would that have to do with
8	miscommunication? You know?
9	MS. WITTUM: It would not. It would not. All
10	of the miscommunications that he's referring to are
11	dealing with the establishment form.
12	HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Traylor, do you have a
13	question?
14	MS. TRAYLOR: Well, I don't know if I don't
15	understand it or I'm confused. But he's got he's
16	got his license.
17	MS. WITTUM: He has the he does, now, for
18	Studio M. He did, then, for The Ice House. What he
19	was doing was dissolving The Ice House and changing
20	locations all at the same time.
21	MS. TRAYLOR: Okay. But that has been done.
22	MS. WITTUM: It has now.
23	MS. TRAYLOR: Well, what's he even calling
24	about?
25	MS. WITTUM: He was penalized for not submitting
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his relocation --1 MS. TRAYLOR: Well, then, that's tough. 2. 3 didn't do, he didn't do it. 4 MS. WITTUM: Okay. 5 MS. GORDON: Did he make any other statements 6 around the 24th? 7 MS. WITTUM: That was when he called the office to ask about what to do. 8 9 MS. POWELL: Called on the 24th, but he was 10 actually in there on the 28th. So if he got in there 11 four days before he got -- he called four days before 12 he got in there, but it would still not be sufficient 1.3 for the two weeks notification for the state by-laws. 14 15 MS. TRAYLOR: What was his penalty, Kathy? 16 MS. WITTUM: His penalty is \$70. 17 HEARING OFFICER: Are there any further questions from any of the board members before --18 19 MR. KEENE: Well, didn't you say that he did 20 submit a \$50 check and it was returned to him, he 21 said in May and Shaunta says the end of March? 22 MS. WITTUM: Yes. 2.3 MR. KEENE: Which is it? Was it --24 MS. WITTUM: Well, Shaunta -- they clearly 25 dispute --

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1	MR. KEENE: Well, then why did we send it back?
2	MS. WITTUM: It was sent back because Shaunta
3	did not understand that he was wanting to relocate.
4	She thought that they were just changing the name and
5	staying at the same location.
6	MR. KEENE: Got it.
7	MS. POWELL: And he did not send in the
8	application for a relocation. Shaunta thought he was
9	just doing a name change,
10	MS. WITTUM: He did send in the form, but that
11	form was revised from the one they been using and
12	Shaunta did not understand what he had marked on the
13	new form.
14	MS. GORDON: Explain that again. Now, he did
15	send in a form,
16	MS. WITTUM: He sent in the form
17	MS. GORDON: He sent in the right form at the
18	first?
19	MS. WITTUM: Yes.
20	MS. GORDON: And it was returned to him?
21	MS. WITTUM: Yes. It was.
22	MS. GORDON: Because Shaunta didn't understand -
23	_
24	MS. WITTUM: Yes.
25	MS. GORDON: what he was trying to do.

MS. WITTUM: When he first tried to do it, she received the form and didn't understand it, she called him. And she asked them what they were intending to do. They answered that call with Studio M. She thought at that point they were just talking about changing the name. She asked them if that was what they were intending to do and they said yes. Nothing during that conversation was said about relocating, only changing the name. That's when she told them it was only \$7 that was needed as opposed to the \$50.

MS. POWELL: Which is what she originally thought and is why she sent back the \$50, correct?

MS. WITTUM: Yes.

MS. TURMAN: Kathy, that really doesn't make any difference because he only applied four days prior to his opening when it should've been two weeks, is that correct?

MS. WITTUM: Yes.

MS. GORDON: I have a question. When you sent the \$50 he was not applying for the -- to open Studio M at that time?

MS. WITTUM: He was applying for --

MS. GORDON: Okay. So when she said he only did it four days before, he had actually done it earlier

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1	than the four days before and it was returned to him.
2	Am I correct?
3	MS. WITTUM: No. He sent it
4	MR. KEENE: on the 24th, to open on the 28th.
5	Then it was sent back.
6	MS. GORDON: But prior to that, what day did he
7	send the first form

24	record for the board's motion.
25	MS. POWELL: Do I have a motion?
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MS. TURMAN: Finding the allegations being true, I move to order the respondent to pay a fine in the amount of \$70 -- is that correct?

MS. WITTUM: Yes.

MS. TURMAN: Okay. Payable within thirty days of receipt of the board's order.

MS. TRAYLOR: I second that motion.

MS. POWELL: I have a motion and a second that the respondent pay a \$70 civil penalty. Is there any discussion?

(No response.)

MS. POWELL: All those in favor, raise your right hand.

(Show of hands.)

MS. POWELL: It's unanimous.

HEARING OFFICER: Please let the record reflect that the decision of the board in this matter is unanimous. It will be reduced to writing and service will be made upon Mr. Medina. If he cares to, also in that letter he will be made aware that, an appeal may be taken under the Administrative Procedures Act 25-15-201. If there are no other questions or comments, this hearing is concluded and the record is closed.

HEARING ORDER NO. 07-085: BETTY KIRSCH

HEARING OFFICER: In reference to the other matters that were listed on the agenda today, 07-085, Betty Kirsch, will be continued. They were here earlier.

HEARING OFFICER: We have a motion of the board carried that all those that were read and not present, along with the corresponding fines and the violations listed, stand as listed. The decision will be reduced to writing and sent to them. And if there are no other questions or comments, then the record will be closed.

PUBLIC COMMENT SESSION

MS. POWELL: At this time we'll move into a public comment session. I understand that we have someone that would like to speak to the board. Do you want to come up here, please? State your name.

MS. DRAKE: My name is Nancy Drake.

MS. POWELL: Nancy Gray?

MS. DRAKE: Drake, D-R-A-K-E.

MS. POWELL: Drake. I'm sorry.

MS. DRAKE: I'm down here from Mena, Arkansas. I work for Bobby Penn. I've been living there for about eight years. I originally came down from New York, New Jersey, so I understand certain rules and so forth.

My thing is I have an apron that I had made specifically for some shears that I'd gotten when I went to Tennessee and took a course for Helix. And it takes six shears to do the haircuts on some of

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them that I do, which is a lot of shears that I have to work with. And they're not supposed to be opened up by anybody else, because they work with your own So you have to return them to be sharpened by the guy who originally made them and he's able to sharpen them to your own tension, so you can't really have the scissors shared with anybody. And I had a problem when I had the scissors when I worked in Hotchkins for a short while, where people were curious and they kept taking my scissors. So I came up with an idea for a pouch so I could keep them on me and I wouldn't have to worry about them or reaching in front of my customers every time I have to use a different shear and risk dropping them. I wanted to change the rule that I got written up for having this apron, which I wasn't aware of. I wanted to bring the apron in so I could show you. understand, you know, sanitation, and so forth. my scissors fit in here, with no pockets for hair to collect. Everything goes through to keep them sanitized, and they're covered. The shears -- I have them with me. These shears are close to \$4,000 that I've spent, which is expensive. And I use this to protect them. And this is why I came up here today, so I could bring this to your attention. I have a

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friend of mine that I also made a pouch for, which she started to use, so I called her up and told her that I was going to see you, but I needed to talk to you guys first before she should wear it again, so she wouldn't get written up.

And that was my -- it's unusual, and I'm sorry.

MS. POWELL: All I can say, and I'm sorry, because the board may have other comments, but I'll just say that at this time, there are health and safety regulations that would prevent you from maintaining your shears on your person. They are to be maintained in a closed receptacle when not in use. And I think that goes to say, as well as, you know, at one time we kept our shears on our stations on a little hanger, you know, so although I understand what you're saying about people getting into your implements, as I know all hairdressers typically spend, you know, hundreds of dollars for their cutting shears, it's everyone's problem. But I think we're -- at this point, we're dealing with a health and safety issue, and it says in our rules that instruments and supplies are to be sanitized and stored in a sanitary container. It also says that you're not supposed to carry implements in pockets, I believe.

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MS. DRAKE: Well, the -- yes.

MS. POWELL: Carrying implements or supplies in your garment or uniform is prohibited.

MS. DRAKE: Well, that's why I'm here. If I could somehow maybe change that to where I could wear this -- so I could keep wearing tools with --

MS. TRAYLOR: If we let you, honey, everybody in town would want to. We can't single out one person.

MS. POWELL: Well, we --

MS. DRAKE: I understand. I work with -- a board, I was telling the gentleman, when I was up in New York. We did work, you know, trying to better the schools and regulations and so forth. And I did, I carefully thought this thing through so that it wouldn't be contaminating, so I could keep my implements clean, and I wouldn't have the problem with hair, because I do understand how hair can collect and it would be sitting in it. But I made sure that I wouldn't have anything like that.

MS. POWELL: So at this time, we're going through the steps to make changes in the --

MS. WITTUM: Well, this is actually in the rules, not the law that we're working on currently. We just recently revised the rules themselves. We'll do that again next year after the legislative session

and we bring the rules into compliance with any law changes that are made during the session in January of next year. So at that time, that would be the proper forum for you to bring up suggestions to change that in the rules themselves.

MS. DRAKE: Okay.

MS. WITTUM: You might just want to pay attention to our website. We'll post any --

MS. DRAKE: I don't have a computer.

MS. WITTUM: Well, then what I'd do is suggest that you contact the office maybe, towards maybe April of next year, as soon as the legislative session is over, we'll have to move into bringing the rules into compliance with law changes. And that could be a suggestion that you bring to the board. At this time, we cannot just arbitrarily change --

MS. DRAKE: No, I understand. I'm just looking at how I can protect, because you do have people that will come up -- I've even had kids and if you're not right there at your station, they will come over and take your scissors and try to cut something with it. And it's a big expense. And that's why I brought it over, because people go over and pick up my shears, because there's different kinds of shears -- and it draws attention. And I have that problem. So it's

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just like I've got to babysit and stay right there, and if I'm busy someplace else, it's been a problem. That's why I devised this, so I could protect it.

MS. POWELL: I understand.

MS. WITTUM: And I think the board consider your suggestion, but then again we have to look at the health and safety issues and that's something that the board has felt that needed to be protected to the point that it was put in the rules to prevent practitioners from wearing their instruments on their person. But again, this is something that you can discuss when we get into the rule revisions next year.

MS. DRAKE: Okay. I appreciate that.

MS. WITTUM: Thank you for coming.
