2	MS. POWELL: The Arkansas State Board of
3	Cosmetology will come to order.
4	I would like to remind everyone to turn off their
5	electronic devices and refrain from talking in the
6	audience.
7	And, Madam Secretary, will you take the roll?
8	Madam Secretary, will you take the roll?
9	MS. GORDON: Oh. Everyone is present, except our
10	new member.
11	MS. POWELL: Kathy Gossage?
12	MS. WITTUM: And she called this morning. She is
13	running fever and ill, so she will not be here today.
14	MS. POWELL: All right. Let's get started.
15	I would like to have the treasurer's report.
16	MS. WARD: On our balance was 173.93, and on

report for the unpaid penalty ledger.

10 MS. WITTUM: As you will see, we have several 11 disciplinary cases that have been heard since, I believe it's July of last year, where the respondents 12 13 have failed to either pay at all or pay in full. The -- I've separated your list there between the 14 15 recommendations to -- to maintain a suspended status for those who haven't paid, and to consider revoking 16 the licenses if they don't pay by February 1st of 17 '07. 18 19 There is also several, on the second page of this, the handout that I just gave you, where I recommend to 20 21 refer some to the Attorney General's Office. 22 Some of these we are having trouble contacting or getting their contact information for these people, so 23 it would be dependent upon whether or not we could 24 locate the respondents. However, most of these, as you 25

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can see, are unlicensed, so we don't have the ability

2 to suspend or revoke a license. 3 I also have some that I recommend that we close their cases. One, the first one there for Tawana 4 Tines, she has paid the majority of her penalty, so I 5 would recommend that we just consider that payment in 6 7 full. 8 MS. POWELL: What number is that? MS. WITTUM: 05-108. It's on the second page. 9 10 And I also have one recommendation for a person who was cited for practicing while unlicensed. He has 11 12 now enrolled in cosmetology school at Velvatex, so I 13 would recommend that we not allow him to examine until 14 he pays his penalty. 15 Do you have any questions about any of this 16 information? 17 MS. TURMAN: Kathy, we do not renew their license 18 if they have an unpaid balance. Do we? 19 MS. WITTUM: Correct. 20 MS. TURMAN: Okay. So that's a --MR. JOCHUMS: So you don't even have to revoke 21 22 them. 23 MS. WITTUM: That's true.

And it's on a suspended status. And according to
Geosuite, which is the new computer system we just

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1	moved into, having a suspended status will prohibit
2	them from being able to renew.
3	MS. PICKERING: Okay.
4	MS. WITTUM: If they come in to renew or if we try
5	to renew it if it comes in the mail, the system will
6	flag it so that we will know that that one is
7	suspended. And the people who try to renew online will
8	be barred from doing so with that suspended status.
9	MS. TURMAN: Okay. Thank you.
10	MR. DOWNEY: I've got one question on that.
11	06-099, the penalty was five dollars?
12	MS. WITTUM: Yes. It was for not posting his
13	license.
14	MS. TRAYLOR: I thought it was more than that.
15	MS. WITTUM: The five dollar penalty.

MR. KEENE: Yeah, but --

9 MS. WITTUM: I mean, it's up to you. We can 10 certainly move her up to -- she's on a suspended status at this time, and she can stay there if you would 11 12 prefer her to do that. 13 MR. KEENE: Well --MS. WITTUM: The -- one -- one thing that I would 14 15 like to point out on Tawana and Alvin, these cases were from Linda's day. 16 17 MR. KEENE: Uh-huh. 18 MS. WITTUM: These two cases are the only two, in 19 all of this that we have here, that we cannot find the 20 files on. So if she were to challenge anything, it 21 would be different. 22 MR. KEENE: That's the answer. MS. WITTUM: And that's the same thing with 23 Mr. Hicks. I mean, we don't have the documentation 24 that I feel we would need to have if they were going to 25

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1 challenge something. 2 MR. KEENE: Okay. And this Cedric Crutchfield, is 3 this the one that involved all the different 4 enforcements and all that --5 MS. WITTUM: Yes. 6 MR. KEENE: -- that went to his house? MS. WITTUM: Yes. 7 And he is enrolled in school as of May, I believe 8 9 it is. And -- yes, May 25th he enrolled in Velvatex. 10 MS. POWELL: Does anybody have a motion? 11 MS. WITTUM: One thing that I do want to point out, on any that are referred to the Attorney General's 12 13 Office for -- for additional review, it will cost us, I 14 think it's, what, a 140-dollar filing fee per --15 MR. JOCHUMS: Yeah. Right. 16 If we actually file any in the court to force --17 MS. TRAYLOR: And we add that on to his fine or 18 his --19 MS. WITTUM: See, there's six --MR. JOCHUMS: No. You would have to -- you can 20 collect it on the back end of his fine. Some of the 21 22 problem with suing some of the people, we will never be 23 able to find them. 24 MS. TRAYLOR: He probably has another name by now. 25 MR. JOCHUMS: And I think some of these people SUSAN B. WHITSON, CCR, INC. (501) 455-1170 16 1 were probably passing through and they are in some other state by now. 2 3 MS. WITTUM: Well, I know the certified letters that we have mailed out have been returned, so it --4 5 except for Rita Landis and Sherry Curry Kimes, they 6 were practicing outside the scope. And both of these ladies requested to be put on a payment plan. Rita 7 failed to make even her first installment. And Sherry 8 made one installment and then failed to make any 9 subsequent installments. 10 11 Those two ladies, we do know where they are. And, 12 in fact, Becky Binns with the health department e-mailed me recently to let me know that she located or 13

she came across Ms. Kimes at Absolute Elegance, working

15	there. So we may even want to consider contacting the
16	owner of that establishment, just to let her know that
17	she does have someone who is working in her
18	establishment with a suspended license, because that
19	could get her in trouble as well.
20	MR. KEENE: Yes. Definitely.
21	MR. DOWNEY: Definitely.
22	MR. JOCHUMS: Each of these, these are not current
23	with their license at all right now?
24	MS. WITTUM: Right. They are all suspended.

MR. JOCHUMS: Okay.

25

1	MS. POWELL: So, will you do those first and then,
2	if you locate them, you will, are you saying, press
3	charges or file and
4	MR. JOCHUMS: It's basically a standard lawsuit to
5	collect a debt, where you file a complaint, the court
6	orders somebody to pay, and the judgment
7	MS. TRAYLOR: Someone still has their cell phone

8	on.
9	MR. JOCHUMS: And but it's best not to do those
10	until you're pretty sure you know where somebody is.
11	Otherwise you're throwing money down
12	MS. POWELL: Well, that's what I was starting to
13	say.
14	MR. JOCHUMS: I did start those a couple of those
15	a year or two ago with Linda. It wasn't her fault but
16	we never found the people we pursued, so we decided we
17	were just out \$140. It was a little lower than that at
18	that point.
19	MS. POWELL: So you will locate them
20	MR. JOCHUMS: We will attempt to.
21	Although we don't have much better relations than
22	you all do.
23	MS. POWELL: But that will hopefully save some
24	money, as far as the 140-dollar filing fee?
25	MR. JOCHUMS: Yes. Oh, yeah. Right.

1 We won't file it unless we're fairly comfortable, 2 someone has a sighting and we can find them. MS. WITTUM: And it may be that the inspectors can 3 keep their eyes and ears open. 4 5 MR. JOCHUMS: Right. MS. WITTUM: And let them know what location they 6 were working at the time they were cited. But, of 7 8 course, they can be anywhere. 9 MR. KEENE: Kathy, going along with the idea of 10 contacting the salon about this one lady that we seem 11 to know where she is at. I know there was a discussion at one point about putting either names in the paper or 12 13 on the Internet with people that have violations. 14 MS. WITTUM: On the website. 15 MR. KEENE: Would this be a case for in the 16 newsletter -- and I realize it's already gone out and 17 been printed, but something that in the next newsletter 18 on people like this --19 MS. WITTUM: Yes. 20 MR. KEENE: -- to allow the salon owners to know 21 that they may have somebody involved --

22 MS. WITTUM: Right. 23 MR. KEENE: -- and they could be held responsible for that person at that point? 24 25 MS. WITTUM: Right. Right. And I -- I would SUSAN B. WHITSON, CCR, INC. (501) 455-1170 19 1 suggest with this few here that we have to put them on 2 the web. We've been working to develop that part of the website, but this we could probably put together 3 quickly enough that we could go ahead and get it on 4 5 there, and that way anybody who visits the website could have that information. 6 MR. KEENE: Right. Because otherwise we'll just 7 8 be throwing the money away. MR. JOCHUMS: Yeah. 9 10 MR. KEENE: Since it's already been published. 11 MR. JOCHUMS: Yeah. I think those two are the 12 only ones.

- 4 MR. TIN NGUYEN: My name is Tin Nguyen.

5 HEARING OFFICER JONES: Be sure and speak loud 6 enough so our court reporter over there can hear 7 everything. 8 And did you receive an order of your Notice of Hearing today? 9 10 MR. TIN NGUYEN: Yes, ma'am. 11 HEARING OFFICER JONES: Okay. And state's counsel, please identify yourself for the record. 12 13 MR. JOCHUMS: Yes. My name is Arnold Jochums. 14 I'll be presenting these cases for the board this morning. 15 16 HEARING OFFICER JONES: And for the benefit of the 17 respondent and those of you who are here today for these hearings, I'll just explain that the board will 18 base its decision solely on the evidence that's 19 20 presented here today. This hearing is being heard 21 under the Administrative Procedures Act. There --22 which means that I don't have to follow the strict 23 rules of evidence. It's kind of discretionary as to whether -- I have certain latitude as to what will be 24 25 allowed in or not.

1	To ensure the efficiency of these proceedings, I
2	will grant some some objections or give cautions to
3	the parties that may not follow in line exactly with
4	what the strict rules of evidence are.
5	The board members here know this case only as it
6	appears in your Notice of Hearing, and if there is
7	anything you would like to have submitted, you may do
8	so, but you must offer it into evidence here today.
9	These proceedings are subject to the Freedom of
10	Information Act, and as such, all parts of the hearing,
11	including deliberations, are open to the public.
12	Do you have any questions about what's going to
13	take place?
14	MS. STEPHANIE WILLIAMS: No, ma'am.
15	HEARING OFFICER JONES: If not, I'll ask that the
16	court reporter swear in all witnesses for the case.
17	Please raise your right hand.
18	COURT REPORTER: Anybody who will testify in this

19	case, please raise your right hand.
20	Was there an investigator in this case?
21	I'm sorry.
22	(WHEREUPON, the witnesses were sworn.)
23	HEARING OFFICER JONES: Okay. Any preliminary
24	matters?
25	Is there anything, Mr. Jochums?
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1	MR. JOCHUMS: One thing I need to ask, is there
2	anybody in the room named Freda Bass?
3	(No response.)
4	HEARING OFFICER JONES: Okay. Do you have any
5	preliminary matters you would like to take care of at
6	this time?
7	MR. JOCHUMS: Yes, ma'am.
8	
	We want to offer as exhibits the Order and Notice
9	of Hearing and a Complaint form signed by Freda Bass, a

- 1 MS. STEPHANIE WILLIAMS: Oh, okay.
- 2 HEARING OFFICER JONES: Do you have any objections
- 3 to these?

4 MS. STEPHANIE WILLIAMS: No. I don't. 5 HEARING OFFICER JONES: Okay. We will enter the 6 official Notice of the Hearing as Exhibit 1; the 7 Complaint from Freda Bass as Exhibit 2; Burns letter 8 Exhibit 3; and the letter from Mr. Nguyen Exhibit 4; 9 and the pictures Exhibit 5. 10 (WHEREUPON, Board's Exhibits Nos. 07-114 1 through 11 5 were received in evidence.). 12 MR. JOCHUMS: My first witness this morning --13 HEARING OFFICER JONES: Do you have any preliminary matters you would like to introduce? 14 MS. STEPHANIE WILLIAMS: Just a question. 15 16 If -- if Mr. Nguyen is not going to dispute the fact that -- that there was an eyebrow waxing and that 17 18 there was a burn, do we need to -- do you all want to 19 go ahead and call your witnesses? 20 MR. JOCHUMS: I would just -- I think I just want 21 to present the director to explain that she got the 22 Complaint, et cetera. MS. STEPHANIE WILLIAMS: Okay. 23 24 HEARING OFFICER JONES: And what was your name, one more time?

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I didn't catch it. 1 2 MS. STEPHANIE WILLIAMS: Stephanie Williams. 3 HEARING OFFICER JONES: Okay. Go ahead, Mr. Jochums. 4 5 I'm sorry. MR. JOCHUMS: My witness is Kathy Wittum. 6 WHEREUPON, 8 KATHY WITTUM, having been called for examination, and having been first duly sworn by the undersigned notary public, was examined and testified, as follows: 11 12 DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. JOCHUMS: 14 Q Please state your name and title. Kathy Wittum, Director of the State Board of Cosmetology. 15 A Ma'am, did your office receive the Complaint from Freda Bass 16 Q as has previously been mentioned?

- 18 A Yes.
- 19 Q And did you also receive the handwritten two-page letter
- 20 that appears to be signed by Mr. Nguyen?
- 21 A Yes. I did.
- 22 Q Okay. And what do -- to short -- short circuit it, what was
- 23 the essential complaint that she made and how does that relate to
- 24 the order that you actually issued?
- 25 A Ms. Bass alleged that she went to Fancy Nails and had eye

- 1 wax -- or eyebrow waxing performed. There is only manicurists
- 2 employed, from our record, at this location; so it would be
- 3 outside the scope for a manicurist to perform those services.
- 4 Q And that is what he is charged with today?
- 5 A Yes.
- 6 Q The -- how the -- how a burn happened or how serious it was
- 7 or any of those things are not issues in this case?
- 8 A That's correct.
- 9 Q The issue is what license does he have?

2 MS. STEPHANIE WILLIAMS: I don't have any

3 witnesses. 4 I would just like to let you know, from 5 Mr. Nguyen's perspective, the person who actually 6 performed the waxing was his wife who, at the time, did have a manicurist's license. And since that time she 7 8 has -- and the date that it was issued is September 13th -- she has acquired a license so that 9 10 she can do waxes in the future. She is currently not working because she had a 11 12 baby, so she is not working in the salon at all. But, yeah, he recognizes that she did not have a license at 13 14 that time and she does now. MS. TRAYLOR: Is she a manicurist? 15 16 HEARING OFFICER JONES: Does the board -- would the board like to ask any questions of Mr. Nguyen? 17 MR. JOCHUMS: If I -- I think what they are saying 18 19 is that they admit that someone unlicensed did this particular client on the day as alleged, and so they 20 21 are not contesting that. And I suppose you may be asking for leniency in this case? 22 23 MS. STEPHANIE WILLIAMS: I mean, that's true.

- You know, she -- she did perform waxing for this
- particular client. They never engaged in advertising

1	that they offered that service. It was not anything
2	that was routinely done.
3	From Mr. Nguyen, it's my understanding that she
4	was a very good customer and on that occasion she asked
5	his wife to perform that service. And they both
6	recognize that it was a huge mistake and are very sorry
7	that it happened.
8	But I just wanted to inform everyone that from
9	September 13th forward, she does have a license to
10	perform that.
11	MR. KEENE: What license, though?
12	MS. POWELL: Yeah, what license?
13	MR. JOCHUMS: What license does she now have?
14	MS. POWELL: She has a manicure license.
15	MS. TRAYLOR: But she still can't do it.
16	MR. JOCHUMS: Well, let her bring that up.

17 MS. POWELL: Bring it up to the director. MS. STEPHANIE WILLIAMS: I guess I'm just 18 telling -- showing you all this to know that, you know, 19 20 at the time she was in the salon she was there because 21 she was an employee and from day to day performed 22 manicures. 23 MS. POWELL: But I think the confusion here is 24 that she is a --25 MR. JOCHUMS: Now she is a --SUSAN B. WHITSON, CCR, INC. (501) 455-1170 34 1 MS. WITTUM: She was issued an aesthetician 2 license on September 13. MS. POWELL: Okay. But she was a licensed 3 4 manicurist when she --5 MS. STEPHANIE WILLIAMS: That's right. That's 6 right. MR. JOCHUMS: Right. When the event happened. 7 8 Right.

9 MS. POWELL: Okay. So she's a licensed 10 aesthetician as of September 13th? 11 MS. STEPHANIE WILLIAMS: Right. But, you know, just I wanted to let you know that's why she was in the 12 salon, because she was there regularly doing manicures. 13 14 And counsel is correct, we're just asking for leniency. 15 HEARING OFFICER JONES: Are there any questions 16 the board would like to ask for Ms. Williams or 17 18 Mr. Nguyen? 19 Are there any questions they have for Mr. Jochums? 20 MS. TRAYLOR: I was just confused. I thought --21 she has the license now, but I thought it was just she 22 had obtained a manicurist license. I thought she still 23 couldn't do that. 24 HEARING OFFICER JONES: Right. 25 If there are no further questions, Mr. Jochums, SUSAN B. WHITSON, CCR, INC. (501) 455-1170

1 would you like to make any closing statements?

2 MR. JOCHUMS: The point is, on July 6, the person 3 performing this is not licensed. According to the 4 notarized Complaint it was Mr. Nguyen and he says it 5 was my wife. 11	MS. WEST: I have a question for our director.
12	Could you tell me, on the nature of the complaint,
13	the I know that that is this is brought about by
14	a complaint, that we're not dealing with that. But it
15	would still help us to know the extremity of the

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complaint. 17 MS. WITTUM: Well, according to Ms. Bass, the --18 while the services were being performed, wax was 19 dropped on her face below her right eye that resulted 20 in a burn, and what she considers to be a permanent scar. You have a copy of that, of the picture that 21 22 they took attached to the Complaint there. And it does 23 show an indication there where it was burned below her 24 right eye, towards the corner of her eye. HEARING OFFICER JONES: Are there any further 25 SUSAN B. WHITSON, CCR, INC. (501) 455-1170 37 questions? 1 2 MS. STEPHANIE WILLIAMS: May I -- may I speak? 3 HEARING OFFICER JONES: If there are no other 4 questions, Ms. Williams, you may make a closing 5 statement. MS. proper or not, but Mr. Nguyen has in a separate venue

And I think that the fact that he settled with her so quickly 7 8 and for such a substantial amount does indicate that he 9 has learned a lesson and that he is very unlikely to 10 have such a mistake in the future. 11 MS. TURMAN: Can I make a comment? 12 I think that settlement was the legal between he and the client. That does not have anything to do with 13 the board. 14 MS. STEPHANIE WILLIAMS: Yes, ma'am, I understand. 15 I just thought that -- that the fine would take 16 into consideration whether or not he would be likely 17 18 to --19 MS. 14 submitted it --15 MS. POWELL: On July the 6th, it says the 16 Complaint was received by the board. 17 MS. WITTUM: Initially, when she submitted the Complaint form, she did not send any additional 18 information, and I held off bringing it to the board 19 trying to get the information that she said she had to 20 21 have earned the injury that she had suffered. And so we were able to get that from the attorney in 22 23 September, and that's the reason why it's here now. - 15 Q Okay. Had you been in this establishment previously?
- 16 A Yes.
- 17 Q And have they been in business for some time, or is this a
- 18 new --
- 19 A I -- this salon has been -- it's been there for some time.
- 20 I think it's changed owners, it may have changed ownership a time
- 21 or two.
- I don't recall exactly how long it's been there. Maybe a
- 23 year, year and a half.
- 24 Q Are there other items of health and safety that need to be
- 25 pointed out?

- 1 Well, let me ask you another question.

- 9 we're going to ask the husband questions, we need to
- bring him in and have him as a witness, if you all want
- to ask him questions, and Ms. Kirsch doesn't mind, we
- 12 need to swear him in as --
- MS. TEMPLE: I want to call him.
- 14 HEARING OFFICER JONES: Mr. Kirsch, if you will

- 15 come up and be sworn in by the court reporter. 16 MS. GREEN: You need me to get another chair or do 17 you want --18 MR. TEMPLE: No, that's fine. 19 MS. POWELL: Well, I don't think there is any dispute that those license is --20 21 WHEREUPON, DALE TEMPLE, 22 having been called for examination, and having been first duly sworn by the undersigned notary public, was examined and 25 testified, as follows:
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HEARING OFFICER JONES: Okay. Now then, do you
 all want to ask Mr. Kirsch questions and Ms. Kirsch?

5	And I was late about checking on it because I've had a
6	lot of health problems, was in the hospital, and the

8	MS. POWELL: So you would never write one check

10	to be heard before the Arkansas State Board of
11	Cosmetology. Today is November 20, 2006. We are
12	located in the conference room of the Main Street Mall.
13	Would the respondent please identify yourself for
14	the record.
15	KIM PHAM: Kim Pham.
16	THAO PHAM: Thao Pham.
17	TOM PHAM: Tom Pham.
18	MS. TURMAN: I didn't hear.
19	HEARING OFFICER JONES: Okay. You all are going
20	to have to speak up, first of all. But only one of you
21	are listed on our notice of hearing, and that's the
22	respondent, Kim Pham.
23	The other two of you, I suppose you're here to be
24	witnesses today?

25 KIM PHAM: They the one doing her nail. Thao.

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1	HEARING OFFICER JONES: And that they will be your
2	witnesses?
3	KIM PHAM: Yes.
4	HEARING OFFICER JONES: But for the respondent,
5	that's just you, Ms. Pham, okay, as the owner.
6	Okay. And counsel for the board?
7	MR. JOCHUMS: My name is Arnold Jochums. I will
8	be presenting the case this morning.

9	KIM PHAM: Okay. We give her the nailtek to
10	protect her nail when we take off her nails. We have
11	this we want to show you.
12	HEARING OFFICER JONES: Okay. If you would, bring

- 4 KATHY WITTUM,

- 7 testified, as follows:
- 8 DIRECT EXAMINATION
- 9 BY MR. JOCHUMS:
- 10 Q Kathy, you've been previously sworn.
- 11 You're the director of the cosmetology board?
- 12 A Yes. I am.
- 13 Q And did the board receive a complaint from Linda Balch?
- 14 A Yes. We did.
- 15 Q Okay. And in that complaint, did she allege that a couple
- 16 named Lynn and Tom both performed services on her?
- 17 A Yes.
- 18 Q Okay. And did she complain that these treatments resulted
- 19 in problems for her?

- 16 Q She was given nail drops to improve the condition and the
- 17 pain got worse. She then had the nails removed and was given
- 18 nailtek foundation, this little bottle. Later seen by a doctor
- 19 and her condition continued to decline?
- 20 A Yes.
- 21 Q And also you've now learned that she's since has passed
- 22 away, not related to the nails. Right?
- 23 A That's correct.
- MR. JOCHUMS: Okay. I have no other questions for
- 25 Kathy.

- 1 HEARING OFFICER JONES: Ms. Pham, is there any
- 2 questions that you would like to ask Ms. Wittum?

- 5 Can you spell your name really quickly?
- 6 THE WITNESS: T-H-A-O and P-H-A-M.
- 7 HEARING OFFICER JONES: Thank you.
- 8 Okay. Go ahead with your questions, Kim Pham.
- 9 BY KIM PHAM:
- 10 Q Yes. Can you explain for them when she came in and what
- 11 happened?
- 12 A Yes. Yes. She come to our shop like -- at least like six
- 13 weeks, you know, every time. But our -- I recommend her like
- 14 come back every two weeks. But between the times every two
- 15 weeks, she gone somewhere else, I didn't know that. But she come
- 16 to my shop some time like eight weeks, six week, you know,
- 17 sometime two months, saying -- see and the last time -- the last
- 18 two times she come to my shop and she say she hurt her nails.
- 19 And I -- I look and I say it's no like not -- she say it's got
- 20 fungus. I say it not look like a fungus, because fungus sometime
- 21 it not -- it not hurt. And I told her maybe you take a lot of

- 22 medicine and your body is start changes. So I -- I told her I
- 23 need to take the nails off, but she's not happy. She say, I -- I
- 24 always wear nails, you know, and she don't want to take the nails
- 25 off.

- 1 And then the last time she come and she -- she tell me, you
- 2 know, I still hurt, my nails, and so I have to take my -- I have
- 3 to take your nails off. And she lot of times she not happy. And
- 4 I say if your nail not hurt -- I give her the foundation, which
- 5 is make her nails stronger. I told her when your nail stronger,
- 6 you can come back, I do your nail. Because now you -- you
- 7 complain that your nail hurt and you just come in, you know,
- 8 every six week or eight weeks, you know, I cannot control you,
- 9 you know, where you get that hurt from. So, see, and last
- 10 time -- see, and the last time she told me that and then I gave
- 11 her the medicine -- the foundation, and she not -- after that I
- 12 didn't see her.
- And then I received the letter from the board and two days

- 14 and -- two days later and they told me she passed because of
- 15 liver cancer. Then the doctor in where I live, he did not find
- 16 out she had liver cancer, and then transfer her to the bigger
- 17 city, like Texarkana, they found out she had liver cancer. And

- 19 HEARING OFFICER JONES: Ms. Kim Pham, do you have
- any other questions?
- 21 KIM PHAM: No.
- HEARING OFFICER JONES: Mr. Jochums, questions of
- 23 this witness?
- MR. JOCHUMS: Yes.
- 25 CROSS-EXAMINATION

- 1 BY MR. JOCHUMS:
- 2 Q Do you also use the name Lynn?
- 3 A Yes. She called me Lynn.
- 4 Q She calls you Lynn?
- 5 A Yes.
- 6 Q That's --

- 7 A Yes, sir.
- 8 Q -- your more American name?
- 9 A Yes, sir. That's more American.
- 10 Q Okay. In her Complaint she talks about Vietnamese couple
- 11 Lynn and Tom?
- 12 A Yes. This is Tom.
- 13 Q That's his -- his American name?
- 14 A American name.
- 15 Q Okay. Now, did -- are you a manicurist?
- 16 A Yes, sir.
- 17 Q And do you have an Arkansas license?
- 18 A Yes, sir.
- 19 Q Okay. And does your husband, too?
- 20 A Yes, sir.
- 21 Q Okay. And if I understand you right, you agree she came and
- 22 she got treatments, nail treatments from you in your store?
- 23 A Yeah. She come like every six or eight weeks.
- 24 Q Okay.
- 25 A So our -- our -- every time she come, I tell her, you need

- 1 to come here, as a regular customer, you need to come to my shop
- 2 every two weeks. Most -- you know, the time between that, she
- 3 gone somewhere else. I didn't know.
- 4 Q Now, had she been coming for more than a year?
- 5 A Sometime she come and sometimes she can't. You know, she
- 6 not like regular one.

13	MS. PICKERING: In two weeks, it grows out and
14	then so you're saying that where it should have been
15	grown out, it was filled in
16	THE WITNESS: Yes.
17	MS. PICKERING: when she came back to you?
18	THE WITNESS: Yes. Every eight weeks six or
19	eight weeks she come back and I'll I'll I'll know
20	that she been somewhere else, because by the time six
21	or eight weeks, it's not you know, it's not growed
22	back out. That's why I know.
23	MS. PICKERING: Okay. And then she that's when
24	she stated that her nails were hurting and you removed
25	them that time?
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1	THE WITNESS: Removed. Yes.
2	MS. PICKERING: Okay.
3	MS. POWELL: Why was she coming back?
4	Why was she coming in to see you if she had been

18 THE WITNESS: That's the last time, she complained the nails, took them off -- she complained the nails 19 hurt, that's why I took the nails off. And, see, the 20 21 last time she gone and then I heard she died. She 22 passed away. MS. WARD: She didn't complain before then about 23 24 her nails hurting? 25 THE WITNESS: Yes. In here --

20	but the last time I heard from the newspaper, from
21	the from the people in local, say she they just
22	find out that she have liver cancer. And after I think
23	a couple days, she passed.
24	MS. POWELL: Okay. So you knew she was a
25	diabetic, and but you didn't know that she had cancer?
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THE WITNESS: I didn't know she had cancer. Theyjust find out.

3 MS. POWELL: Pardon me? 4 THE WITNESS: They just find out she has. 5 MS. WITTUM: If I could clarify something. 6 We learned from her husband when he called to say 7 that he still would like for the board to review this 8 even though she had passed away, it appears that they 9 learned about the cancer because she was going to the doctor to try and find out what was causing her 10 11 problems with her hands. - 3 posted, and there is a Virge Hair and Esthetiques that are two
- 4 salons, owned by the corporation.
- 5 MS. HATFIELD: Uh-huh.
- 6 THE WITNESS: And, evidently, I missed the salon
- 7 license being -- they are posted on the -- were posted
- 8 on the same bulletin board in Esthetiques.
- 9 BY MR. JOCHUMS:
- 10 Q Okay.
- 11 A So I missed that salon license.
- MR. JOCHUMS: I have no other questions of this

13	witness.
14	HEARING OFFICER JONES: Ms. Hatfield, do you have
15	any questions that you would like to ask Ms. Horner?
16	MS. HATFIELD: No. Because I just realized now
17	what we're I don't have any.
18	I have our nice little city license, but I I
19	have no information on the establishment license or
20	when it was I you know, I assume that that's correct
21	but I don't know. I pay all the license fees and I
22	didn't in June, so I'm not you have that, I just
23	I don't have anything in my records to look at now, so
24	I'm very ill prepared to testify.
25	HEARING OFFICER JONES: Does the board have any
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1	questions they would like to ask Ms. Horner?
2	Go ahead.
3	EXAMINATION BY THE BOARD
4	MS. PICKERING: Are you saying that you that

5 you missed seeing the establishment license? Was it 6 there and you missed seeing it or what? What -- tell 7 me? 8 THE WITNESS: I -- actually right now, I don't 9 recall. But the -- both salon licenses are usually 10 posted in the Esthetiques, on a bulletin board type 11 thing with the inspection sheets. I don't know how I 12 missed it, but they are together. The two salons have 13 a doorway. I think one is for newer stylists just out 14 of school and the other salon is for more experienced. 15 So this is like a training, basically, I guess. 16 MS. HATFIELD: Uh-huh. 17 THE WITNESS: Teaching for the newer 18 cosmetologists, and both licenses are on a bulletin 19 board in Esthetiques. 20 So, how I missed it, don't know. 21 HEARING OFFICER JONES: Any other questions for 22 the board? 23 MS. PICKERING: I'm just totally confused now. I'm really confused. 24 25 You say you missed it. Well, was it there?

1	Are you saying it was there and she missed it, or
2	it wasn't there and she didn't see it?
3	MS. HATFIELD: I'm saying that all of our licenses
4	are there and they are all up to date.
5	Now, in June, we did renew our barber shop license
6	around June.
7	MS. WITTUM: We are going to check on the dates.
8	The information that I was looking at, one piece of it
9	indicates that it hasn't been the shop hasn't been
10	renewed since December 31, '05. The information that
11	we gathered when this hearing order was prepared
12	indicates that it was renewed June 22nd. So we're
13	going to check our old computer system to see exactly
14	what it has in there.
15	MS. HATFIELD: Okay.
16	MS. WITTUM: Because it should be accurate in
17	there.
18	MS. HATFIELD: Okay.

THE WITNESS: I would think if it was there or was

not there I would have marked salon license not posted

12	or something. All I wrote, I put all posted licenses
13	are current and I marked no. But the salon license
14	current, I marked yes.
15	So I honestly don't remember if it was posted or
16	not. That was April. Don't know.
17	MS. PICKERING: Well, on six, when it says
18	practitioner license current, you marked yes and no.
19	THE WITNESS: Well, there was just one. I do
20	that. That may be not the right way to do it. They
21	are current but they they are current but there was
22	that one that was not current.
23	MS. PICKERING: Okay. Okay.
24	THE WITNESS: That's how I marked that.
25	MS. PICKERING: Okay.
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1	HEARING OFFICER JONES: Does the board have any

more questions for Ms. Horner, until we get some

clarification on dates?

2

4 Okay. We will wait until we get some 5 clarification from Amber on the dates. 6 MR. KEENE: But did he, did the practitioner have his license posted but it wasn't current or did he --7 8 HEARING OFFICER JONES: That's what it sounds 9 like. 10 MR. KEENE: That would be a violation, that five 11 dollars. 12 I won't go there. I won't make that motion. 13 HEARING OFFICER JONES: Okay. 14 MR. JOCHUMS: We're ready. 15 HEARING OFFICER JONES: Okay. DOWNEY: Then you're operating two salons. 22 THE WITNESS: Well, we have -- we advertise as 23 Virge, we have Virge stylists that operate on 24 Esthetiques' floor. So, I mean, it should be that cut 25 and dried. It's really not. There -- we pay no

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1	payroll taxes for Virge, they are all under
2	Esthetiques. It's all we pay rent for Virge out of
3	Esthetiques. It's
4	MR. DOWNEY: Why do you carry the name?
5	THE WITNESS: Because it was set up as a company a
6	couple of years ago. We found that at this point it's
7	not really profitable; but if we decided to put more
8	energy and focus on it, it might be, or we might just

before -- I mean, as you know, it's expensive to start

10 up a new company. To close it down and find out that 11 we could have just tweaked a few things, may make more 12 sense than just completely closing it down. 13 HEARING OFFICER JONES: Further questions? 14 MR. KEENE: Yes. From what you're saying there, 15 and following up with what he's asking you, is your intent then to keep the name of both salons? 16 THE WITNESS: We don't currently advertise it as 17 18 Virge Salon. 2 decided to get rid of it, then you would be in 3 violation. If your intent is to have the one salon and you're dropping the other name and releasing it, 4 5 basically, and you're not keeping a business license in 6 that other name --7 THE WITNESS: Then that would be --8 MR. KEENE: -- then you would not be in violation. 9 THE WITNESS: Well --10 MR. KEENE: You just simply didn't return the 11 license to us because you decided not to renew it. But 12 if your intent is to keep the name and leave the sign 13 up, it looks as if you are running two different businesses out of one and you need both licenses. 14 15 THE WITNESS: Well, I guess there is really no 16 clear intent right now, because -- I mean I don't know. 17 **FURTHER CROSS-EXAMINATION** BY MR. JOCHUMS: 18 19 What business license did you bring today? 20 Α I brought our city business license for both. Q To what? For Virge? 21 22 A For both. For both? 23 Q

- 24 HEARING OFFICER JONES: Okay. Ms. Ward, go ahead
- 25 and --

- 1 BY MR. JOCHUMS:
- 2 Q Okay. I think that could be considered --
- 3 MR. DOWNEY: She had two.

MS. WARD: Yeah. Okay. So --22 HEARING OFFICER JONES: Are there any further 23 questions? 24 25 Okay. Closing statements?

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1 MR. JOCHUMS: I think it's a situation where, 2 especially since the respondent has provided 3 information that they have a city license under both 4 names, that we have -- and there is signage under both 5 names, that we have a violation. And although -although there may be good -- no bad intent, there 6 certainly is a violation, and intent is really not an 7 8 issue in this case. So I think you can find them

- 9 guilty and impose the director's recommended penalty, which is the standard calculated on number of days from 10 when it expired until when it got reissued. 11 12 HEARING OFFICER JONES: Ms. Hatfield, would you like to say anything? 13 MR. 4 DL Roope, when I contacted them, Deborah Roope 5 said that they really did not have the ability at this point to either send someone here or to provide 6 7 information for the board to review, they just took on 8 two new states and felt like they were overextended as 9 it was. So she did -- in our visiting, she did indicate 10 11 that it would be challenging for them to contract with us and still keep the cost for the students at a 12 13 minimal, as we had hoped that they would stay. 14 So, with that, we'll ask Ms. Tilley to come up. MS. TILLEY: Thank you. 15 16 I do have the proposal that was given to you, I think. 17 Would you like for me to pass those out? 18 MS. WITTUM: Yes. Please. 19 If you will give them to Shaunta, she will take 20 care of getting them passed out. 21 22 MS. TILLEY: Okay. Kathy, is it my understanding 23 that everybody has seen this proposal prior or is this the first time it's been seen? 24

MS. WITTUM: No. No. This is the first time.

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1	MS. TILLEY: Okay. And I'm here to answer
2	questions or go over the whole process or
3	MS. WITTUM: Well, I think the board is interested
4	in learning what PCS could do for us if we were to
5	consider outsourcing, what would be involved with doing
6	that, what the cost would be.
7	We currently charge candidates \$30 to come in and
8	examine, so we are interested in trying to keep those
9	costs to a minimal, if at all possible.
10	MS. TILLEY: Okay. And in the proposal there is a
11	cost breakdown for you as well, and different ways that
12	we actually administer the exam.
13	PCS currently is administering the exam for five
14	different states. We have different ways of doing
15	that.
16	We can either determine eligibility for a board,
17	if that's what the board prefers, or we can just do

18

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scheduling of the administration of the exam. We do that now currently in three other states. We receive eligibility through electronic transfers to our data base, and we just schedule the candidates for the exam. We can acquire our own test sites or we can use your current test sites that are available. We do the scheduling of the exam. We actually print the admission notices, ATTs of the candidates, if you

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1 choose to go with a LaserGrade test base or an 2 admission notice, if you choose to go paper and pencil 3 base. After the exam is administered, we actually print 4 5 score notices and mail them out to the candidates 6 directly or we can send scores directly to the board. 7 And we also, after the exam is over with, on a 8 monthly basis, we send out scores and reports to the schools on a monthly basis as well.

10 That's a quick breakdown of it. If you have 11 questions, feel free to ask. MS. WITTUM: How often do you -- do you examine? 12 13 MS. TILLEY: We, in other states, we examine once a month up to four to five times a month, and at 14 15 multiple locations. We can do it up to six locations 16 we do it in some states, and some states it's just one. It depends on the state. Computer based testing is 17 18 every day. If it's with the LaserGrade, which we, you 19 know, partner with LaserGrade, then that's computer 20 based testing where a candidate can test at any time. 21 I think I have some samples in the proposal there as far as our data base and how the candidates are 22 23 entered into our system, as far as breakdown of 24 eligibility, breakdown of the exam types, discipline, 25 scores, how we actually enter them into our system, we

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- 1 receive them electronically from LaserGrade,
- 2 electronically from S&T, and then we distribute them to

3 the candidates or the board. MS. TURMAN: Let's discuss cost. 4 5 What do -- what, in theory and in practicum, what 6 would you probably cost -- what would the cost be for a 7 candidate? MS. TILLEY: The breakdowns, I believe, are 8 9 actually back there --10 MS. TURMAN: On Page 26? MS. TILLEY: Uh-huh. 11 12 MS. WITTUM: The very end of the book. 13 MS. TILLEY: Yes. 14 And there are different examples. Well, 25 15 actually starts Option 1 and then goes to two. 16 I believe, if I'm not mistaken, Kathy, you said scheduling only? 17 MS. WITTUM: The administering of the exams --18 19 MS. TILLEY: Uh-huh. 20 MS. WITTUM: -- is what we were considering. 21 MS. TILLEY: Okay. So that would probably be under Option 2, the scheduling. That's Page 26. 22 MS. TURMAN: Let me make sure I've got the right 23

- page.
- MR. KEENE: I guess what I'm interested in mainly

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is what it would cost for the practical only, for PCS 1 to give the practical exam and using our test site 2 3 here. 4 MS. TILLEY: Uh-huh. 5 MS. WITTUM: So, would that be the 45? If you 6 look at Option 2 --7 MS. TILLEY: Uh-huh. 8 MS. WITTUM: -- would that be the \$45 there? 9 MS. TILLEY: For scheduling only? 10 MS. WITTUM: For just the practical. 11 MS. TILLEY: Computer base -- just the practical. 12 Uh-huh. That's correct. 13 And that four times a month. 14 MS. WITTUM: Uh-huh. 15 MR. KEENE: That's scheduling of it, but not the

actual coming and giving the exam?

- 17 MS. TILLEY: No, that's everything. That's 18 administering it, as well. MR. KEENE: Okay. \$45? 19 20 THE WITNESS: Uh-huh. 21 MR. KEENE: And that's using our site? 22 MS. TILLEY: There is two different ways that we 7 can do -- that we're currently doing it right now. 8 We can receive it electronically, the file 9 10 electronically. It's uploaded into our system. The 11 candidate can actually call over the phone and register 12 with us on the exam that they wish to take. It could 13 be done another way that we do in another state where a 14 candidate fills out a scheduling form and then fills 15 out a licensure form, send it in both directions, and 16 then we schedule them for the exam once they are determined eligible. 17 18 MS. WITTUM: Okay. 19 MR. KEENE: When this says four times per month --20 MS. TILLEY: Uh-huh. 21 MR. KEENE: -- are you looking at just four days a 22 month or four -- because we do exams two to three

23 days -- no --24 MS. WITTUM: Four. 25 MR. KEENE: Four days a month on a normal basis. SUSAN B. WHITSON, CCR, INC. TILLEY: We normally -- typically, with our 1 2 other states, we have not turned anybody away. Depends 3 upon the site size. In this case, if we're going to be using a current 4 5 site that's only -- that has the capability of 6 determining or -- or testing so many, we would have to put them into the next site or the next date. 7

8 But what we normally do, we would test -- and we 9 have different practical exam sites. Some are in schools, some are actually in hotels where we actually 10 11 set up stations in hotels. In the past, since I've been here, I 13 have always found another day to schedule any excess 14 people that we've had apply by the deadline date. This 15 month I chose not to do that, because of the stuff that 16 we're -- we're under in the office as well as just 17 trying to find examiners to come in for that extra day. 18 Now, it's my understanding that prior to my 19 becoming involved with the scheduling, that the office 20 typically did not add extra days. They stuck to the 21 four days a month. So I don't know what Linda did if 22 that happened. 23 MS. TRAYLOR: They never have. They just roll 24 them over to the next exam. 25 MS. WITTUM: But up until this month, I've made

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1 arrangements to have every person who applied by the 2 deadline scheduled. 3 MR. KEENE: Okay. If -- if for some reason you 4 needed to add an extra day because your -- you found yourself having to put people off --5 6 MS. TILLEY: Uh-huh. MR. KEENE: -- and because it's in this building, 7 8 this building has to be shut down by a certain time, so 9 there is not a matter of just adding another session --10 MS. TILLEY: Uh-huh. 11 MR. KEENE: Okay. We can only do so many sessions 12 here. If you found you were having to move people to another day, what would the cost be to add that fifth 13 day? 14 MS. WITTUM: The cosmo exam typically takes about 3 1/2 hours now, doesn't it? 24 25 MR. DOWNEY: (Nodding head up and down.)

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1	MS. WITTUM: I have a question, Francine.
2	One of the comments that got raised at the last
3	meeting when we were discussing this was the
4	qualifications of the examiners.
5	MS. TILLEY: Uh-huh.
6	MS. WITTUM: Do you use only licensed
7	cosmetologists?
8	MS. TILLEY: That's right.
9	MS. TRAYLOR: You don't use licensed instructors
10	then?
11	MS. TILLEY: If the board requests it we do.

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1	MS. POWELL: So you're pulling those people, the
2	examiners, from the state?
3	MS. TILLEY: Uh-huh. That's where we do our mail
4	out invitees to the NIC training, and then they are
5	trained every year, like they are currently doing that
6	anyways.
7	MS. POWELL: So the examiners are still coming
8	from each in this case, you've got five states that
9	are participating, so you've got those five schools
10	or five states pulling examiners from within their own
11	state?
12	MS. TILLEY: That's correct. That's where we get

13 our examiners, from the current cosmetology -- depends 14 on the state. In Delaware they prefer instructors and instructors only. And it's very hard to find an 15 16 instructor that's not working. MR. KEENE: Who -- who pays for their training? 17 MS. TILLEY: They get paid for their eight hours 18 of training that day. PCS pays for --19 MR. KEENE: I know, but who pays that? 20 MS. TILLEY: PCS pays for that. 21 22 MR. KEENE: Okay. So that's -- that's money that we're spending to train the board or the raters here, 23 we wouldn't have to pay anything. 5	paying the board what did you all say it was, 17.50?

7	MS. WARD: And that's the cost of the books.

Those are the fees. 9 That pays for the NIC training of the examiners, us administering the exam, and transferring all the data 10 11 back to the board. 12 MS. TRAYLOR: When we go back to the law and the 13 law says the board will do the examining? 14 MS. WITTUM: Well, that's why this is being 15 discussed now. 16 MS. TRAYLOR: Yeah. 17 MS. WITTUM: If we're going to change -- if we 18 want to do outsourcing, then we would have to change 19 the law. 20 MR. KEENE: Kathy, let me ask you this, as far as 21 the budget would go: Money is allocated for the board 22 members to get paid when we're giving the examinations, and for the training, there is money set aside for the 23 24 training of the raters. If this money was turned 25 around and put back into the budget to offset the price

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1	of the examination, couldn't that help reduce the cost
2	to the student?
3	MS. WITTUM: I'm not sure I'm following what
4	you're saying.
5	MR. KEENE: All right. You have X amount of
6	dollars to for stipends to pay board members for
7	coming up here giving the exam. We get \$60 a day.
8	MS. WITTUM: Uh-huh.
9	MR. KEENE: Well, all those days that are used to
0	give exams, you're paying one, two, three board members
1	to come up here and do that. You took all that money
2	and you turned it back into the exam to help offset the
13	cost to the student as well as, I don't know how much
4	money is set aside for training of the raters, but if
5	you took that money and put it with that, couldn't
6	couldn't that be budgeted out to reduce the cost of the
17	exam to the student?

18 MS. WITTUM: Possibly. I mean the board would 19 have to say that they want to set aside a certain amount of money to pay for the -- the assistance 20 21 through PCS, and then just set whatever dollar amount 22 you want to charge the student to come through. Currently there is \$2,500 that is spent to do the 23 24 rater training. That's part of the contract. And the stipends vary, depending on how many days we do. And 25

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that has even changed over the time I've been here, 1 2 because we've started using inspectors to come in and 3 examine, so we don't have to always bring two board members in at the same time. 4 5 MR. KEENE: But you could do a cost study on that 6 and see how much money is actually spent of our budget 7 on board members giving the examination. 8 MS. WITTUM: Uh-huh. 9 MR. KEENE: And figure out an amount, whether it 10 be reducing it by five dollars or ten dollars or two

11	dollars.
12	MS. WITTUM: Uh-huh. Or just simply keeping it
13	the same, so that we're not increasing the amount.
14	MS. GORDON: But that wouldn't be putting any
15	money back, and we were talking about cutting the cost
16	and the expense for the board. If you did it that way,
17	then that would be putting the expense back on the
18	board.
19	Am I following you? Am I
20	MR. KEENE: It's not changing the amount of money
21	that would be budgeted, that money would just go into
22	another area.
23	Well, it's still in the testing area.
24	MS. WITTUM: Right.
25	MR. KEENE: But instead of it going to a board
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member, it would go -- it would basically be going to

the student to help cut the cost of their exam.

3 MS. GORDON: But it would still be an expense, 4 right, to the board, is what I'm trying to --5 MR. KEENE: Uh-huh. 6 MS. WITTUM: Yes. MS. GORDON: It won't be going to the board 7 itself, but it would still be an expense to the board 8 9 because we would be covering the extra cost. Right? The board would be covering the cost. 10 11 MR. KEENE: But you're not giving the money back 12 to the general assembly to do something else with. 13 MS. WITTUM: Well, no, the money never goes back 14 into the general assembly. MR. KEENE: Most people think it does, is why I 15 said that. 16 17 MS. WITTUM: But that goes back into our account. 18 MS. GORDON: Our account. 19 20 MS. WARD: Okay. But the money you normally 21 collect from the ones who take the exam, you won't be collecting any of that money, other than what you're 22 23 paying for the books. So you've got to take what 24 you're spending and subtract that from it to see where

you come out, to see if you're going to be ahead or

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shy. Because you may not have additional to take off 1 2 the cost. 3 MS. WITTUM: Uh-huh. MS. WARD: You may be going the other direction, 4 5 so... MS. WITTUM: Well, before we did anything like 6 what Cliff is suggesting, we would have to thoroughly 7 8 evaluate the impact to the board by doing that. 9 MS. TURMAN: You know, I think that we've held this -- you know, this -- we've put this off to do 10 11 anything about this today. I would like to -- my opinion is I think we should go ahead and take care of 12 13 this problem -- not a problem, this situation today. 14 And --MR. KEENE: Without knowing the cost study of what 15 it is --16

17 MS. TURMAN: Yeah. We have to do a -- we have --I mean, Kathy has already -- haven't you already done a 18 19 cost --20 MS. WITTUM: (Shaking head from side to side.) 21 MS. TURMAN: Oh, I'm sorry. I misunderstood you. MS. WITTUM: No. Cliff just mentioned that today. 22 23 MS. TURMAN: Not, I'm talking about up to date before -- I'm sorry. I thought you had done it before, 24 25 what it cost us to do it.

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1	MS. WITTUM: Huh-uh.
2	MS. TURMAN: Okay. Sorry.
3	MS. TRAYLOR: Well, I move that we table this
4	until the next board meeting when it gives Kathy a
5	chance, when she has some time, she's blessed with all
6	this time, to you know, to put a pencil to it,
7	figure it, see what the cost is.
8	MS. POWELL: I would like to ask Francine a
9	question about, you had said that you would pull the

examiners from the state of Arkansas? 10 11 MS. TILLEY: Uh-huh. 12 MS. POWELL: And will these be consistent 13 examiners or will you be -- how often do you -- or do 14 you rotate the examiners? MS. TILLEY: It depends on the pool of examiners 15 16 that we get. If we have a larger pool, we rotate 17 them --18 MS. POWELL: How often do you rotate --19 MS. TILLEY: -- so they are not testing every exam. We try to get everybody in to test. I hate to 20 21 have someone trained as an NIC examiner and then they 22 don't get to test on a regular basis. Use it or lose it. We don't want them to lose their training ability 23 and what they've learned and not test for six months. 24 25 MS. POWELL: And so --SUSAN B. WHITSON, CCR, INC. (501) 455-1170 184

MS. TRAYLOR: What do you all pay your examiners?

2 MS. TILLEY: It depends. It depends on the area. 3 We have -- we start anywhere from ten to 15 an hour. 4 MS. POWELL: So these examiners that you're --5 MS. TRAYLOR: Probably expensive. 6 7 MS. POWELL: -- pulling, are they selected on an 8 annual basis? Would you -- would you try to create a 9 team of examiners --10 MS. TILLEY: That's --11 MS. POWELL: -- annually or would you try to 12 maintain these examiners for a period of years? 13 MS. TILLEY: We have examiners that we've had ever since we've started for years now. But we always --14 15 you always have some that retire, they just don't want 16 to do any more, that's just not what they -- so we're 17 constantly bringing on new people. 18 MS. POWELL: So typically, for instance in our 19 state, how many -- how many examiners do you think that 20 you would need to --MS. TILLEY: Depends on the ratio of the 21 22 candidates, I mean how many candidates are testing here 23 on a regular basis. We have one examiner for six

- candidates.
- MR. KEENE: For six, not eight?

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1	MS. TILLEY: Huh-uh.
2	MR. KEENE: Is NIC okay. That's fine.
3	MS. POWELL: One per six?
4	MS. TILLEY: Uh-huh. And that's cosmetology, nail
5	techs.
6	If it was instructors, it's two examiners to one
7	instructor.
8	MS. TURMAN: I would like to make a comment,
9	Kathy. I'm sorry. I thought you had already done
10	that, a cost study on that. I'm sorry that I suggested
11	that. It would not be feasible.
12	MS. POWELL: Well, I know that the comment that
13	brought us here was the comment made on who administers
14	the examination, based on school owners giving the
15	examination and the board giving the examination. I

16 don't see that this would accomplish anything different. 17 If you're pulling people from the state or if 18 19 you're pulling from your board, I don't see that that's doing any different if you're going to use the same 20 21 people.

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If you were pulling people that had no connection within your state, then I would say that may be accomplish something that they wouldn't have a contact, they wouldn't know who is examining, they wouldn't

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1 possibly compromise the exam. But if you're pulling from the -- from your state, I don't see that it's 2 3 accomplished what this board originally set out to try 4 to accomplish by considering outsourcing. 5 MS. TURMAN: My -- my thought was it wasn't a cost -- the cost at all in the very beginning. It was 6 7 whether the outcry was going to be, for our school

owners, is to be doing the exam, and that wasn't there.

9 We haven't heard the outcry from the public. And to me 10 that was what it was all about. Not this, we got in 11 this cost, that we want to do everything we can for the 12 students, but this is not where this was coming from in the very beginning. 13 It was we were supposed to have this great outcry 14 15 because two school owners were sitting on our board and doing the exam. It hasn't been there. 16 MS. POWELL: Well, it did seem to --17 18 MR. KEENE: I think she did answer that, answer that question, and that was that none of these 19 20 instructors, if that's what we chose to have them hire 21 to be trainers --22 MS. TILLEY: Uh-huh. MR. KEENE: -- they couldn't work in the industry. 23 24 They had to be more or less retired or just inactive. 25 MS. TILLEY: Uh-huh.

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1 MR. KEENE: So that is different than having two 2 school owners on the board giving the exam. But my 3 biggest concern was this board, I felt there is a conflict of interest when your board members are giving 4 your exam, and then if those students have a problem or 5 that school has a problem that has sent a student here, 6 they are coming before their very judge and jury. 7 8 MS. TURMAN: I don't think they examine any of 9 their students, do they? 10 MR. KEENE: They are not supposed to, but the 11 choice doesn't always happen. 12 Luckily, you know, they know ahead of time and 13 they can call Kathy and say, look, I've got a student 14 coming and I can't give the exam. 15 Didn't that just happen this past month? 16 MR. DOWNEY: Yes. It did. 17 MR. KEENE: I know, because I got a phone call to 18 come up and give the examination because they couldn't. 19 MS. TURMAN: But how often does that happen? MR. KEENE: It happens frequently now. It didn't 20 21 used to be a problem when we all eight would go in and 22 examine at the same time because it was very easy then

23 to move somebody else in the position. 24 My point of all of that was in scheduling 25 someone -- an examiner to come in, there is -- that SUSAN B. WHITSON, CCR, INC. (501) 455-1170 188 1 puts that many more items to consider when you're trying to schedule students for the exam. Is this 2 3 going to be somebody that we're going to know. There have been times I've gone in there and I've 4 5 known the student. I don't work in a school, but I happen to know that person, and I couldn't give -- you 6 7 know, I couldn't examine that person. In the situation 8 we have now, I don't have a choice but to examine that 9 person. 10 MS. TURMAN: Well, do you -- what do you think if 11 that might happen if they are bringing all these people 12 in, too, that that couldn't happen where they are doing 13 the same thing?

MR. KEENE: Well, I don't think you can ever stop

MS. WARD: You have how many retired instructors

who substitute, so they are still going to be in these

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8 schools, so you're not going to be able to take out all 9 those. You aren't going to have anybody left, because 10 most of them do substitute. 11 MR. KEENE: Well, I don't know that. I don't know what the pool is. 12 MS. WARD: Okay. Most of your retired -- your 13 instructors do substitute, and they do that just to 14 15 have something to do, fill in once in a while, but they 16 don't want to work full time, so they consider they are 17 retired. So you're going to still have the same problem. 18 19 MR. KEENE: Well, here we're also assuming that 20 our pool is only going to be licensed instructors. 21 This exam doesn't require it to be a licensed 22 instructor. The board can make that decision. But it 23 can be just any hairdresser up and down the street that they decide to train, and as Kirby within NIC said, you 24 don't have to be a licensed hairdresser to give this 25

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1 exam, once you go through the rater training. 2 MS. TURMAN: Well, I've been through the rater training twice and I think I passed it both times, and 3 I certainly don't do any examining because I'm not 4 qualified. 5 MR. KEENE: Well, that's not my choice that you 6 don't give the exam. That's what our law says. 7 8 MS. POWELL: Well, do we have any further 9 questions for Francine? 10 I think maybe the board can visit this and --11 MR. JOCHUMS: Well, I think somebody said 12 something about we have to change the law first anyway, 13 so I think it's a little early to vote yes or no. 14 MR. KEENE: Well, I think that's debatable, too, 15 as to what -- the law actually says administer the 16 exam. It doesn't say the board members have to give 17 it, physically go in and give it. The board has to 18 administer the examination. So there, I think it would come to attorneys to figure that out, but -- on what 19 20 the actual intent of that was or is. MS. WARD: I think once we hear, when you figure 21

22 out where we stand as far as the budget and everything 23 goes, I think that should have an --24 MS. TRAYLOR: I think that would help --25 MS. WARD: -- it would help us to make the SUSAN B. WHITSON, CCR, INC. (501) 455-1170 191 decision. 1 2 MS. TRAYLOR: We still have a motion on the floor. MR. JOCHUMS: What was your motion? 3 MS. TRAYLOR: That we table this to give Kathy 4 5 time to put a pencil to it and come up with some figures for us. 6 MS. WITTUM: And you made that motion? 7 8 MS. TRAYLOR: (Nodding head up and down.) 9 MS. WEST: I'll second. 10 MS. POWELL: I have a motion and a second to table this item. 11 All those in favor, raise your right hand. 12 (Seven hands raised.) 13

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before the legislature, it -- we're not ready for that?

MS. TRAYLOR: Don't even go there.

KEENE: I mean, I know I would like to have 22 had this before this to review it. MS. WITTUM: Kent, do you want to join us up this 23 way? 24 25 MR. WALKER: Okay. Where do you want me to sit?

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1	I'll be Ms. Jones.
2	MS. POWELL: You can be Mr. Jones.
3	MR. WALKER: Okay. I know Mr. Jones. I don't
4	know if he would like that.
5	LEGISLATIVE UPDATE: LICENSEE WORKING OUTSIDE ESTABLISHMENT
6	MS. WITTUM: The next item on the the next item
7	on the legislative update is the licensee working
8	outside of the establishment.
9	I found two states that allow licensees to perform
10	services outside of a licensed school or salon, under
11	certain conditions. It's outlined there for you to
12	see. Michigan and Wyoming are the two.
13	Michigan says in their law that a licensed
14	cosmetologist may serve a patron in premises not
15	licensed as a cosmetology establishment, provided that
16	the services rendered involve a special event in which
17	the cosmetology service is required to be performed for
18	an on-site participant of the event. The licensee is
19	not required to notify the board when they will be
20	performing services under this language.

In Wyoming it's a little bit more complicated.

The law allows a licensee to perform services in the following unlicensed locations: The personal residence of the patron, the office, place of business, or place of regular employment of the patron, the hospital,

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health care facility, senior citizen center, nursing or convalescent home in which the patron is presently living or staying, and the hotel, motel, or boarding facility in which the patron is presently living or staying. There is additional language that stipulates other persons not living in those locations cannot be serviced and services can only be provided in the, quote, individual room, rooms, or office of the patron. If a room in such a facility is used for servicing more than one patron, that room shall be licensed as a salon, end quote. There is also language that includes the prohibition of the licensee using his or her home

13 or business from being used unless properly licensed. Out of those two, I certainly like Michigan 14 better. It seems to be more simplified. And I believe 15 16 it has -- it allows for what was intended from this venture all along, and that is to make it possible for 17 18 a licensed licensee to go outside of the licensed establishment or school for special events. 19 Does anybody have any questions? 20 21 MR. KEENE: Maybe not necessarily a question, but 22 a comment. That the special event, I know Pat wanted 23 it more specific as to what the special events could 24 be. But if we adopted the law of Michigan, but we put 25 the -- what we consider the special events to be into SUSAN B. WHITSON, CCR, INC. (501) 455-1170 195 1 the rules, then you could actually adopt the law, and if you needed to change the rules as to what special 2 3 events you would allow and what you wouldn't, that

would be a lot easier to do.

MS. WITTUM: Yes.

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6 I think Kent may want to --MR. WALKER: That's correct. 7 8 I mean you would just add a clause, special event 9 as defined by the board. I mean that would very simply solve that matter. Yes. 10 MR. KEENE: Okay. 11 MS. TURMAN: Okay. So we could put that in there 12 13 and you could call anything a special event actually without clarifying --14 15 MR. KEENE: Without clarifying what the special 16 event would be later. 17 MR. WALKER: But I don't know if Kathy wants this burden, but, I mean, you could say as determined by the 18 19 director. If you all didn't want to meet every time a special event was coming up, there may not be certain 20 21 criteria, how ever you want to word it. MS. GORDON: Couldn't you just make it like 22 23 special event, just a list of those special events, and 24 then that would take the burden off Kathy to say --25 MR. WALKER: Yes, certainly.

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1	MS. WITTUM: It would be better for practicing
2	licensees to be able to just look at a list and know
3	that these are the things that they can participate in.
4	MR. KEENE: So you're saying you like Wyoming's
5	law better, then?
6	MS. WITTUM: No. I like Michigan's better, but I
7	like your idea to specify exactly which events are
8	considered to be special.
9	MR. KEENE: Because this doesn't say anything
10	about church, because I'm thinking people go in and do
11	weddings. In this case of Wyoming, you're saying you
12	would have to do it in a hotel room
13	MS. WITTUM: Exactly.
14	MR. KEENE: or in a person's home?
15	MS. WITTUM: Right.
16	MS. TURMAN: But you could clarify and say
17	weddings or funerals or whatever, you know.
18	MS. WITTUM: I think Wyoming's law is too
19	complicated. Michigan is much more simple.

20 MR. KEENE: For a law. 21 MS. WITTUM: And I think it would be better to go with something simple than make it more complicated. 22 23 MS. TURMAN: Kathy, couldn't we put in, for instance, like weddings, list weddings, funerals? 24 MR. KEENE: But you put it in your rules and not 25 SUSAN B. WHITSON, CCR, INC. (501) 455-1170 197 1 the law. 2 MS. TURMAN: Yes. Right. 3 MS. POWELL: Does the board have any further discussion on that? 4 Are we ready to make a motion? 5 MR. KEENE: Well, I'll make a motion that we 6 approve Michigan's law, the way it reads --7 8 MS. TURMAN: With a list. 9 MR. KEENE: -- and have the board come up with or -- have the board come up with a list of allowable 10 special events to be made part of the rules. 11

wanted to include what he said, as defined by the

5 board, that it would be defined. MR. KEENE: Okay. We're going to the rules. 6 7 MR. WALKER: You did say that part. 8 MS. POWELL: You did say that part. 9 MS. WITTUM: We're all on the same page. MS. POWELL: But it includes as defined by the 10 11 board in the law. MR. KEENE: Whatever. I thought I said that. Who 12 got that? 13 14 MR. WALKER: That's right. MR. KEENE: I know I said that. 15 MS. POWELL: Okay. I have a motion. 16 MS. GORDON: I second. 17 18 MS. POWELL: And a second. Any further discussion? 19 All those in favor, raise your right hand. 20 (Eight hands raised.) 21 22 It's unanimous. Motion carries. 23 Thank you very much. MS. TURMAN: Thank you, Kathy, for doing that. 24 MS. WITTUM: No problem. 25

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1	MS. TURMAN: Pardon me?
2	MS. WITTUM: The felony conviction, I'll turn over
3	to Kent.
4	LEGISLATIVE UPDATE: FELONY CONVICTION
5	MR. WALKER: My name is Kent Walker. I'm an
6	attorney for the cosmetology board.
7	And I have been charged with trying to keep felony
8	conviction language in there but clarifying it and
9	specifying it a little more. And what I have done is
10	gone through several states and try to combine the best
11	facets of those. I mean one of the use of law is you
12	don't necessarily have to write every new law, just
13	take the best from each of them. And what I came up
14	with, and this is certainly open to discussion, is that
15	maintain felony convictions and misdemeanor
16	convictions, but it would come from either two sources,
17	either a certified copy of the court record or by
18	license application, and it would be narrowed in the

sense of, one, it would have to involve a crime of dishonesty; or, two, a crime that in some way relates to the practice or teaching of the cosmetology industry. Part of the concern, I think, was expressed both by myself and others was that I don't think it should be open to every crime that may come through here, that it should have to be disclosed. And I give

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the example DWI 4 is a felony conviction, I don't know how germane or pertinent that is to the practice of cosmetology. I'm trying to limit it in scope but at the same time allow you all an opportunity to discuss it among yourselves, if you have an applicant or a licensee who may not be meeting the criteria of what you consider good practice in the cosmetology industry.

And there is also language that would allow you to determine that as a board, if you all want to waive it, saying this person has served their time or has made

11 amends, and therefore they won't be punished in any 12 capacity as a board, or we will not punish them in any capacity, coming from the board. 13 14 MS. TURMAN: Say that again. MR. WALKER: I will do my best. 15 16 What I'm trying to do -- Kathy expressed some concern about having the language in there, but I think 17 members of the board and the public wanted to maintain 18 felony convictions as criteria for the board to be able 19 20 to bring back and look at whenever needed. 21 And what I have done is take felony convictions 22 that involve either a crime of dishonesty -- felony or 23 misdemeanor convictions that involve either a crime of 24 dishonesty or a crime that is in some way related to 25 the practice or teaching of the cosmetology industry.

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- 1 MR. KEENE: Exactly what you and I talked about 2 earlier.
- 3 You're for it.

4 MR. WALKER: I mean, in my -- I think I was trying 5 to do two things here. One is retain it, because I know that several of you said that you wanted it to 6 7 stay in some capacity. 8 And then Kathy's concern, which I think is a valid concern, is that, one, it's hard to check who has a 9 10 felony conviction and then what felony convictions 11 really apply to this board and which ones are ones that you should be concerned about and which ones are -- I 12 13 mean, at the end of the day are really none of the board's business, is the way I look at it. 14 But all that being said, I think there are certain 15 16 crimes that you should consider. I know, for example, in the legal industry, if I, 17 you know, embezzle a client's funds, then I'm in, you 18 19 know, severe risk of losing my law license. But if I 20 go out and get a DWI 1, it's very unlikely they will 21 pull my license. More than likely I'll get a letter of 22 reprimand or something to that effect. So all that 23 being said, there are different crimes to a varying degree which affect the industry in what I consider 24

25 more pressing matters.

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1	MS. TRAYLOR: What crime would you say that it
2	would would need punishment by the board?
3	MR. WALKER: Well, that would be for a board
4	determination. But I think if you had someone who
5	was you know, I can't even think of a good example.
6	Kathy, do you have a good example of a crime that
7	would
8	MS. WITTUM: Just off the top of my head, well, I
9	liked the embezzling. I mean, if you're dishonest with
10	money, then you may not be
11	MR. WALKER: Right.
12	MS. WITTUM: you may not be honest with your
13	clients.
14	MS. TRAYLOR: Well, we ought to go get Derwin,
15	then, and hang him up.
16	MS. WITTUM: Now, I know one of the comments that
17	was raised during a legislative committee meeting was

18 the sex offender issue. I believe Heather Whitlock 19 made that comment, that she would not want her child being serviced by someone who was a child predator. So 20 I think there are -- there are some felonies and even 21 22 some misdemeanors out there that the board may --MR. KEENE: I can take --23 MS. TURMAN: But you know what, what do you think, 24 25 though, are we going to -- unless it's something like

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1	that, are we going to if they have done their time
2	and they have gotten their act together, are we still
3	going to hold that over their head the rest of their
4	life, unless they are a child predator or something of
5	that sort? I mean, can you can you continue
6	punishing people for a mistake they have made long ago
7	and they have corrected that mistake and they are back
8	in society trying to make things right?
9	MR. WALKER: I think there are two safeguards that

10 you can include that will address that. One of which 11 is you could say, only crimes committed while the 12 person is a licensee, so you wouldn't have to worry 13 about past crimes. And then secondly, allow language 14 that the board could look at and review and make the 15 determination, they don't want to act upon that, you 16 know, if they served six months in jail or paid restitution, so therefore, as far as the board 17 18 determines, there is no longer an issue to be made of 19 this. 20 MS. TRAYLOR: Well, you know the hot one now is 21 child support. MR. WALKER: Well, you connect that to the 22 23 industry, I would say --24 MS. WITTUM: By law we are required to suspend a 25 license when the Office of Child Support Enforcement

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- 1 contacts us about a particular licensee. So I think
- 2 that that's already taken care of.

3 This, I think, would be a separate issue. 4 MR. WALKER: Correct. 5 MS. POWELL: Kent, I would like to ask you, what 6 would be the proper procedure in establishing the identity of this felony or misdemeanor? Is this to be 7 presented to the office or to -- I mean how -- is the 8 office in -- somehow going to be responsible to --9 10 MR. WALKER: Right. MS. POWELL: -- do research or gather information 11 to find out, out of all of our licensees, who is a 12 criminal and -- or are we going to --13 14 MR. WALKER: I think I understand your question. I want to address one thing. 15 16 I will say that, based on your comment, most 17 states that I found, almost without fail, have some 18 element or degree of this type of language relating to felony or convictions relating to the industry. 19 In answering your question, I would do it one of 20 21 two ways. Actually probably both. Is one, that it 22 should be disclosed on the application for a licensee when they are coming back up for renewal or their 23

- initial applications. And then, secondly, if -- I
- mean, if you all got good knowledge, and then, you

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1	know, Kathy was able to find out through getting a
2	certified copy of the court record, then proceed that
3	way.
4	MS. POWELL: So you would pull a license as much
5	as in that to follow this, you would pull a
6	license if you became aware of it, even if they
7	falsified the falsified the information on the
8	application?
9	MR. WALKER: Correct.
10	MS. POWELL: Or if it happened after the
11	application process?
12	MR. WALKER: Correct.
13	And I would add language that I didn't find
14	any Kathy, you may correct me, but I didn't find any
15	language that stated there is a penalty for fraud in
16	procuring a license. If there isn't, I would certainly

17 insert that. I think that's standard within the 18 industry that I found in various statutes. 19 MS. WITTUM: I think Missouri -- is it Missouri 20 that had some language similar to that. 21 MR. WALKER: Yeah. I've got several states that do. 22 23 MR. JOCHUMS: The other thing is, right now, the felony is not a bar to a license, it's only a ground 24 for taking away a license. 25

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1 MR. WALKER: Correct. 2 MR. JOCHUMS: It's not listed in the five things 3 that you have to be to be licensed. So, if you want to 4 do that, that's something to add. It also is a bunch of more bureaucratic work to deal with, because if you 5 tell people they have to disclose, and then once they 6 7 disclose you've got to ask them questions about it, and 8 send us pleadings and -- it's just more work. And

9 maybe it should be done, but I'll tell you up front, 10 it's more work. And in every case -- because I just 11 did one last week with the accountancy board -- in 12 every case, if you build in a waiver statute, they will ask for a hearing and will come and testify and have 13 14 letters from their senator about why they should be a 15 hairdresser. And you will -- those will be additional work for you if you put this kind of thing in. It's 16 17 something to consider. 18 MS. TURMAN: Why don't you just look at your local 19 newspaper, how many people are convicted in a small 20 town. 21 MR. JOCHUMS: Lots of people. 22 MS. TURMAN: And, you know, lots of people. And 23 if you leave it up to a board, or a staff to check 24 every one of those people out, if they decide to become 25 a cosmetologist, it would be unreal for it.

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1 MR. JOCHUMS: Right.

2 MS. TURMAN: Just from a small town, there is a 3 whole page in our newspaper. 4 We're all not crooks, but a lot of us are. 5 MR. JOCHUMS: I mean those are some 6 considerations. MR. KEENE: Is this something that we really need 7 8 to have in our law, though, or would our malpractice section have more to do --9 MR. JOCHUMS: Even worse than that, doesn't the 10 11 Department of Corrections have a cosmetology school? 12 MR. KEENE: Yes. And we've gone there and licensed them. 13 14 MR. JOCHUMS: We can't go back there and do a background check. 15 16 MR. WALKER: We addressed that. MS. POWELL: But I think Kent addressed that, when 17 he said that this would be for people that are 18 19 licensed, not to get a license. 20 MS. TRAYLOR: And those in prison can't get their 21 license until they get out. 22 MR. JOCHUMS: That's true.

23 MR. WALKER: But it would relate to -- and you can 24 put language in there, I've seen it, that only begins 25 once you have your license, then you would have to SUSAN B. WHITSON, CCR, INC. (501) 455-1170 208 disclose at that point forward. So it would certainly 1 2 be a proactive approach as opposed to a retroactive. 3 MS. TRAYLOR: Well, they would just work without a license. That's no problem. 4 5 MS. POWELL: But I think didn't you say that the 6 information you've received thus far is most agencies 7 are in support of having the felony conviction as part 8 of their law? 9 MR. WALKER: Yes. 10 I stopped after about 20 states that I found. I 11 figured that was enough that I needed to pull. 12 And I can start naming them off that have them. A lot of adjacent states: Mississippi, Tennessee, 13 14 Oklahoma.

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MS. POWELL: Well, I don't think that's necessary,

16 especially since our board has already had that in law. It just, I think it's stuff that we really I don't 17 18 think need to consider even removing it, I think we 19 need to consider getting it cleaned up where we can 20 understand the law and the intent of the law and how to 21 put it in place. 22 MR. WALKER: But I would agree. GORDON: I don't know what you said. I don't 24 know what you just said, but what you just said before 25 this started, the last statement you made was --

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1 MR. WALKER: I don't know. 2 Who did it derive from? That might help me. 3 MS. GORDON: What you mean you don't know? 4 MR. JOCHUMS: Probably when he said felonies that 5 were related to the cosmetology profession, or somehow 6 showed their ability to --7 MR. WALKER: Proactive? 8 MS. GORDON: Yes. And he said he could do some 9 further research or something to come up with -- did 10 you say something like that? 11 MR. WALKER: No. I said I had done research and 12 after about 20 states, I gave up in terms of looking at 13 the statutes, because it was -- I saw, obviously, 14 several, several states. MS. GORDON: But did you say something about what 15 16 you would suggest for this board to do? 17 MR. WALKER: Well, in terms of making it a -- a 18 proactive approach, that only felonies -- I mean I have 19 misdemeanors, of course, you all can change that, but 20 that relate to one of dishonesty or crime that's related to the practice or teaching of the cosmetology 21

KEENE: We had to go back and revoke a lot of 11 12 licenses. We did this anyway, even though it wasn't in the law. 13 14 MR. WALKER: Okay. MR. KEENE: We revoked a lot of licenses to take 15 16 the exam. 150 of them, I think. 17 I will second LaJoy's motion. 18 MS. POWELL: I have a motion and a second to 19 accept the proposal here handed out before you by Kent 20 Walker. Is there any discussion? 21 MR. WALKER: I don't know if you want to read it 22 in the record or not.

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MR. WALKER: Or attach it later on, either way.

MR. KEENE: We can.

POWELL: All those in favor, raise your right 10 hand. 11 (Eight hands raised.) It's unanimous. 12 Thank you. 13 14 Motion carries. 15 MS. TURMAN: I'm sorry. 16 MS. TRAYLOR: Is it time for a break? 17 MS. POWELL: Mr. Walker, I want to thank you. That was good work. 18 19 MS. WITTUM: I would like to point out one thing, 20 under the student issues that we had talked about 21 earlier, the voluntarism, in speaking with Dawn 22 Creekmore recently, she wondered if we would want to 23 add some language in there about emergency situations, 24 when students are allowed to go out and do volunteer work. This is something that the board approved at the 25
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1	last meeting. It does not currently have any language
2	in there that would specifically address emergency
3	situations that arise that students are allowed to
4	go
5	MS. TRAYLOR: Okay. Now, what would be what
6	type of emergency?
7	MS. WITTUM: Her example was Hurricane Katrina.
8	Something that happened that, you know, no one is
9	expecting but but there would be
10	MS. TRAYLOR: Well, now, I can see that but, you
11	know, now they want to come up and call everything an
12	emergency.
13	MR. DOWNEY: You know, if you put it as a national
14	disaster, that would cover that.
15	MS. WITTUM: Do you want to add that language in
16	there?
17	MR. DOWNEY: Yes.
18	MR. JOCHUMS: Where would that go?
19	MS. WITTUM: It would just go in with that

if you will remember. She had -- I did get the name

13	right, right?
14	MS. TURMAN: With the apron?
15	MS. WITTUM: Yes. Yes.
16	Nancy?
17	MS. DRAKE: Yeah.
18	MS. WITTUM: Okay. She is the one who came and
19	had prepared an apron to carry implements, and the
20	board suggested that she come back when we were talking
21	about legislative issues. So she is here today to
22	to make a pitch to the board.
23	Do you want to come?
24	MS. DRAKE: Hi. I'm Nancy Drake. And I have to
25	tell you, guys, I'm really, I love coming here and
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1	sitting and listening to all the different issues,
2	because I'm really getting educated a lot.
3	I am here I've been going through some
4	magazines and so forth. There are sale items that show

5 where you can get aprons that you can put scissors down 6 into that they do sell to us hairdressers. And if it's like a law, which I did look at my law sheet when I did 7 8 get back and everything, and it is in the law that you 9 should not carry your implements on you. But the reason I had brought this up is because my 10 11 shears are close to \$4,000, possibly a little over. 12 People are very curious about my shears and they like 13 to go over there and pick them up, open them, which 14 they are not supposed to do, because the shears are 15 designed for your tension. So everybody has different 16 tensions and it affects my shears. So sometimes I have 17 to pretty much stay with them. 18 And I have six shears that I work with at 19 different times. So when they are on a table or 20 anything, they can get dropped, accidents can happen. 21 So I did design a cape that covers the shears for 22 protection but also keeps them from sitting in any hair contaminants, but I can still keep them sterilized and 23 clean. And if the law could be, you know, worked in 24 25 that direction where that's put into it, that the

1	implements that you do wear can be sanitized and
2	cleaned, it would just help me out in my business.
3	And I know when we go to hair shows, sometimes you
4	are limited to space, you have no place to put things,
5	they also wear them. And I just was looking for, you
6	know, a little consideration on, you know, the
7	situation that I am with these expensive shears.
8	Because more and more people are starting to get into
9	the units and they are going to run across the same
0	situation I'm dealing with.
1	MS. POWELL: Thank you, Nancy.
2	MS. DRAKE: Okay. Thank you.
13	MS. WITTUM: Currently, for you all's information,
4	it's actually in the rules prohibiting implements from
5	being carried on a licensee's person. It's under
6	4.2(c) 21(b). And it says, no person training or
17	working in a school or salon shall be permitted to
8	carry any instrument or supplies in or on a garment or

- 19 uniform while practicing cosmetology or any branch 20 thereof. 21 MS. POWELL: I would like to ask, I know that 22 there are some board members here that have been on longer than I, so maybe you remember when this rule was 23 implemented and what the intent of it was. 24 As I see that saying in the garment, I know that 25 SUSAN B. WHITSON, CCR, INC. (501) 455-1170 220 1 the intent was probably to protect health and safety 2 issues of someone carrying a pair of shears or a comb
 - 3 in their pocket and whipping it out and start, you 4 know, using it without disinfecting it. However I'm 5 wondering, does -- do you believe the intent of this 6 also was to prevent someone from putting disinfected 7 implements into a container and then the container into 8 the pocket on a person? 9 MS. TRAYLOR: I never heard of that before. 10 MS. POWELL: If you had your shears in a dry -- if 11 you had your shears disinfected and you put those in a

12 closable container and you chose to put that in your 13 pocket as opposed to laying it on your dresserette, or 14 whatever you all call them, is -- do you believe that that's what this intent was? 15 16 MS. TRAYLOR: Mine go in a case. Mine go in a 17 case. 18 MS. POWELL: Right. What I'm saying, you would 19 put those in a case. Well then, are you saying the 20 intent of this was to prevent you from putting that 21 case in your pocket, because --22 MS. TRAYLOR: I don't think it would have anything 23 to do with the case in the pocket. 24 MS. POWELL: I think it says the garment. MS. TRAYLOR: The garment. 25 SUSAN B. WHITSON, CCR, INC. (501) 455-1170

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1 MS. POWELL: They're talking about putting the 2 implement in the garment. So if you, in your case, I'm 3 saying that if you took your shears and your concern is

4 to leave them laying on your dresser, if you were to 5 take your shears and put -- and I'm assuming they are about a five inch shear or somewhere in --6 MS. DRAKE: No. They are all different lengths. 7 8 I had brought them the last time I came here. 9 MS. POWELL: Right. I remember the pouch that you made. I thought you were talking about a shear. I 10 didn't know you were talking about six or eight pair at 11 one time. 12 13 MS. DRAKE: No, they are different -- yeah, they 14 are different shears. And I did take that in 15 consideration, because my implements, everything, 16 sanitize. 17 MS. TRAYLOR: Did they come in a box or --18 MS. DRAKE: They do come in, but when you're busy, 19 you're cutting, and you're doing one customer right 20 after another, sometimes you don't even have much of a 21 break in between. You've got people waiting on you. 22 And it can get kind of hairy sometimes. MS. TRAYLOR: But you always take time to sanitize 23 24 them? 25 MS. DRAKE: I do take -- I have a wipe that I do

1	use. It's oil based that's sanitary, and I've got a
2	spray that I use for my clippers and so forth. Yes, I
3	do keep them clean.
4	I've got a lot of combs, I've got a lot of
5	brushes. And once I use something on somebody, it goes
6	back for sanitation. So I don't stick a comb or
7	anything on myself. The only thing I keep with me are
8	my shears, because I'm busy, I'm constantly reaching in
9	front of my customer because I have to use a different
10	shear. I use sometimes three or four shears on one,
11	one head. And it all depends on what I need to do. If
12	I have to knock out a cowlick or if I have to put a
13	curl in or release a curl, they all have a different
14	use.
15	MS. POWELL: Well yes, Ms. Ward?
16	MS. WARD: Okay. If you're using the shears on a
17	client, you're using you said three or four at the same

time, you're putting them in your cape and then you are
taking them out and using them again. Now, when you -
MS. DRAKE: Well, the cape is with the -
MS. WARD: But when you sanitize the shears,

you're putting them back in the cape. Have you

sanitized that cape?

MS. DRAKE: No. Now, the cape, it was suede,

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okay. The suede is to help clean the hair as I'm going

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in. I took a lot in consideration. That's why I 1 2 didn't seal any pockets because you're going to have 3 hair that drops. Even when you put them back in your 4 case, if they are not wiped, you're going to have hair. 5 Hair is everywhere. You can't get rid of hair. It's 6 very difficult. 7 But consideration is just kind of wiping them where you can after each service is done or sometimes 8 9 if you're just so backed up, there isn't anyone that 10 does do it, but you just try your best at trying to

11 keep everything up, especially with your shears. 12 Combs you can put it separate. After somebody 13 uses it, you put them away, they go back and they get 14 sanitized. That's a lot easier because you can keep a 15 lot of combs and go through the day. MS. WARD: But did you say that you don't sanitize 16 your shears after each person if you're real busy? 17 18 MS. DRAKE: I have a -- no. Sometimes you can't. The shears -- how do I explain this? 19 20 You can wipe them. I mean, just to sweep up our 21 hair sometimes, you've got so many people waiting, and 22 it's how -- where you book yourself, sometimes you 23 don't even know when you're going to be that busy, you may have a problem with a color that runs you over, 24 25 you're behind, then the pressure is there. You got SUSAN B. WHITSON, CCR, INC. (501) 455-1170 224

3 MS. TRAYLOR: Well, I think it would -- most of us 4 who have stood behind the chair, we kind of know how 5 that goes. 6 MS. DRAKE: Yes. 7 MS. TRAYLOR: But some of us are still behind the chair. But, now, you just give up on all of it? 8 9 MS. DRAKE: You can have a tendency. And I like 10 to work towards not giving up, towards bettering 11 situations. 12 MS. TRAYLOR: But sometimes you have to give 13 yourself some time in there. 14 MS. DRAKE: You do. You do. And right now I only 15 work three days a week, but I'm also getting out and 16 I'm trying to promote more education for haircutters. 17 I'm very interested in the schools. There is a lot of 18 areas that I like to try to get into, to help our 19 reputation, that we don't get a bad reputation, we get 20 qualified hairdressers, people with education. 21 MS. TURMAN: Would you educate me a little bit on the suede? The day you brought in the belt, to me the 22 23 suede looked -- looked dirty. I mean, you know, you can't wash it like you can --24

MS. DRAKE: Right.

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1	MS. TURMAN: Of course, I know you have to be very
2	careful because the scissors would probably go through
3	cloth.
4	I'm not sure, I'm not a hairdresser. But the
5	suede looked dirty to me.
6	MS. DRAKE: Well, what happens is the suede will
7	stain. When you're shampooing somebody, you're going
8	to have a little water splash up. When you're spraying
9	anything, color can, you know, drip. You can pick up
10	just things like that that will discolor it and make it
11	look dirty.
12	MS. TURMAN: I'm talking about the inside also.
13	MS. DRAKE: The inside, all it is is just a flap
14	that goes over the instruments. There is nothing
15	underneath there.
16	MS. POWELL: Well, I think she's already stated

- 17 that she would use the shears and put those in a fabric 18 suede container with the exposure on the point of the 19 shear, and the flap would come over to secure that they 20 stay in there --21 MS. TURMAN: I wasn't aware that she did that. 22 MS. POWELL: -- and hold it. 23 And I think that that's the issue that the board is looking at, or that I'm looking at. I don't know 24
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what the board is looking at. I'm looking at a

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1 material. I'm looking at a health and safety issue. 2 MS. DRAKE: Uh-huh. Uh-huh. 3 MS. POWELL: And you're using a shear on more --4 on multiple people, and you're depositing hair 5 clippings from one person to another in a suede pouch, 6 which at this time doesn't follow a health and safety issue that the board has outlined in their rules. 7 8 MS. DRAKE: Okay.

FRANK DRAKE: Could I address the issue, questions

10 of the board here about the pouch itself? MS. POWELL: Sure. 11 COURT REPORTER: Identify yourself. 12 FRANK DRAKE: Okay. The pouch itself is 13 constructed out of imported suveal [spelled 14 phonetically] leather. Okay. It is chrome covered in 15 flaxseed. All right? Flaxseed, if you remember the 16 old ladies and getting a cut in your hand, put flax 17 soap on it, put flax soap on it. There is nothing in 18 19 the leather which is going to be contaminated. There 20 is no trichloromethanes, there's no urethane in it. 21 This jacket has got more formaldehyde in it than 22 anything in this room, okay. So now you've got a 23 little breakdown as far as the chemical composition of this suede. 24 Nancy chose to use the leather or the suede from 25 SUSAN B. WHITSON, CCR, INC. (501) 455-1170 227

1 the standpoint it was probably the most neutral

2 capacity or item that she could, use as opposed to just 3 vinyl. Vinyl is just -- you get in a new car, you open that thing up, boy, this car smells good. That car is 4 going to kill you in three years, if you left the 5 windows up because of all the formaldehyde, because you 6 7 breathe formaldehyde coming through the ductwork. So there are things out there. 8 Now I'm going to address your concern -- your 9 10 question, too. Health and safety. There are worse 11 things out there than I would say a pouch. And that's 12 what -- I hope I answered your question. 13 MS. TURMAN: Thank you. 14 MS. WITTUM: Sir, could you identify yourself for 15 the court reporter, please. 16 FRANK DRAKE: Oh. I beg your pardon. 17 My name is Frank Drake. I'm the husband. Nothing 18 else. 19 MS. POWELL: It's not -- and to respond to your 20 statement, is my concern was not -- not a concern of the product and what the pouch was made out of, be it 21 22 formaldehyde or imported leather or whatever. It was 23 the contamination of it during the process of being

24 used.

FRANK DRAKE: Uh-huh.

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1 MS. POWELL: Not -- not the -- not the product 2 itself. FRANK DRAKE: Well, sure. And I just want to 3 4 answer you, I just want to answer the woman's question. But my wife is concerned because she comes home and she 5 has got these expensive shears. And these old ladies 6 7 are cutting out coupons from Ladies Home Journal. 8 Those shears are not to used for that, and that's 9 happened at times. She's had some problems. 10 MS. DRAKE: I had somebody take my shears and then 11 bring flowers for me to put in their hair and cut them, 12 with the little wire thing in there, and, you know, 13 it's heart breaking. Because you get a nick in them 14 and then they've got to go back for resharpening, which 15 is an expense. I didn't make any money.

So the only reason I'm here is because it's a discussion, it's an open thing, just, you know, maybe another way of wording it and looking at the situation, how it can be done to still be sanitized where it could be, when more people get into this and they are in the situation that they need a little protection for their shears, as well. And when it's a hair situation or anything, there is hair, when you lay your implements on a counter -- I work with another gal with the Helix chairs, and they are just piled up next to her and they

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are flopping and, you know. That I think is more
dangerous than what I'm doing. And it's just a
consideration. It's another way of looking at things
and how to make things better.
I guess that's all I have to say.
MS. TURMAN: Thank you.
MS. POWELL: Thank you.

MS. DRAKE: All right. Thank you.

- 9 MS. WITTUM: Chris? Okay. 10 MS. STRAWN: Want me to come up here? 11 My name is Chris Strawn. I'm with Arthur's Beauty 12 Colleges. 13 And, first of all, is there -- this is a question. Is there some place where I can get all of the board 14 15 members' e-mail addresses? Is that on the website? I 16 know yours is and the office staff. 17 MS. WITTUM: No. The -- I've never asked the 18 board for permission to release the e-mail addresses. 19 MS. TRAYLOR: I don't have e-mail. I don't have a 20 computer. 21 MS. STRAWN: Well, I would just like a way to be able to get in touch with board members. 22 MS. WITTUM: With the -- now, we can give a list 23 of their addresses at their -- of course, their work 24 phone numbers. 25
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1 MS. STRAWN: Okay. 2 MS. WITTUM: And --3 (Mr. Keene handed Ms. Strawn a business card.) MS. STRAWN: Thank you, sir. 4 MS. WITTUM: We will be happy to provide that. I 5 6 can e-mail that to you today. MS. STRAWN: Okay. And also I'm sure you know why 7 I'm here. I'm concerned about the fact that eight of 8 9 my students were not put in the exam schedule for this 10 month. 11 And as I sent -- as the e-mail that I sent you, I 12 questioned why, if there is in fact a limit or it's 13 first come in first serve, why is that not written 14 somewhere where I -- this has never been an issue until 15 this month, and it's a huge issue. And, I mean, it 16 has -- it's been a -- it's been a very large problem this month for me, and others, other schools, I think. 17 18 I'm not sure. 19 MS. WITTUM: Well, after -- after we realized there were more candidates than what we had space for 20 21 this month, I spoke with Mr. Jochums to make sure that 22 there were no laws or rules that required us to

schedule an extra day, because most of -- especially
the board knows, I have scheduled an extra day and
called and solicited examiners to come in on that extra

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1	day in the past.
2	This month I did not feel we could do that because
3	of what stress the office is under. When I when I
4	was leaning towards that decision, I contacted
5	Mr. Jochums. I also spoke with President Powell. And
6	according to what President Powell has told me, before
7	I came, the board stuck to the four days per week.
8	MS. TRAYLOR: That's true, we did.
9	MS. WITTUM: Or per month of examine
10	MS. TRAYLOR: If you ran over you just waited.
11	But then we were giving them every other month, but you
12	just had to wait until the next exam.
13	MS. WITTUM: But my main concern was to make sure
14	that there were no laws that said we had to schedule an

15 extra day when our space was filled to capacity. And, 16 according to Mr. Jochums, and he can speak for himself here, there is no requirement for the board to do that. 17 18 MS. STRAWN: Uh-huh. I -- I completely agree with that, Kathy, and I understand that. 19 But, you know, what I've heard for the past 14 20 21 months, since you've been here, and speaking with this board, and really it's all about the students. You 22 23 know, we're trying to take care of the students, we're 24 trying to take care of the students. 25

That I know that this is a holiday month, I'm not

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- 1 confused about that, but it is for the students as 2 well. And you guys working in this industry know that 3 this is the busiest time for us. And because they have 4 been sent -- they are having to wait like four more weeks, the busy time, they are -- I mean, it's their 5 6 holiday month, too.
- 7 And these -- these -- my students, like Jane and

8 Barbara can attest to this, too, these are my 9 professional kids. These are the ones that have come 10 to my school, and I feel like I need to protect them. 11 And I'm just very disappointed that we couldn't have 12 put another day in to take care of eight -- eight people, that's a lot of people. 13 And I've been begging for -- since Tuesday, the 14 Tuesday after the deadline, and I don't understand. 15 And that would be the only reason I would think that we 16 17 need to outsource, because I understand these people are busy. I understand you guys are busy. I 18 19 understand that. But if that's the issue, then that 20 would be the reason I think we need to outsource. 21 MS. WITTUM: But that's not the only issue. MS. TRAYLOR: No, that isn't the only issue. 22 MS. WITTUM: Because the office staff -- the 23 24 office staff has a lot more to do than just administer 25 the exams. And, yes, we do look out or try to look out

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1 for the best interest of the students, but we also have 2 to insure that we can provide a quality job to every area of the office that we deal with. And not only is 3 it the holiday month, but we have renewal season that 4 started this month, we have a new computer system that 5 I'm too lady-like to explain what we're going through 6 with it on open record, in addition to getting ready 7 8 for board meetings, doing other meetings and doing our 9 day-to-day work. This month, out of the 14 months that I've been 10 11 here, is the only month I have not bent over backwards 12 to make accommodations for the students. And I, while 13 I understand and appreciate the hardship to not only 14 your school, but the others who were effected and those 15 students who were effected, I'm not going to apologize 16 to anyone for choosing that or making that decision 17 this month. It was the best decision for this month. 18 That doesn't mean it's the way it's going to be every single month from here on out, it's just that it 19 20 happened this month. 21 MS. STRAWN: Okay.
